The only salvation for the farmer is organization and cooperation.

Hon. James W. Gerard, former United States Ambassador to Germany, said, during a recent address in Los Angeles: "The Congress of the United States has declared war. HIGH PRICES FOR CALIFORNIA WALNUTS

The highest prices ever fixed for walnuts in Southern California were set Tuesday by the California Walnut Growers meeting in Los Angeles. Following are the prices: No. 1, 21¢ cents a pound; No. 2, 17¢ cents; Jumboes, 25¢ cents; Diamond Buds, 25¢ cents; and Golden State Buds, 22¢ cents. The value of the crop was placed at \$6,000,000.

Announcement was made this week of the incorporation of the firm, Streeter & Riddle, with a capitalization of \$25,000, and with \$12,500 subscribed; Among the stockholders are A. E. Streeter, A. C. Riddle, and Brandon Bruner. The firm will engage in the handling of farm machinery and implements.—Van Nuys News.

Three Methods of Derision.

COURT TRIALS IN ITALY.

The Criminal Code There is Utterly Different From Ours.

Criminal court trials in Italy are conducted under a very simple system, though utterly different from the system which governs procedure in American or English courts, says an expert.

The trial takes place before three judges and a jury, to which are added a certain number of extra jurors, who are sworn and are present in court to hear the testimony and are held ready to take the place in the jury box of any juror who may in the course of the trial be incapacitated from further service. The depositions of all the witnesses have been taken in writing and signed before the trial begins. Each of the judges has a copy of these before him. The prosecutor and the counsel for the accused furnish to the court a list of the witnesses they desire called, and these are all summoned by the court, which has power to punish nonattendance.

The first thing that happens when the trial begins is the questioning of the accused by the presiding justice. In Italy, as in most of central Europe, a man accused of a crime is considered by the law to be the very best witness to his own guilt or innocence. In England and America the accused need not testify unless he chooses. In Italy he is the first and most important witness.

The accused is allowed the widest scope in defending himself. He is a right to tell his own story in his own way, to offer anything he can in the way of justification or palliation. Even hearsay evidence is admissible. The judge has absolute discretion as to what testimony may be received and what excluded, and any judge who exercised this discretion unfairly would be an object of execration. Bias on the part of one judge is possible, but there are always the other two judges on the bench with him, and they are a perfect check against unfairness.

When the accused has given his testimony he is confronted personally by his accuser. The accuser is necessarily the principal witness against him. Strictly speaking, the prisoner has no right to interrupt his accuser while the latter is telling his story, but in practice the judge permits it, and the confrontation sometimes becomes a three-cornered debate between accuser, accused and judge, the latter giving the accused the widest leeway to demonstrate his innocence.—Case and Comment.

Source of Ivory.

Ivory is a hard substance, not unlike bone, of which the teeth of most animals chiefly consist, the dentine or tooth substance which in transverse section shows three of different color running in circular arcs. It is used extensively for industrial purposes and is derived from the elephant, walrus, hippopotamus, narwhal and some other animals. The ivory of the tusks of the African elephant is held in the highest estimation by manufacturers. The tusks vary in size, ranging from a few ounces in weight to 170 pounds. Holtzapffel states that he saw fossil tusks on the banks of rivers of northern Siberia which weighed 186 pounds each. Ivory is simply tooth substance of exceptional hardness, toughness and elasticity.—Book of Woods.

Johnnie on the Spot.

The young teacher who has been having a trying time with his native study class because Johnnie had discovered he knew more than she did about birds and frogs and had assumed a derisive attitude in consequence. He appealed to the man principal, who replied: "Next time you have the class let me know, and I'll come in and take charge of it. I think I can settle Johnnie."

He was duly called in, and all went well at first. With confidence the principal said at the conclusion of the lesson, "Now you may ask me one question." Johnnie had been silent up to this time. When it came his turn he rose and asked, "Has a duck eye brown?"—New York Times.

Dark Ages.

The dark ages was the period of European history beginning with the irruption of barbarian hordes before the fall of the western Roman empire (A. D. 476), extending to the Italian Renaissance (thirteenth century) and characterized by the decay of civilization.

Ancient Carls.

