Co-Presidents' Message

Not only is it just the return of an important fund raiser for us but it is a great day to share with the community what it was like in the past in Chatsworth. Pioneer Day will be on Sunday, October 2nd this year and we are hoping for a successful event.

In the museum we are reorganizing some of our display cases. The new theme for the museum will be the Chatsworth tunnels with some rare photos of the building of the tunnel and the crew that worked on it. Minnie and her family were involved with the building of the tunnel. The Hill family gave Southern Pacific the rights to build the tunnel on the north crest of their property.

Minnie was quoted as saying, "My mother did the washing for the men who worked on the tunnel, and I had to sew home-made labels in the men's clothing so we could tell the clothes apart. We had a book, and each man had a number. As long as he was there, he had that same number. I kept them in a book. Sometimes my father would take the clothes back to the men or they would come and get them. My father had a wagon which he drove up there to the tunnel taking fresh fruit to sell to the men working on the tunnel." This quote was taken from an interview of Minnie Hill Palmer by Virginia Watson.

We also had work done on our septic tank last month. There were roots in the piping so it would back up. The bathroom was out of order because of this. We are good now, but it was a sizeable investment for us. There is always maintenance to do at the acre.

I hope you have a great rest of the summer and hope to see everyone at Pioneer Day.

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

OPEN HOUSE

We have enjoyed the opportunity to have our OPEN HOUSE events on the 1st Sunday of each month, and have been fortunate to have good weather for each. We gather outside under the shade of the tree just inside the gates and enjoy the company of all the members who join us for a casual afternoon. Usually something fun comes up to discuss and learn about.

In June, we had the opportunity to see the Graves Family 'rumpus room' door (picture below) from 22101 Tulsa Street at the Harry Graves Ranch. It was donated by Graves Family descendants.

Harry's daughters each married military men stationed in Chatsworth during WW2 and lived on sections of the original Harry Graves Ranch. Virginia Ditto, the daughter of Harry Graves, had 5 children, and was active with the Historical Society. Several family items have been donated over the years.

Graves Rumpus Room Door


In June, we had the opportunity to see the Graves Family door, donated by Graves Family descendants.

The story of the door at 22101 Tulsa Street at the Harry Graves Ranch follows: Harry Graves and Bonnie had two daughters, Bonnie Jean (1921-2007) and Virginia (1924-1995). Harry passed away in 1930, and their mother remarried Henry Heynemann in 1936. Henry was the engineer and architect responsible for the new 1935 Chatsworth Park Elementary building, after the previous building was condemned due to the 1933 Long Beach earthquake.

Henry did a property reconstruct/reconfiguration of Harry Graves Ranch, which had a very large garage in the 1920s, four stalls wide. When the daughters reached high school age, half of the garage was made into the 'rumpus room', where the girls entertained their Canoga Park High School classmates. The 'door' was the entry from the garage into the new room.

A significant date is April 1st, 1939, when the room was completed, and a party was held to celebrate, at which time guests signed the door. Over the years, other guests signed the door. Henry Heynemann was a craftsman, and used an engraving tool to etch the names into the door.

Some signatures below of "notable" names: Henry Heynemann, Virginia Graves, Bonnie Jean Graves, Catherine Mulholland, Cecil Graves, Bill Lakey, Eleanor Schepler, Bill "duck" Philbrook, Henry Ditto. Over 85 signatures have been counted on the door.





Bill Lakey, age 20, married Bonnie Jean Graves in 1942 they lived at 10869 Farralone Ave, Chatsworth, CA




Added at a later date... Henry Ditto born in 1944, son of Virginia Graves and Hubert Ditto

The Ditto Family lived at 11001 Farralone; Henry carved his name and address in the door at some later point in time. He carved "Henry Ditto, 11001 Farralone. Chatsworth, Calif." in the bottom section of the door.

GRAPEVINE PUBLICATIONS

While recently searching through our museum storage, we located a large cardboard box strapped together, deep under a shelf. The



box had the name "Newspapers Mrs. Johnson" on it and it contained... approximately 280 additional original Grapevines, most all addressed to the Johnson address, 10901 Santa Susana. What a find! It actually started with Volume 1, Issue 1 and spans most of 1954-1960.

A special thank you goes out to various members over the years that donated copies they had on hand. We had already scanned approximately 80 to date and posted them on our website under publications for everyone to enjoy. It gave us the ability to study them and realize the value they have to our history. This find takes us closer to a complete set. We have already started to catalogue and scan them so they can be optically searched for content.

