Optimism is one of the indispensable characteristics of the successful farmer. The experience of the past year has been a severe test for the farmers of California, but those who prepared their land properly will reap abundant harvests. Sufficient rain has now fallen to insure good crops of hay, beans, potatoes, corn, and similar crops.

The total of money in the United States is about six billion dollars. The Federal Goyernment alone is taxing us four and a half billions, or three-fourths of our total money, this year. In securities it is demanding that we take up about fifteen and a half billions more, making take up about fifteen and a half billions more, making twenty billions to be spent this year in running the Government and prosecuting the war. Add to this load the cost of the state, county and city governments, and the money necessary to make, the wheels of industry turn.