The island of Carls claims a marvellous history antedating that of Athens. According to tradition, this was the land of the Phoenicians, and here Ulysseus landed in the course of his wanderings, and on this same shore the delightful story had its setting, which Homer tells of, how the hero received much needed hospitality and kindness at the hands of Nausicaa, the daughter of King Alcimus—perhaps the most beautiful episode in all the "Odyssey." Indeed to this two islands close to the shores of Carls belong the honors of being the ship of Ulysseus turned into stone.

Electrical Oscillations.

Half a dozen years ago first produced rapid electrical oscillations and showed that they traveled through space with the speed of light and reappeared as electrical oscillations and sparks in suitably arranged conductors at a distance. Starting with waves twenty feet long in air and oscillating 50,000,000 times a second, he worked down to waves one-tenth as long and ten times as rapid.

ARMAGEDDON

JOSH Billings would say, "what use is there in knowing so much when that which we do know isn't so?" So with you. You get out in the morning and move around a few minutes to an hour and you begin to feel hungry; and yet it isn't hunger, it's the "You ate biscuits, cake, fried potatoes and coffee for supper and it laid cold and fermented in the stomach all all day long, so that your stomach is sore and weak and your movements irritate it." Your stomach walls are like a patch of sunburned skin. Supper food is a real sunburn by the energy that is in the food and no muscle action to carry it away. And the blistering matter gets into the blood and goes everywhere, so that you are a little sore all over.

I am not writing these articles because I understand medicine but to show how the body is like a live vegetable. The body is made of killing the vegetables and fruits so that they are healthy and then eating them we will continue in health. The body is a vegetable organism. After food has been consumed by an animal it is changed from vegetable into animal nature. Animal consumes vegetable and vegetable consumes animal. Thus if we eat vegetable it consumes the weaker part out of our muscles.

Vegetate is to develop on water. Oats and soy leavening agents. Grains and seeds are dead. They stimulate life into action but the life comes from the water with which they are mixed. If we use grains in place of vegetable we shorten life because grains use atmospheric moisture. Atmospheric moisture contracts the cells while water expands the cells. If you want more health and strength drink more water. Ripening honey red changes it from a contractive into an expansive food.

You don't need much more of red ripe honey than you would use of pepper or salt, but that little is imperative, to correct the faulty variety of digestive organs. The same as we would select seeds to plant in our garden. Without the correction all sorts of germs start in to digest the food, some high and some low, and the different germs oppose each other and fight it out to the bitter end; and that is what makes the air of your bedroom so bitter and stinky as you get out of bed in the morning.

The rising sun kills its foul germs and the bad smell disappears. You suppose that the foul gas went out the door or window, but it didn't. The germs (bacteria) simply developed their seeds (spores) and will be calmly waiting to go down your throat when you get into bed the next night. Now a little of this red honey in the blood operates as fire to these gaseous germs. The mission of the gas germs is to prepare the way for the bigger and more voracious germs of the animal form. These gas germs only feast off from the membranes of the intestines and blood germs but the animal germs consume the red flesh and drink the blood.

It is the combat between the bad and good germs that is the "battles of Armageddon." It's a battle that involves everybody where life exists. It isn't a commotion where a portion of the people take advantage of the others, and amass the wealth and get rich, and become joyful, like a bird of prey. But what can be done when the mass of the people are so silly minded that they would rather fight and kill each other than to listen to reason and instruction.

The cause of the war is that the world is full of these gas germs who have taken possession of people's bodies and minds. Don't you know that the destructive gases always burn themselves out. Like a grass fire? This is because gas germs thrive one night and go to seed, but vegetable germs that use water continue to expand for six days.

National Parks.

Sixteen national parks are maintained by the federal government, including one in Hawaii. The others are in Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Washington and Wyoming. Yellowstone National Park, located in Wyoming, Montana and Idaho, is by far the largest, having an area of 3,248 square miles, nearly as great as that of Rhode Island and Delaware combined. Glacier National Park, in Montana, and Yosemite National Park, in California, rank second and third, respectively, in size, the area of the former being 1,514 square miles and that of the latter 1,124 square miles.

Brazil's Snake Garden.

There are laboratories which produce serums for the cure and prevention of the effects of snake bite.
