PIONEER DAY 2022

October 2022 Pioneer Day was a wonderful success!

This year was very successful...and we have so many people to thank that made this a fun family community event. The purpose of the Pioneer Day event is to educate our community about the history of Chatsworth. Our museum was staffed with docents guiding guests through the timeline of photos and artifacts on display. Starting with set-up, our thanks go out to Bill Dushman, John Kuhn, Terry Tanner, Donna Nachtrab and Linda van der Valk and Jelena Csanyi along with Ray and Ann Vincent who helped get everything set up on Saturday morning. Early Saturday morning, the JNROTC cadets from El Camino Real High School arrived to help setup tables, chairs and canopies. On Sunday, El Camino Cadets worked all day managing our parking lot under the supervision of Bill Dushman, John Kuhn; Tom Nachtrab

managed the shuttle bus pickup at the depot. They also arrived early enough to help us get our canopies raised.

Always a big draw is the Standke family at the blacksmith/baking station. Dr. Standke was unable to be here as our blacksmith, but Nita Standke baked and taught everyone how to churn butter!

Gold panning is always one of the most popular events, sponsored by Keene Engineering of Chatsworth, who donates the gold dust -- each child takes home a small vial of real gold.



Our Snack Bar is courtesy of the van der Valk family, who purchase and then donate all the proceeds to the Homestead Acre. They have plenty of friends and family to run the food booth including Gary Bercow, Rick and Jerry, daughter Linda and grand-daughter Hunter.

Thank you to all of them.

Chatsworth is such a close-knit community, almost every volunteer group that comes to display or provide activities are also members of the Chatsworth Historical Society.

The Quilting-4-Others group that runs our children's quilting booth is sponsored by the San Fernando Quilting Association. Children's activity quilts were created with each child receiving a raffle ticket for two donated quilts. The SSMPA was represented by Warren Stone and Sky Valley Volunteers was on hand with John Luker spreading the word about Acorn planting.

We had a new member participate, Duke Mulholland, who shared his fossils that had been collected here in Chatsworth.

Cub Scout Troop 226 joined us for the day, teaching knot tying and much more.

The Valley Hive brought a display bee hive teaching how the homesteaders would have honey. Also, members of our Pioneer Church were on hand, The Standing Bear Trading Post taught leatherwork, and the Foundation for the Preservation of the Santa Susana Mountains were there with their Stagecoach used for 3rd grade interpretive hikes in the State Park. This was fun for all. Thank you to Terry Tanner with his pulley display, Bob Dager and all the FPSSM volunteers that shared that history during the day.

Anderson Family Buggy Carriage Story The following article was written by Ron Anderson...

In 1966, Ralph "Art" Anderson was told about a historic, horse-drawn buggy that was in a field for years in pieces in Hollister Ranch in Santa Barbara.



Being in the automotive business with Art's Towing and Goleta Auto Body and Salvage, and a collector of vintage autos, Art was interested in a mode of transportation even older than his oldest car. He went to the field and collected all the pieces. He brought them to a local restorer known as "Buffalo Bill" who was a traditional cowboy at the time. The project of restoration began and to everyone's surprise all the pieces were there as some were buried under weeds and dirt. In spite of it laying in ruin in the field for so many

years, the pieces were in fairly good condition. It was painstakingly reconstructed,

and Art placed it as a historical conversation piece in the front yard of the family home in Goleta.

Art passed away in 1970, and when his widow Norma remarried and moved the family to Chatsworth, the buggy was transported by moving van to again hold court in the front yard of the family home. Over the years, repairs were made to the wheels and supports were added to hold its weight off the ground.



For 50 years, it was a fixture on Kinzie Street (photo above), surviving earthquakes, animals and rambunctious children. It was always a family tradition to take a photo in front of the buggy. Following the passing of Norma Anderson Burns in 2016 and then her husband Gail Burns in 2021, the children, Ron Anderson and Julie Anderson Moore, donated the buggy on behalf of the Burns Family Trust to the Chatsworth Historical Society. The family is thrilled and grateful that it will continue to be on display and appreciated for years to come (photo of the buggy at Pioneer Day at right).

Ackerman Visit At Pioneer Day, we were visited by John Ackerman and his wife Stephanie. John



donated to us an excellent circa 1905 studio photo of his great-great grandfather Frank Ackerman with his wife Ruth Hill Ackerman and their 4 sons.

Frank and his wife Ruth Homesteaded the 42 acres south of the Hill Homestead in 1899, they had cattle on the ranch. Ruth was the oldest daughter of Homesteaders James and Rhoda Hill of today's Homestead Acre in Chatsworth Park South.

