


The cottage and museum will be used for staging the Fashion Show and will not be available for tours.

Gwendolyn Romani Painting Donation – Burro Flats Painted Cave

In December, Albert Knight donated a lithograph from the Estate of Gwen Romani, an accomplished archeologist. Gwen had carefully photographed the cave at Burro Flats back in 1981 and used those photographs to create the lithograph below.



Burro Flats Painted Cave - The painting is an artistic depiction of the sacred rock art at the Burro Flats site, located in the Simi Hills. It is a famous and important site, because it was designed and used by local Native Americans as an astronomical site to define the Winter Solstice.

Gwendolyn Romani, one of the archaeologists who studied the site, is the artist who created the painting. Although she passed away in 2018, the Gwendolyn Roxanne Romani Trust now owns the copyright to the original art and the digital file of the photograph taken of her original painting.

We are honored to have this artwork, and are planning to have it framed for display in the Museum.

Gwen and her husband, John, also introduced Dr. Edwin C. Krupp, Director of the Griffith Park Observatory in Los Angeles, to the site.


Movie Serial History

Movie serials date back to the silent era, with The Perils of Pauline (1914), The Exploits of Elaine, and The Hazards of Helen (119 12-minute episodes from 1914-17).

Flash Gordon was a 1936 movie serial with 13 episodes, featuring Buster Crabbe on the Planet Mongo. It was reissued as Rocketship in 1949.

The movie serial, or chapter play, was a popular motion picture form during the 1930s to 1950s.

Each chapter was screened at a movie theater for one week, and ended with a **cliffhanger**, in which characters found themselves in perilous situations with little apparent chance of escape.



History of Superman

Superman is a superhero who first appeared in DC Comics, Action Comics #1, in 1938

Radio - From 1940 to 1951 the radio show *Adventures of Superman* ran for 2,088 episodes, a five-a-week, 15-minute series.

Film, *Animated Shorts* – From 1941 to 1943, 17 animated episodes were made, each 8 to 10 minutes long. The episodes are on <u>YouTube</u>. The first episode begins with the well-known phrase, "Up in the sky, look! It's a bird, it's a plane, it's Superman!".

Film, *Live Action Movie Serials* – 1948 and 1950, Kirk Alyn as Superman, 15 chapters each year totaling 30.




Television, *Adventures of Superman* – 1952 to 1958, George Reeves as Superman, a total of 104 episodes.

Big-budget movies – 1978 to 1987, Superman, Superman II, III and IV, Christopher Reeve as Superman

Episodes Filmed in Chatsworth

The 1948 movie serial Superman portrayed Kirk Alyn as the first actor to portray Superman on the screen. It was the most profitable movie serial in history.

In 1950, a sequel serial Atom Man vs. Superman was released. Each serial had 15 chapters for a total of 30 chapters. 29 of the 30 movie serial chapters have scenes filmed in Chatsworth. We have published those scenes on a <u>YouTube Playlist</u> on our YouTube channel.




Kirk Alyn in a promotional photo At Saddlehorn Rock Iverson Ranch

Over the years, the many unique rock formations of Iverson Ranch have been "named" by the Iverson family and subsequent movie historians, for either the descriptive nature of the feature, or the famous actor or movie that is associated with it. Examples are the Tower and the Sphinx, and Lone Ranger Rock.

Many thanks to Dennis Liff who provided details of the rock structures and shooting locations identified in each scene. Our PowerPoint presentation identifies further filming information and location for each scene, with links to Dennis' website.

1953 Adventures of Superman Screenshots in Chatsworth

The 1952 to 1958 Adventures of Superman television show had six episodes with scenes filmed in Chatsworth. All of the scenes were in Season 2, originally airing in 1953.

The scenes were not as extensive as the scenes in the 1948 and 1950 movie serials, but are also included at the end of the <u>YouTube Playlist</u>

1948 Superman Serial Screenshots in Chatsworth – Chapter 1 and 2

We all know that Superman came from the planet Krypton and was adopted by the Kent family, but did you know that his rocket ship actually landed in Chatsworth. In the first Episode, Chapter 1, he rescues his father from a dangerous tornado in Upper Iverson Ranch.


After growing up in Chatsworth, he leaves home for the ATSWORTH train station to head to Metropolis, but finds that the train will derail unless Superman saves the day.

Research on State Parks property- another piece to the puzzle!


Our February General meeting will feature the History of the Santa Susana Pass Historic State Park (SSPSHP). While looking through the many boxes of materials regarding the land acquired, we found a missing piece of our Chatsworth history puzzle. We had read stories by Bob Turner about a famous white horse in Chatsworth in the Stoney Point area, but finally learned the story and who owned him.

The first land purchase for the State Park was the 265-acre Nichols property in 1977. This land was once a part of Charles and Florence Mattingly's combined 320-acre homestead, which included land that is a part of the 1895 Chatsworth Grade Road, named El Camino Nuevo in the Park.

In the SSPSHP Nichols property folder, Elizabeth Nichols (the daughter of Charles and Florence Mattingly), in a letter of March 1, 1974, spoke of her childhood in Chatsworth. "We are enjoying perfect weather here in Alamos (Sonora, Mexico). Alamos is surrounded by very beautiful mountains, and reminds me a little of my early experience on the ranch in the Santa Susana Mountains. When we were children our father owned, in addition to the land we now hold, all of the property bought by Mr. Retz, as well as over one hundred acres, on the other side of the road which is now owned by John Brandeis and is the west end of his ranch. Papa sold all of this property to a cowboy actor named Fred Thomson, who had a famous white horse. It has changed hands several times since. I hope the Brandeis ranch is still intact. It is very beautiful property too."

Fred Thomson (1890-1928) was an American silent film cowboy who rivaled Tom Mix in popularity before dying at age 38 of tetanus. And Fred Thomson was the owner of Silver King.

Silver King the Wonder Horse, "The Horse with a Personality", was a white Palomino of seventeen hands height. He performed at major rodeos and headlined as the equine star of western movies between 1924 and 1937. In addition to the standard duties assigned stunt horses, Silver King was



Fred Thomson is interred in Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Glendale. The pallbearers at his funeral included Harold Lloyd, Charles Ferrell, Douglas Fairbanks, and George W Hill. Honorary pallbearers included Buster Keaton and movie mogul Joseph M. Schenck.

Editor's Note: Buster Keaton filmed in Chatsworth (<u>train depot water tank</u>) in 1924 Sherlock Holmes Jr, and jumped off of <u>parachute rock</u> (just east of the Mattingly Homestead) in 1922 Paleface. Harold Lloyd <u>decorated his estate in Beverly Hills</u> with 3,500 tons of Chatsworth Sandstone. Perhaps they were introduced/visited at Chatsworth with their friend Fred Thomson?





Rose Pruning Event held January 28th



We were delighted to invite the Rose Society and their members to assist us in the Garden with our annual maintenance of over 100 rose bushes. David Bassani, president of the association, stepped up to the task of helping us improve our display by heading out to Green Thumb and returning with a new climbing rose bush to replace one on our arch trellis that was not doing well. On Friday a week later, he donated two more roses which have now been planted in front of the museum. For those of you (including myself) not versed in rose bushes...they each have names. The climbing rose is a "Colette", it is pink with a strong citrus scent and should grow to cover the full side of the arch. The two additional roses donated included a beautiful yellow rose named "Gina Lollobrigida" and a pink by the name of "Perfume Delight".

Each of the main rose gardens were skillfully pruned by expert rose pruners while the rest of us, not so skilled...picked up cuttings and cleaned up. Thank you to everyone who participated!!
