Mrs. Cleo Sunde and Mrs. Katharine Johnson introduced the honored guests, members of the Press from Valley Times, Los Angeles Times, Valley Green Sheet, Pink Sheet and our own Lorna Ahlstrom from The Grapevine.

Mr. Victor Squires from the Southern California Gas Co. introduced Mr. John Baird, speaker of the day, who spoke on "Here Comes Beethoven". He spoke informally and humorously on the nature and personalities of some of our great music composers.

He touched on what pressures shaped the music of a certain era and how music was originally supported by the rulers of countries, gradually moved to the aristocracy, then to the common people and from there to business and industry. An example of this is the

Southern California Gas Co. and their Evening Concert Series presented nightly except Sunday over KFAC from 8 to 10 p.m.

Mr. Baird related a few of the more human incidents which some of the composers had - how some were poor and starving through their misuse and extravagant use of funds rather than non-support by their public.

Beethoven's fondness for Viennese noble-women - Berlioz' emotional relations to other people - Liszt with his 88 children, being very exceptional considering the fact he was never married, and also that he established his genius before he stopped playing for the public at the age of 37 - extravagant Wagner who always wore silk - all these combined with other little facts, made for a thoroughly enjoyable talk, uniquely presented by Mr. Baird.

He also mentioned some of our newer musical artists - how Kirsten Flagstad, who is in her middle 60s, likes to sing with Lawrence Melchior because of his relaxed approach - and how Grace Moore was very temperamental.

He previewed a few of the coming evening concerts. The Opera performances are always on Saturday night and they try to have the very latest recordings of the operas to use.

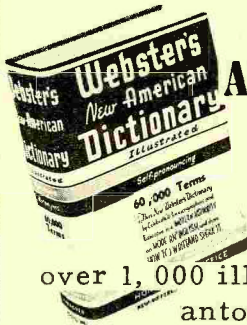
