



Donation of Wedding Certificate – Minnie Hill and Alfred Palmer

Our open house events often bring us surprise stories or artifacts, but the October Open House brought a real treasure for us.

Darrell Jenkins, the great-grandson of Minnie Hill Palmer, and his wife Carol found the Marriage Certificate of Minnie Hill and Alfred Palmer amongst documents passed down to them. Folded up was the original 1909 oversized marriage certificate that they framed and donated to the Acre for safe-keeping and display.



How the Chatsworth Reservoir Dam was built

Owensmouth Gazette March 14, 1919

The article on the right tells the beginning story of the Chatsworth Reservoir.

"Nearly 100 men, with teams and wagons, scrapers, a steam shovel and a train of dump cars run by a locomotive, are putting the finishing work on the great dam to be known as No 2 Chatsworth Reservoir. This work will bring the dam proper to a height of thirty-five feet, and it is about 3200 feet in length. Eventually the dam will reach a height of eighty-five feet."

While researching the Knapp family, the Canoga Owensmouth Historical Society shared a 1996 letter from Walter Knapp that included his memories of opening day at the Chatsworth Reservoir. He wrote:

"I was there with my Dad when the first water flowed into Chatsworth Reservoir.


They had a big celebration, Barbecue, Music and Speeches by Mulholland, Whitsett and other big shots. I was just a little kid, but I can still remember the shouting and yelling, even guns firing when the water came gushing out of the pipe. Of course, that was what made the Valley grow. Of course, the guys on the inside, Whitsett, Mulholland, Workman, Lankershim had bought up a lot of land because they knew water would raise the prices of land right away. They were right.

It was fun to watch them build the dam. Small trains carried the dirt from the basin of the dam and dumped it on the dam site. As the dam built up the train tracks were moved to a higher level. The work never stopped till the dam was completed. When the dam was filled with water, the water seeped out so badly a dam was built below it to catch the seepage. The rest, I'm sure you know."

A BIG JOB OF ENGINEERING

Mighty Lake Will Be Made this Summer

Twenty-eight billion gallons of water impounded at a slight elevation to the northwest of Owensmouth and hid behind rolling hills and rocky promatories, is what will constitute an artificial lake of pure, crystallized mountain water before the summer is over. Water enough to supply Los Angeles city for 400 days, or many years of irrigation for San Fernando valley.

This mighty volume of delicious spring water is not only a blessing to thirsty humanity, but it is creating a dream center for writers of romance and fiction because of the scenic beauty developed at the hand of skillful engineers. All around the margin of the lake are collections of shrubbery, trees and hill sides carpented with verdures of green, making a panoramic scene very bewitching to the eye.

Great Work Going On
Nearly 100 men, with teams and

The present work will be completed, probably within the present months, and immediately thereafter will begin the inpour of Los Angeles aqueduct waters, to be impounded for use during the coming irrigation season. No further work on the raising of the dam will be undertaken until the close of the irrigation season.

Chatsworth Reservoir, when completed, will be the second largest water storage on the Los Angeles Aqueduct system, being exceeded only by the great Haiwee Reservoir. The Chatsworth Reservoir will have a total capacity of 41,000 acre feet, while the Haiwee Reservoir has a capacity of 65,000 acre feet. The San Fernando Reservoir has 27,000 acre feet of water.

ROB'S Roast Beef – Wooden Nickel



Linda van der Valk is always on the lookout for Chatsworth memorabilia. This was her latest find and it is worth more than 5 cents to all of us! Ray did some additional sleuthing to find the Rob's Roast Beef advertisement in 1969 including a 1973 want ad below:





This was in the same building currently occupied by Rosie's BBQ Kitchen...who also serves a great tri-tip sandwich!

The city of Los Angeles created a <u>Historic Resources Inventory</u> where this building is listed; the Primary name as Rob's Roast Beef and the Alternative name as Rosie's BBQ Kitchen. The building was built in 1964. It is listed as an "Excellent example of Googie commercial architecture in Chatsworth. Due to alterations, including replacement of cladding on the parapet, the resource does not retain sufficient integrity for listing in the National Register."



Googie architecture (/'gu:gi/GOO-ghee) is a type of futurist architecture influenced by car culture, jets, the Space Age, and the Atomic Age. It originated in Southern California with the Streamline Moderne architecture of the 1930s, and was popular nationwide from roughly 1945 to the early 1970s.

a few of them below.



Bruce described the photo below "Stoney Point and snow on Oat Mountain from Chatsworth St. during 1983 El Nino rains." Notice the Vellone produce stand at bottom left.



Original Hill Palmer Cottage Renovations took place in 1979

We recently re-discovered a five-page 1979 Homestead Acre progress report. In July of that year Chatsworth Historical Society members restored Minnie Hill Palmer's cottage and prepared it for future tours. Members mentioned are: Chuck Janess, Tom Woodard, Jane Matthews, Ramon Avila, Lillian Schepler, Bob Swartz, Virginia Watson, Marlys Stuckenbruck, Lila Schepler, Betty and Jim Summers, Fern Jack, Bob Hayes, Jeff Ziemski, Larry Hoffman, Burrell Plucknett, Wynn Holliday, Larry McCoy, Marion Magee, Everett Cleveland. Organizations that volunteered their time included the CCC (Civilian Conservation Corps.), Boy Scout Troop 266 and Troop 522.



They started in July 1979 and worked through January 1980 before the house was refurnished with period items. The cottage now gives a look into the past to tell the story of the Hill family.

What I enjoyed in the report were references to the items selected to refurbish and decorate using early period materials, when possible.

The cottage has no screens. Prior to screens being available to use on windows, lace curtains provided air flow while restricting large insects and birds from flying through open windows. "In August Fern Jack made curtains for the house. Jane Matthews found appropriate lace at Home Silk for the living room curtains. It is a glass cloth which will not fade or rot." Forty years later, the curtains are in perfect condition!!

Another item purchased for the restoration was Congoleum for the front porch floor covering. It still exists today and has held up pretty well. The Congoleum floor brand was founded in 1886 and it is a much stronger, longer lasting product than

linoleum. Other interesting comments from the progress report:

July 16, "Much consultation this week about problems of family of five skunks living under the house. Suggested remedies – traps, moth balls, De-con covered with hamburger. SKUNKS ARE SMART."

July 26, "CCC finished floor scraping. Cleaned house. Weeded and tilled soil around bushes and trees. Collected rocks for foundation. Jane Matthews brought in cat trap for skunks from Animal Control."

August 2, "CCC came for a day to do further work on the house foundation. Enough holes have been blocked so that the skunks have moved on."
