Ventura County Astronomical Society Presents 50 Years Since Apollo 11

On July 20, Ray and I were invited to participate in the Star Party hosted by the Ventura County Astronomical Society at Moorpark College Observatory, to honor the 50 years since Apollo 11. The program included experts such as Dr Jerrell Thomas of NASA who talked about his career with NASA on Project Apollo. Dr. Thomas worked for NASA for the entire duration of Project Apollo. It was fascinating to hear his comments regarding the engineering and design decisions that were made throughout the project. Professor Hal Jandorf gave an astronomy talk on: "What's Up Tonight". Professor Jandorf teaches astronomy at Moorpark and



Valley Colleges. He was able to use a laser pointer to identify the constellations in the night sky. It was fun. At least 15 people had brought their own handmade or purchased telescopes to share views of Saturn visible in the sky. The Moorpark College telescope was available also. In addition, there were displays on hand of Apollo information shared by a variety of guests including Gloria DeMuri. Her father worked for Rocketdyne and she provided a display of his work.

Ray and I were asked to give our Chatsworth Historical Society program on the History of Rocketdyne, Saturn V engine tests, the Space shuttle and the history of Burro Flats. We found ourselves surrounded by engineers and scientists... many of the guests were Rocketdyne past

employees and had never heard the history of the area before it became Rocketdyne. They all enjoyed the photos of the test stands and rocket testing. We had a great time...



Requirements

- <u>Signed Release from Parent</u>: Deposit in box at Student Store by June 5th. These will be recorded and filed.
- <u>Party Behavior</u>: Beyond reproach at all times. No alcoholic beverages consumed or carried. (Any infractions will result in prompt Police confinement with parents called).
- 3. <u>Refreshment Money</u>: The popular "Graduate Special" is \$1.00, plus tax. Extras and soft drinks \$1.00 ???????
- 4. <u>Apparel</u>: Ladies -- Party or date dresses, dress flats or low heels. Wraps (it gets cold at night.) <u>No capris or Bermudas</u>.

Gentlemen ---- Coats, ties, dress slacks, shirts and shoes. No sweaters, jeans, or gym shoes. No Service uniforms.

No improperly attired person can board the buses.


Information

- Bus: <u>Departure Loading</u> (Chatsworth School Gym Plaza) 9:30 p.m., <u>Buses don't wait</u> - <u>no money refunded</u>. <u>No private cars allowed</u>, <u>going or coming</u>. Only bus passengers will be checked in by Gate Police. Return on original bus.

Photographs and visit with Gray family members

Polly Pastre, the great-grand-daughter of Minerva and Nelson Gray, visited the Acre at our August Open House. We enjoyed the visit with her, her son and grandchildren who toured the museum and enjoyed seeing the Gray family items we have on display. She brought us some new photo treasures from the Gray Family Photo Album and also provided us with an excerpt from her grandmothers sister's autobiography entitled "Pigtails to Silver-Grey". We are proud to have our museum be a repository for our early Chatsworth family memories.

The family photos are fascinating, and I thought I would share this one taken in 1894 with some interesting landmarks in the background. The swing on the left indicates that this was a play area for the kids near their home on Lassen. We see that the sandstone boulder has drill marks in the front left, where it was split from a much larger stone. Stone from



the Bannon Quarry was used to build their milk house, which kept it cool in summer months.

The best part of the photo, besides the children, is the background buildings that are visible. On the left is the 1890 Chatsworth Hotel (left side of swing ropes), with the 1893 Train Depot on the right side of the swing, and the 1893 water tower just left of the tree trunk. To the right of the tree trunk there is a train on the tracks.



The four children as shown are twin girls on the left, Ida and Edith, along with boy–girl twins Myrtle and Clarence on the right. Ida is Polly's grandmother, the sister of Edith Gray MacFarland who wrote the autobiography. This story shared by the family is written in the first person by the daughter of Nelson and Minerva, telling the story of how they moved to Chatsworth and what it was like to grow up here. She discusses the house they first moved into on the 80 acre lot that her father bought on Lassen, the school they attended, the new house her father built on the property in 1898, and the church property her father donated. When Ida and Edith reached their third year of high school…they were sent to live with grandparents in Pasadena to complete their schooling with the hope of meeting some eligible bachelors. The Gray family owned additional acreage in Chatsworth at that time and were very prominent and involved community citizens.

New artwork at our Chatsworth Museum – from local artists that knew each other

The latest discovery by Linda van der Valk on Ebay was a circa 1930's pencil etching by WA Eskey titled "Chatsworth Rocks". The etching captures a southwest view of Stoney Point; the house and trees are not readily identifiable and were probably added by artistic license.


William A. Eskey (1891-1937) was born in Sistersville, West Virginia. Eskey fought in France during WWI and studied art there after the war. When he returned to the U.S., he lived in Los Angeles with his wife and two daughters. The 1930 census has him living at 819 N. Brand in San Fernando. The house still stands, built in 1890, with 8 bedrooms 5 baths, worth \$1.1 million today. In 1932 he built a house at 11532 Hartsook St., North Hollywood, that house is valued today at 1.2 million. He died young at age 46 due to weak lungs from 'gas' in WWI.

He made his first dry point etching

in 1928 while a patient in the Veteran's Hospital in San Fernando Valley. Much of his time was spent in Twentynine Palms where he owned 100 acres. A regular visitor to his ranch was actor **Lionel Barrymore**, whom he introduced to etching. Trees were often the subject of Eskey's etchings; he also created pen-and-ink designs and bookplates.

Lionel Barrymore Etchings

Terry Tanner made a recent donation of Lionel Barrymore color-etch prints to the museum. It was a collection of four nautical themed etchings; the one at right is titled "Point Mugu". Lionel Barrymore moved to Chatsworth in 1938; he also studied art in Paris for 4 years in 1905.