Each Grapevine issue is about 16 pages each. The fun part of the Grapevines, is that they are focused on Chatsworth, Twin Lakes and Lake Manor with feature articles. Viola Haskell and Betty Straker printed their first issue on

December 1st, 1954 under the business name of West Valley Letters with a 10347 Jordan St address. Other editors stepped in over the years, but the concept was a newsy fun paper published twice a month. They included a feature article about local history and the early families, along with current events. They announced new birth arrivals, visiting family members, vacation plans and general fun neighborhood gossip. All of the local businesses advertised and a full center spread let you know what the grocery deals were at the local

Stoney Point History Program

On May 17th, we hosted both an in person and zoom meeting on Stoney Point History. The PowerPoint presentation has been posted on both the chatsworthhistory.com website and Slideshare.net for everyone to have access to. You will find Stoney Point Chatsworth Formation geology in our Chatsworth Timeline and also Stoney Point Native American Momonga artwork in our Apeta Momonga Mission Trail program. Some of the highlights include:

Earliest map with Stoney Point is the "1871 Plat of the Ex Mission de San Fernando."

The seven names of Stoney Point

Over the years Stoney Point has been referred to as a variety of names, some in error, but documented on postcards or stories.

1000 BC - Momonga

1797 - **Ranchería de las Piedras** ("Village of the Stones", Mission San Fernando registers)

1873 - **Castle Rock?** (per a 1948 Tiburcio Vasquez story, plus a 1935 postcard)


1906 – **Sugar Loaf Hill** (Charlton Quarry)

1912 – **Rocky Point** (Postcard)

1927-65 – **Stony Point** (1927 Stony Point

Rancho, 1948 4th of July BBQ at Stony Point)

1951 to today – **Stoney Point** (1951 Alward's Stoney Point Service, 1965 Stoney Point Ranch, 1982 Stoney Point Park)



In the 1910 Census they are retired in Pomona; however in a 1917 fire... all the heavy brush between the Iverson place and Stoney Point, and the Charlton apiary "just on the other side of the tunnel" was burned. The owners lost their house and almost a hundred hives of bees." In 1924 George Charlton passes in Pomona. In the 1920's there were new neighbors close by the property. Driscoll, Turner, Haworth, Wilson, & Johnson. In 1948 – Walter Lohman, realtor, purchased the upper portion of the homestead north of the tracks, see feature article below. In 1973 – it was owned by Leon Fenwick, called "The Ranch Club" summer day camp, 21523 San Fernando Mission. In 1981 – it became Chatsworth Hills Academy and now in 2020 – DNA Prep Academy owns the 16 acre campus, at 21523 Rinaldi Street.



Rock Climbing is a big part of Stoney Point. A unique trails map is in the presentation.








1950 Superman Serial Ch 1 Superman Flies Again Capturing Lex Luthor at his Stoney Point Hideout

Stoney Point Community events 1948-50 – American Legion 4th of July Parade, Carnival and BBQ at Stoney Point. The American Legion hosted this event for three years.



In 1996, Edwin Iverson gave a Slide Show Presentation to the Chatsworth Historical Society.

A part of that presentation were slides of the 1949 or 1950 Parade and Barbecue at Stoney Point.

In 1974 Stoney Point becomes Los Angeles Historic-Cultural Monument # 132.

In 1982 it is purchased and becomes a 22-acre City Park.

In 1999 an additional 52 acres are added to include the area north of Stoney Point up to the 118 freeway.

1950 Pony Rides on Devonshire – Walter P. Lohman by Ray Vincent

During our Stoney Point program in May, we discussed the previous residents of the Old Charlton Place, just northeast of Stoney Point (where today's <u>DNA Prep Academy</u> is located)

We reached out to Loxi Lohman, who grew up on the 55-acre ranch at 21521 Mission Rd, known to the Lohman family (Walter, wife Madge, Young Walter, and Loxi) as Rancho Las Pilitas. It was the upper portion of the Charlton Homestead, above the railroad tracks. She shared the following stories and photos with us. The family purchased the property in 1948, and renovated the house before moving from their home in Panorama City in 1949. Walter was a real estate broker and insurance salesman, focusing on land sales. In 1949 he built the two-store building below at 21715/21717 Devonshire Street, just west of Owensmouth (today's Country Squire Liquor store)




The 1950 West End Trading Post -- Madge, Young Walter, Loxi, and Walter Lohman

The September 1950 article in the Van Nuys News at right advertises free pony rides for the kids while parents are shopping in the West End Trading Post.

Walter also owned the vacant lot just west of the Trading Post, and that is where the Pony Rides were held.

In 1955, Walter built a second adjoining building west of the Trading Post (where the pony rides were), which is where today's Grooming and Upholstery shop are, right next to Country Squire Liquor. The Country Squire Liquor and Delicatessen opened in 1954.