Frank had the livery stable on Los Angeles St and 6th, and died at age 58 in the flu epidemic of 1918 in the Boyle Heights area.

John shared with us that Graaf was the welterweight champion of the pacific fleet.

Lounsbery Visit On October 4th, the Lounsbery family (Ken, Andrea and John) visited the Acre, and shared some memories. The family lived in Winnetka Estates from 1950 to 1980. What brought them to the Acre is that Minnie Hill Palmer "Mrs. Palmer" would babysit them at the Acre in the mid 1950's. This was before and after the bathroom was installed, which means the outhouse "was all there was" before water was piped to the house by 1956. They couldn't quite agree on where the outhouse was located, thinking perhaps at the southwest corner of the property.



The <u>Aqua Sierra Sportsmans Club</u> began leasing the Hill Homestead in 1951, and in 1955/56 Heinrich Berkenkamp of Oroweat Bakeries (who also lived in Winnetka Estates) purchased the 229 acre Hill Homestead. The deed granted a life tenancy agreement for Minnie to live rent and tax free at her 1913 cottage and surrounding 1.3-acre grounds. Celebrities at the club included Clark Gable, Roy Rogers, Robert Taylor, Robert Stack, Robert Sterling, John Wayne, Charlton Heston, Walter Brennan. In 1958 there were over 200 paying members at the Aqua Sierra Sportsmans Club.

The Lounsberys aren't quite sure how their parents ended up meeting Minnie, but suspect it was due to the connection with Berky")

their neighbor Heinrich Berkenkamp (known as "Berky").

The cottage looked pretty much the same to them, and the piano was in the right spot. Andrea remembers signed photographs of movie stars above the piano, which makes sense with the celebrities at Aqua Sierra. There was a summer kitchen south of the cottage, just a small building with a stove to keep from heating up the house during the summer. That was where Minnie did all of her canning. They remembered picking fresh asparagus in the field east of the acre. John remembers fishing in the fishing lake but didn't realize he had to pay for anything he caught.

Andrea explained that there was a row of hollyhocks parallel to and east of the cottage about ten feet. Ann mailed Andrea some hollyhock seeds from the Acre, and below is Andrea's reply:

I'm very grateful to have her hollyhock seeds. Thank you so very much. If you research her grandparent's covered wagon journey, there should be an interesting story connected to the seeds. When people left their homeland, they would take cuttings and seeds with them so that they could be buried on "familiar ground"....even though they are far from home. Mrs. Palmer felt that the hollyhocks anchored her to her pioneer past. Very sweet.

Before my mother's passing, we took her on a little Mother's Day Santa Rosa trip to a farm of ancient roses gathered from cemeteries and all over the world. It's only open to visitors once a year and the guide helped us understand how the roses told history.

I can see why the hollyhocks meant so much to Mrs. Palmer.

Andrea went home and searched for a hand tatted doily wedding gift that Minnie Palmer made for her in October, 1966. *My daughter has one that she will not give up, but if you want to display this in her home, I will send it to you (photo at right).*

Note: Their father John Lounsbery (1911-1976) was an American animator and director who worked for Walt Disney Productions. He is best known as one of Disney's Nine Old Men, and was named a Disney Legend in 1989.



Rockpointe Townhomes History Presentation

Our October presentation, <u>Rockpointe Townhomes History</u>, discussed the history of the 90-acre, 739-unit townhome community just east of the Acre, at Devonshire and Valley Circle. The most enjoyable part about these presentations is getting the opportunity to contact the descendant of the person you are researching, and having them share their stories and photographs with us.

We had good luck with stories on the Shadwicks (Gray Family), The Long family, the Haberfelds, and the Roy Rogers Sports Center. Just a few weeks before the presentation, we were able to locate Hutchinson descendants, specifically his grandson Robert Hutchinson, who shared the photos below with us.



Robert's grandfather was B.N. (Brubaker) Hutchinson (1898-1964), who owned the 43-acre Rim Rock Ranch, which became the Rockpointe Development south of Devonshire. B.N Hutchinson became the honorary mayor of Chatsworth in 1954, succeeding actor Lionel Barrymore. He was the mayor for two years and left for Seattle. And was followed by Roy Rogers and Dale Evans, who were co-mayors from 1956 to 1965.

The recent "rediscovery" of the Chatsworth Grapevines provided us with some great stories of that transition, when community meetings and banquets were held in the Chatsworth Center (today's Jehovah's Witness Hall site on Topanga just north of Devonshire).
