

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING OPEN HOUSE Guests

Our Open House events the first Sunday of each month have continued to bring new people to the Acre. We have been hosting up to 40 people each month, but recently in June we provided tours to over 70 guests during the 1-4 time slot.

Ancient Peoples of the Channel Islands



In April, we shared the Documentary: Ancient Peoples of the Channel Islands.

Beginning with the discovery of the oldest human remains ever found in North America – 13,000 year old Arlington Springs Man

to the true story of the Lone Woman of San Nicolas – the inspiration for the best-selling children's book Island of the Blue Dolphins.

Evidence that people had arrived on Santa Rosa Island 13,000 years ago demonstrates that watercraft were in use along the California coast at that early date. This leads to a theory that the earliest peoples to enter the Western Hemisphere may have migrated along the Pacific coast from Siberia and Alaska using boats, along the "Kelp Highway".

Although we are not able to post West of the West, Tales from California's Channel Islands, Part 1 on our YouTube channel, the DVD is available for purchase, or can be viewed by borrowing it from the Los Angeles Public Library, or you can buy the episode from Amazon Prime Video for \$0.99.

Our Rose Gardens exploded with full bloom on schedule for the event. Thanks to the San Fernando Valley Rose Society for pruning our Rose Gardens in January which made a difference for this event. As a fundraiser, it was successful since we were fortunate to sell out our tickets two weeks before the event. Our goal was to limit the attendance to 75 guests to be seated at tables in the shade of the walnut tree in the center of the Acre. This made it possible to have all of our parking on site at the grass lot adjacent to the Acre. The parking lot was set up and supervised by John Kuhn, Bill Dushman, Terry Tanner and Ray Vincent, who made sure Handicap places were available and helped coordinate easy drop-offs at the gate.

We were fortunate to have our tickets available in advance through our website on PayPal and by mail. Check in was easy with our two gate keepers Donna Boswell and Wendi Gladstone with a prepaid ticket list prepared by our ticket coordinator Donna Nachtrab.

As our guests arrived, they were greeted by Linda van der Valk and Carol Lucas at our Chatsworth History table, sharing information about our Homestead Acre. Guests were encouraged to walk around our beautiful gardens, listen to harp music and enjoy the dessert buffet.

The Vintage Fashion Show started at 1:15 giving everyone time to settle in and find a seat. Ann Vincent welcomed everyone and introduced each model, providing a time period, appropriate music and a description of their outfit. In addition, a tidbit or two of time period Chatsworth history was included as our models walked around the large walnut tree so the guests could enjoy their outfits.



Our models included representatives from organizations throughout Chatsworth hand picked for just the right outfit. Most of the outfits were selected from our museum collection that has been acquired over time. Some of the dresses were time period costumes created and donated for our docents while some dresses were originals donated by local Chatsworth families. A few of the outfits modeled belong to our society members personal collections provided for the event. The fashion show couldn't have happened without the help of our coordinators Jennifer Romano and Angela Rochetti who made sure the models were ready and on cue for their introductions.

A special thank you to historical society members Sue O'Connor, Donna Nachtrab, Donna Boswell and Jelena Csanyi who helped transport dress forms, boxes of items and clothing racks to the cottage where we could work on them for a few months determining what to use. Now that we have improved our inventory of items on hand...we plan to focus next year's fashion show around wedding dresses.

This fashion show and inventory challenged me to learn much more than I knew about fashion. I spent late nights studying websites on fashion history and hoping I could gather enough to make our show interesting. I will share what I learned for our show as I introduce the participants below.



Victorian Era starting 1820

1860 through 1880 Civil War era

1880's - 1900's Pioneer Dress

Our Docent Pioneers are wearing what is known as a wash dress, with aprons worn to protect their clothes. The one-piece dress could easily be washed as needed and the aprons had multiple uses throughout the day.



1910 Clothing Trends

Barbara Pampalone. Barbara has been a member of our Chatsworth community and many of its organizations since 1967. This silk floral print has a tight waistline of that time period and the bodice is shaped with whalebone stays showing off the bodice. Tops were loose and blousy helping to emphasize a top-heavy shape. Sleeves were also dramatic and long, heavy skirts were enhanced with frilly petticoats. Day dresses emphasized modesty, covering the body from neck to the floor with long sleeves covering the arms.

This dress was donated by Valeta Koller of the Butler Family. We found just the right hat and beaded bag to complete the outfit.

Let have some fun with the Roaring 20's




Anne Hughes, one of our docents is sporting this fun and fabulous Flapper dress of the 1920's. This floral print dress is made of chiffon with a neutral color slip beneath it. During that time period, waistlines had dropped to hip level, hiding natural curves for a tubular look. Young, very fashionable 'flappers' wore their hems at knee level, with neutral colored stockings and colorful garters.

The Big Band era brings us to the 1930s

Emily of Chatsworth High School would have enjoyed an evening of dancing wearing this black velvet floor length evening gown with a sleeveless lace bodice. It includes a velvet matching jacket with a quilted collar and shoulder pads.

1930's & 40's brought us Movies on the Silver Screen...

Representing our Western Heritage, are Daphne & Daisy with their horse Bam Bam. Grandpa Andre van der Valk was wrangling Bam Bam to make sure he behaved.





In 1942 during WW2 - Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service aka WAVES



Ann is wearing a 1942 WAVES uniform worn by Valeta Koller, the grand-daughter of James Butler who played an early role in the citrus industry here in Chatsworth and built the shopping center on Devonshire and Canoga.

We would like to thank the Chatsworth Chapter DAR for donating flags for everyone. Valeta Koller was issued 3 uniforms a Seersucker working uniform, dress blue wool jacket and skirt and white dress jacket and skirt along with a long wool coat, all donated to our museum.



