Officer C. W. Stone reports that the police department made a fine showing in the recent Red Cross drive, the men donating \$4,460 to this patriotic purpose.

Travelers over the Topanga Canyon road are much pleased with the work done on that road recently by the city street force, under the direction of City Engineer M. D. Williams and Road Foreman L. D. Pike. Nearly a mile of the road extending from the city limits north has been given a coating of oil and rock which is practically as good as macadam. It is hoped to have the balance of the road lined as fast as the state highway soon.

During a recent raid on "blind pigs" at the Chatsworth Reservoir Camp several arrests were made for alleged violations of the liquor ordinance. One man was promptly sentenced to 180 days in jail for selling liquor. The driver of the Capital Liquor Co., a large and influential concern in the city, was arrested for complicity in the illegal transaction. Officers Stone and Gerard worked hard for the conviction of the driver or the liquor company, believing the law should be enforced impartially, but the jury in Judge Richard's court acquitted the men.

THRIFT STAMPS ON SALE

War thrift stamps and war certificates, otherwise known as Liberty bonds, are now on sale Owensmouth postoffice. The stamps sell at 25 cents each. The bonds \$1.12 during December and 26 cents are payable in 1922, at which each certificate will be worth 25 cents.

War Tax Revenue stamps are on sale at the postoffice. All papers now must carry revenue stamps.

All parcel post packages on the postage is 25 cents or more required to have affixed a war revenue stamp of 1 cent for each 25 ct. in postage.

This war is one of nations—not of armies—and all of our 100,000,000 people must be economically and industrially adjusted to war conditions if this nation is to play its full part in the conflict. The problem before us is not primarily a financial problem, but rather a problem of increased production of war essentials and the saving of the materials and the labor necessary for the support and equipment of our army and navy.

Thoughtless expenditure of money for nonessentials uses up the labor of men, the products of the farm, mines and factories and overburdens transportation, all of which must be used to the utmost and at their best for war purposes.

The great results which we seek can be obtained only by the participation of every member of the nation, young and old, in a national concerted thrift movement.

I therefore urge that our people everywhere pledge themselves, as suggested by the Secretary of the Treasury to the practice of thrift to serve the Government to their utmost in increasing production in all fields necessary to the winning of the war; to conserve food and fuel and useful materials of every kind; to devote their labor only to the most necessary tasks; and to buy only those things which are essential to individual health and efficiency; and that the people, as evidence of their loyalty, insist that they can in Liberty bonds and war savings stamps.

The securities issued by the

Treasury Department are so many of them within reach of everyone that the door of opportunity in this matter is wide open to all of us. To practice thrift in peace times is a virtue, and brings great benefit to the individual as all times, with the desperate need of the civilized world today for materials and labor with which to end the war, the practice of individual thrift is a patriotic duty and a necessity.

I appeal to all who now own either Liberty bonds or War Savings Stamps to continue to practice economy and thrift and to appeal to all who do not own government securities to do likewise and purchase them to the extent of their means. The man who buys government securities transfers the purchasing power of his money into the United States Government to until after the war, and in that same degree does not buy in competition with the government.

I earnestly appeal to every man, woman and child to pledge themselves on, or before the 28th of June to save constantly and to buy as regularly as possible the securities of the government; and to do this as far as possible through membership in War Savings societies. The 28th of June ends this special period of enlistment in the great voluntary army of production and savings here at home. May there be none unenlisted on that day.

Gray, Chatsworth; Alex Jeffrey Marian; M. L. Ullenwag; Zelzah; W. F. Clyman; Mission Acres; Volney H. Craig, San Fernando; Frank M. Keffer, Van Nuys; J. W. Dryden, Fruitland Acres; H. Metz, the River District; B. Q. Henscom, Los Angeles.

A permanent organization was effected by electing F. M. Keffer as chairman, with Volney Craig as secretary. The committee will be of them within reach of the door of opportunity. To practice thrift is a virtue, and brings benefit to the individual and the community. The saving of material and labor with the labor necessary to produce a product is a patriotic duty in the valley.

Expenditures totaling some \$100,000 have already been included in the budget by the finance committee of the council.
