We are busy at the Homestead Acre getting ready for the Garden Festival and Spring in general. We had a very successful Rose Pruning Day with members of the San Fernando Valley Rose Society, the Chatsworth Kiwanis, Chatsworth Historical Society and boys from Rancho San Antonio. A big thank you goes to all for helping us prune 200 roses. Annette, Terri and Nadia are busy making sure the garden will look great for the Garden Festival. I don't mention him often but Trini Sanchez, our gardener is an important part of our gardening team. Our board has decided after numerous requests from our members to have something at the Acre to establish a Memorial Brick Plaza. OUT IN THE GARDEN:

January is a big month for the garden when we prune each of our many rose gardens to get the roses ready to come back in full bloom. They are spectacular in April when we have our Garden Festival. So now is the time that we are fine tuning our sprinklers, fertilizing and weeding our gardens.

If you need some outdoor fresh air therapy, come join our gardening team on Wednesday mornings 9-noon.

Thank you to the Chatsworth Kiwanis, Southern California Rose Society, and Rancho San Antonio volunteers who joined us on Sunday morning to prune roses. We used to boast about having over 300 roses 20 years ago but our gardens have evolved to include additional types of plants. Our latest rose bush count puts us at 194 + 1 new donation delivered to us on Sunday.



IN THE MUSEUM: Linda van der Valk is continuously working with the items donated to the museum by our members and the community. Marcia Chopp has volunteered and is working hard to create an inventory of all of our movies on hand (DVD, VHS and more). This is a big project that will be a great asset to our archives. We are preparing a new display of photos and information to represent Chatsworth's 130th Anniversary.

IN THE COTTAGE:

We have been fortunate to receive a donation from the Jenkin's family who are the grandchildren of Minnie Hill Palmer. They have had Minnie's upright piano in their possession and recently decided to send it back home on loan to the homestead. We have placed it in the same location it was when Minnie lived in the house. The Jenkins' family also donated a painting that belonged to Minnie and it will hang above the piano.

The piano is circa 1920 and was a prized possession. Interviews with Minnie indicate that she did extra jobs to be able to provide her two children with piano lessons.



An inventory project is still underway to confirm and learn more about the items on display and their history so we can provide more information on our tours.

A sidelight to the presentation included the following story: At our Open House in January, Franklin Berger talked quite awhile with me about his remembrances of Roy Rogers. He also mentioned that he had a friend who had a business with Roy Rogers, involving trading cards. His friend was Larry Cisewski, who called us and told us his story:

He knew Roy in 1992 and they had a business together regarding collector cards. During that time, the "This is Your Life" episodes were being re-released on TV. He asked Roy if he had seen the episode that he was in. Roy replied that "he had seen it, but it was too hard to watch, because it had included his parents, that had both passed".

Larry met Roy in 1981 at a Knott's Berry Farm four day celebration honoring Roy's 50 years as a performer (Roy was 69 at the time). Larry had a knife throwing act, and he visited with Roy backstage.

Larry renewed the acquaintance in the early 1990's, and met with Roy for a half day once a week in Victorville for 3 years. During that time Larry produced Roy Rogers memorabilia including collector cards, lunch boxes, and other items. Larry mailed us, as a donation, a 70 card set of Roy Rogers Comic Cover Collector Cards (Series 1).





Photo of class learning about life over 100 years ago.

CHATSWORTH MOVIE HISTORY - 1924 Sherlock Jr.

At 15:15 of the movie, The Chatsworth Water Tank Water Spout scene begins, facing west. Notice the car approaching traveling east on Devonshire at the end of the scene.



this was not the only accident on set.

The water spout story is as follows:

The production included one of Keaton's most famous onset accidents. In a scene where Keaton grabs a water spout while walking on a moving boxcar train, the water unexpectedly flooded down on Keaton much harder than anticipated, throwing him to the ground. The back of Keaton's neck slammed against a steel rail on the ground and caused him to black out. The pain was so intense that Keaton had to stop shooting later that day and he had "blinding headaches" for weeks afterwards, but continued working due to his well-known high vertebra in an X-ray. The doctor informed Keaton that he had broken his neck during the accident nine years earlier and not realized it. Keaton famously always performed his own stunts, and


FILMING CONTINUES IN CHATSWORTH – The Orville on FOX



You can certainly spot Stoney Point. Some of the background is fake, as they erased or added buildings for each time period. Notice that they

turned Topanga Canyon into a river, and built a bridge across it at the Santa Susana Pass Road in the final screenshot. Filming was done at Rockridge, owned by the Church at Rocky Peak.

CHATSWORTH PARADE PHOTOS

Chatsworth has been hosting parades for many years, and we wanted to share some parade photos from our archives. The earliest parade photos we have are circa 1941, showing the parade route in July traveling from Devonshire south on Topanga and turning west on Plummer (photos below).







Ed Iverson told a story in a video that in the 1940's the whole community would gather at Stoney point following the annual 4th of July Parade. There was a pig roast at the base and a flag mounted half way up on the rocks (photo at left).

In 1956 the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce sponsored the 4th of July Parade Celebration with a "Giant Fiesta" where the parade ended at the Aqua Sierra Sportsmen's Club (today's Chatsworth Park South).



The Chatsworth Historical Society's first float was in 1965 just after the Pioneer Church was moved to the Oakwood Cemetery. The group decided to show off their efforts and created a small version of the church on the move to enter in the parade (photo at left).

The 4th of July parades continued into the early 1970's, my sister and I both participated as members

of the Chatsworth Drill Team. At some point the July parades stopped, we do not know the exact date, if you have information about this let us know.

In 1981 the Chamber of Commerce reinstated the parades in December as the Holiday Parade. Bea Berman was the parade coordinator at that time arranging for Budweiser to sponsor the parade and include their team of horses. We recently received some memorabilia from Bob Wood, real estate salesman in Chatsworth Lake Manor. He provided us with a t-shirt from the "Chatsworth 2nd annual Budweiser"

Clydesdale Holiday Parade Dec 5th 1982". We recently received some correspondence from a young lady who remembers riding in the parade in 1982 on horseback and was hoping we had photos of her at that time. If you have any photos of "Chatsworth Parades Past" please let us know and share them with us.

Recently the Chatsworth Kiwanis has picked this up and have continued as the parade sponsor for many years. THANK YOU to the Chatsworth Kiwanis for carrying on this valued tradition.