The 1950's brought us Poodle skirts!

Cindy Lerma and her two children Julie and James. Cindy is wearing a Chatsworth High Lettergirl's sweater, while the Letterman's jacket she is carrying belongs to her Dad, Ray Vincent. James makes an excellent tough escort for the two ladies.



Bianca of Chatsworth High School looks like she stepped out of the 60's with her flowers and long flowing dress.

OK...Lets just call this the Hippie Period –The San Fernando Valley was the location of one of the largest events of that time period. Devonshire Downs, previously a race track on Devonshire just west of Zelzah, hosted the Newport Pop Festival in the summer of 1969 with over 200,000 young people attending over a 3-day period. It hosted stars including Jimi Hendrix, Jethro Tull and Joe

Cocker. Devonshire Downs continued to host major performers through the 1980's. The property is currently part of California State University Northridge.





1970's had a style of its own



Allyn, Gaby and Marlee of Chatsworth High School are here to show off their 70's attire. The two mini-skirts dresses in the bright colors of the 60/70's are worn by Allyn and Gaby. Andrea Rochetti donated this authentic leather jacket for Marlee to wear with her bell bottom pants.

Yes the 70s had a wide variety of styles from party wear worn on nights out, to bright colorful clothes. Women's disco style was typically flared pants, cape-like sleeves, tube tops, and bright colors.

The 1980s arrived with some fun workout clothes and fitness programs. Sportswear Workout Fashion took off...

Ali of Chatsworth High School is a champion of physical fitness. The 1980's continued a trend of sportswear but made it extra bright and colorful. Now women were seen in bright-colored leotards with tights and leg warmers.

In Tribute to John Thorpe –1937-2023

John Thorpe passed away on May 10, $20\overline{23}$ at the age of 86. He has been an active member of our Chatsworth community for the past 51 years.



John was born in Sheffield, England. Sheffield, England is only 17 miles from Chatsworth House. Our Chatsworth CA was founded in 1888 and named after the Duke of Devonshire's estate, Chatsworth House.

Zena and John originally met when they were 18 and 20 years old. He did his military service as one of the last conscripts in Britain when he was 21. Following military service, John moved to the US in 1964. In 1967 they renewed contact when Zena moved to the US. They returned to England for their wedding and their marriage was announced in 1968 on the BBC Northern News.

In 1972 John founded his auto repair shop, Yorks & Lancs, on Canoga Avenue, specializing in the repair of English cars, but qualified to repair all makes. As of 2023, that would now be 51 years in business. John and Zena have two sons and two daughters. Oliver and Johnny assisted him as highly skilled auto mechanics and now own the business. Their daughters are Kathryn and Alice. There are four grandchildren in the Thorpe family.

For the Chatsworth Branch Library, in 1985, John organized a Meet the Author fundraiser event with author Ray Bradbury which filled the Lawrence Junior High auditorium. He helped get our Chatsworth Chats Newsletter started and he took a strong lead in making sure our library was represented in the Library System, helping to get our new library on the list for new construction. The question was should we build a new larger library on new land or have the city buy land adjacent to the existing small one and build bigger. We were delighted with the second option being chosen and our new library was completed in 2005. We all benefitted from the committee work and meetings John participated in to help us get where we are

today.

Both John and Zena have also been involved with the annual parades since they

moved here, and every year, John made sure there was a sports car ready for him to drive honoring someone in the community to be represented. He and Zena would participate in the parade representing the Chatsworth Historical Society or help build floats for the Docents to ride in.

The 1903 Pioneer Church was also one of their passions. It was relocated to the Oakwood Cemetery by the Chatsworth Historical Society in 1965.

In January of 1988, Zena sent a letter inviting the Duke of Devonshire to our Centennial Celebration; she got a reply personally and one addressed to the Citizens of Chatsworth. Zena stayed connected to the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, becoming the US distributor of the Duchess of Devonshire's Chatsworth Food. This included tea, jams, puddings and more.

Always active in the community, John was selected as Citizen of the Year in 1992.

John was the President of the Chatsworth Historical Society from 1997-2000, spearheading the plans for the 2000



California Sesquicentennial celebration here in Chatsworth. He and Zena worked together making it one of the major events held in Los Angeles to celebrate 150 years of statehood. Zena coordinated the making of the California Sesquicentennial Quilt which was gifted to the people of California. The quilt was created by 300 quilters throughout California. It is now used during special ceremonies in the rotunda of the Capitol Building.

With a new library in 2005, John helped create our Book Club, coordinated our Library Book Store, participated in Giant Book Sales, and worked with Zena to select movies for our monthly Library Movie event once a month.

John will be greatly missed by Zena, his family and the many community organizations of Chatsworth.



WESTERN FUN filmed in Chatsworth

Our May general meeting featured the TV westerns Fury and stop action movie Blaze Glory, along with Mattel's Blaze the galloping horse all filmed in Chatsworth.

BLAZE GLORY



Tony Krizan, a friend of member Wendi Gladstone, shared this movie with us. Tony is one of the henchmen, wearing the reddish-brown vest and dark green shirt.

He explained that most of the filming was within the mountains surrounding Chatsworth Park South.

The technique used in the film is stopmotion pixilation, written and directed by Chuck Menville and others. Chuck also plays the lead as Blaze Glory.

The film was first advertised at the Bruin Theatre in Westwood in December 1968. In December 1969, it was seen on the Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour. It is fun to watch this 10-minute film, 1968 Blaze Glory, posted on our YouTube channel chatsworthhistory1

BLAZE Commercial

I came across this commercial, "filmed" at Iverson Ranch, searching for "Blaze" on YouTube (looking for Blaze Glory)

This commercial used Iverson Ranch footage as a background for the chase scene...


FURY 1955-1960
