If you need some outdoor fresh air therapy, come join our gardening team on Wednesday mornings 9noon.





SUMMER ACTIVITIES

In June, the **2018 California Conference of Historical Societies** held their Annual Meeting June 21st-23rd at the Radisson Hotel in Chatsworth, CA. We held a special Open House on June 22 from 6-8pm on Friday to accommodate their schedule, so they could visit our Chatsworth Museum while they were visiting. Thank you to our Chatsworth members who came and helped host the evening. Gloria DeMuri attended all three days of the conference and filled us in on the workshops they offered.

In August, we were able to provide a special program for our neighbors at the Chatsworth Park South Recreation Center. The day camp students scheduled to come to the ACRE for a tour, but because of the heat, we decided to take a little history to them. Donna Nachtrab and Ann Vincent spent some time with the students discussing chores that Pioneer children would have done and concluded the talk with some old fashioned butter churning. It was a successful activity with both students and staff planning to go home and share the activity with their families.

Thank you to Al and Cheryl Pinnaro, who remain good friends and members of the Chatsworth Historical Society. Cheryl was involved with our ACRE when it first got started working for Rec and Parks, assigned to help with landscaping. Al got involved later through the City by designing the new state of the art sprinkler system for the ACRE in 2004. Prior to that time volunteers Jim and Betty Summers would drag around hoses to fill in gaps in coverage on the grass and flower beds. The system still works well, but Al was kind enough to survey the existing system to make recommendations on how to improve its efficiency. Our Landscaping volunteers appreciate Al doing the survey on his own time to help us out. City staff at Rec and Parks will help us implement his suggestions.

RED COMET AUTOMATIC FIRE EXTINGUISHER

The Chatsworth Historical Society has been fortunate to have many fascinating items donated to us to help share the history of life in the 1900's. We don't think much about it now with our more modern safety methods, but back in the day...if the only way to heat your house was with a stove or a small wood burning or oil furnace, and your lighting was with oil...how would you put out a fire when it started or got out of control. Running water was not yet available.

The Glass Grenade Fire Extinguisher was today's sprinkler system. Although they also came simply as breakable glass balls to be thrown at the fire, the



Red Comet system shown above was more sophisticated, created in 1919 in Littleton, Colorado.

This unit was intended to be mounted on the wall near a fire source. If a fire broke out causing enough heat, a soldered-spring loaded pin at the bottom of the bracket would puncture the glass bulb, breaking the glass and releasing the liquid. You also had the option of picking it up out of the holder and simply throwing it at the base of fire.

The glass grenades were filled with carbon tetrachloride (CTC). The liquid vaporized and extinguished the flames by inhibiting the chemical chain reaction of the combustion process. These types of extinguishers were withdrawn in the 1950's because of the chemical's toxicity – exposure to high concentrations damages the nervous system and internal organs. Additionally, when used on a fire, the heat can convert CTC to phosgene gas, a chemical weapon used in WWI.

The unit shown here had been in storage at the acre until recently. After some research, we determined that it was best to not display or continue to store it, and find a safer home for it. We decided that the best thing to do was take it to local Fire Station 96, to be donated to the LAFD Museum.

They were happy to accept it and enjoyed the history of the Red Comet Fire Grenade.



The words on the sticker (which is on the other side of the globe above) says "Red Comet The Original Automatic Fire Extinguisher. For manual use throw to splash over burning area."

HIP BATH TUB DONATION


CHAIR DONATION

The description provided was that of a civil war era cowboy "sit tub". It was donated by Patti Alpert



and her husband on July 25. It had been in Patti's family for some time and she wanted to find a good home for it. We were able to find this tub still being sold in the Sears Catalog circa 1897. For a household without running water, this light weight tin tub could be carried into the kitchen or out to the back porch, and filled with just a couple

buckets of warm water. By 1910 these were no longer carried by Sears. By that time the indoor bathroom with water was now in vogue making Hip Baths and other portable tubs a thing of the past. However, Minnie Hill Palmer only got water brought to her property in the 1950s. So she might have still relied on a small tub like this until her bathroom with running water was installed.

On June 3 at our Open House, Fred Samuel brought us an upholstered chair that had been in his



family since the early 1900's. One of the unique features on this chair is the small casters on only the front two legs. From what I can tell with my limited internet research is that this would be considered a Victorian Eastlake style parlor chair. It could possibly have been one of a

set of 4 or 6 chairs for a dining room. The wood is carved and is made just like one of the wood carved upholstered settees currently in the cottage of the same time period, that also has casters on the legs. Furniture of this time period would have casters to make it easy to move furniture out of the way to make use of the room. These small casters would work best on wood floors, not on our carpets of today.

MACK SENNETT background plates

Mack Sennett founded Keystone Studios in 1912

In 1981, a donation of 8" x 10" glass and nitrite negatives was made by Kristen Sparks (of Studio City) to Sheila Watts of the Chatsworth Historical Society. None of the negatives were specifically labeled or dated and had been in storage for quite some time to protect them.

They were each in separate paper sleeves, stamped with the words "Photo by Clement" and "OK by Mr. Mack Sennett".

"Chatsworth" and "96" was handwritten in pencil on some of the sleeves (at left).



Of the six glass negatives, one has disintegrated on the glass. The other five negatives are landscapes of a field with a tree, at various angles. One of the negatives is shown below.



We were curious as to why there would be photos of the same area with so many views until we ran into Jon Boorstin, an expert on the history of Studio City. We just happened to be seated next to him at a San Fernando Valley Historical Society Meeting.

It turns out Mack Sennett founded Keystone Studios in 1912 in Los Angeles, and was best known for slapstick comedies, especially the Keystone Cop series. Keystone Studios became known as Studio City.

Jon explained that the glass negatives are likely **'background plates'**. They

project them on a screen on the stage in the studio, and it looks like the actors are outside. The different camera angles are to cover the various close-ups and wide shots in the scene.

Nine nitrite negatives were also donated, but they have warped and melted to the paper sleeves. A quick search shows that they are highly flammable; we will send them to someone to evaluate if they can be recovered.

We don't know what movies they might have used Chatsworth as a background for in the early days or even where in Chatsworth these were taken, but it was fun to realize we had these glass slides that were a part of the Mack Sennett era.