YOUNG LADIES READY FOR PONY RIDE at West End Trading Post are Loxi Lohman, daughter of Walter P. Lohman, owner of store and Valley realtor, shown on left, Mary Morgan Hull, daughter of Thomas E. Hull, head of Hull Hotels, and Mrs. Hull. Lohman operates pictured corral with these gentle little mounts for enjoyment of small fry who may ride while parents are shopping in the popular "Old Time" store.

Mr. Lohman is adding three stores to his present building on Devonshire. A barber shop will be at the west end, Alma's Beauty Shop in the center, and possibly a western store; with the old-time facade extending the entire length of the building. Page 6 of the 1955-03-05 Grapevine discusses the second building west of the Trading Post, where the pony rides were held. And it mentions that the "old-time" façade extended the entire length of the building. I grew up in Chatsworth, and remember going to Johnny the Barber at the west end. And the 5 and dime was across the street.

Owensmouth, with the Chatsworth Inn and Cleaners where today's Cowboy Palace Saloon is. And in the distance are the Lohman Stores, which include the extension of the old-time façade.





At left is a close up of the businesses on the northwest corner of Owensmouth, with a Chevron gas station on the corner.

The "Country Squire" sign is seen on the extended façade. The buildings today have the same western façade, as seen below.



After Walter Lohman passed in 1959, the real estate office on the right became George C. Vincent Real Estate (he was my father).

In later years, Country Squire expanded and took over the real estate office on the right, and one of the three shops on the 1955 addition. Meanwhile, back at the ranch, the Lohman family was busy building their estate. The existing home on the property had a large 20 x 30' living room with wood paneling inside, a high wood ceiling, a corner fireplace,




and split brick flooring, with windows that wrapped all the way around it, all reasons to keep the room. The rest of the house was rebuilt.

It was a U-shaped house, with the backyard facing west with a Sycamore tree in the center. There was an eating table around the sycamore with barrel stools and a yellow rim on the lazy susan part of table.

The brick barbecue area had a sink, shelf area, barbecue, another shelf area above a warming oven, smoker oven, then a fireplace and next to that was an area to stack wood.

The hillside was covered with Geraniums.

Madge designed the pool, kicking around a garden hose until the shape was just right. Just west of the pool bordered by flagstone was a guest house/pool house, with a pool equipment room, a boy's changing room, and a one-bedroom guest room and women's changing room with attached bathroom.

ROY ROGERS TO MOVE HIS HOME TO CHATSWORTH

ENCINO — Western film actor Roy Rogers plans to sell his home at 5330 Amestoy Ave., Encino, and move to a Chatsworth ranch, Walter P. Lohman, Chatsworth realtor, announced today.

Rogers purchased a 130-acre ranch in the 22600 block of Lassen St., Chatsworth, and is schedlued to take possession of it on April 8, Lohman said. The realtor said the sales price was "over \$100,000."

The actor plans to make the ranch his home and also will use it for a picture-making location. The ranch was purchased from Max P. Schonfeld, manager of the 51st Agricultural District fair, Devonshire.

At left, a 1955-03-01 article from the LA Citizen News announcing that Roy Rogers bought his 130-acre ranch on Lassen/Andora from Max Schonfeld. Walter Lohman was the realtor. Max Schonfeld had owned the ranch since 1944, was the general manager of the annual San Fernando Valley fair at Devonshire Downs, and was the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce President in 1952.

Loxi was the same age as Linda Rogers, and the Rogers family visited often.

Walter Lohman passed in 1959. And in 1959 the family built a second home on the "upper" barn level of the property, with a bunkhouse and a pool, and turned the barn into an apartment for Loxi. That address was 21523 Mission Rd.


BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

Swimming and barbequed filet steaks and all the trimmings were the order of the day, enjoyed by Mssrs. and Mmes. Hutchinson of Rim Rock Ranch, Lou Vollmers of 10949 Andora, the Arthur Herpolsheiners from Northridge Estates and Bob Dennis.

The Lohmans are enjoying a leisurely vacation - spent four days down at Del Mar, returning in the evening of August 21st, with the thrill of having won on a couple of long shots. Last week they spent a couple of days at Catalina.

In 1960 the family sold the lower 8 acres with main house, pool, bathhouse and orange grove (21521 Mission Rd.) to the Bill Castonguay family, who owned a restaurant in San Fernando.



Today, the 21521 main house is gone, as is the orange grove. What remains is the flagstone outline of the pool, as seen circled in blue at left from a 1956 aerial (house circled in yellow), and below circled in blue from 2022 Google Earth.
