Proclamation Of the President of the United States to Every Man, Woman and Child in this Country

This war is one of nations—not of armies—and all of our 100,000,000 people must be economically and industrially adjusted to war conditions if this nation is to play its full part in the conflict. The problem before us is not primarily a financial problem, but rather a problem of increased production of war essentials and the saving of the materials and the labor necessary for the support and equipment of our army and navy.

Thoughtless expenditure of money for nonessentials uses up the labor of men, the products of the farm, mines and factories and overburdens transportation, all of which must be used to the utmost and at their best for war purposes.

The great results which we seek can be obtained only by the participation of every member of the nation, young and old, in a national concerted thrift movement.

I therefore urge that our people everywhere pledge themselves, as suggested by the Secretary of the Treasury to the practice of thrift to serve the Government to their utmost in increasing production in all fields necessary to the winning of the war; to conserve food and fuel and useful materials of every kind; to devote their labor only to the most necessary tasks; and to buy only those things which are essential to individual health and efficiency; and that the people, as evidence of their loyalty, invest all that they can in Liberty bonds and war savings stamps.

Treasury Department are so many of them within reach of everyone that the door of opportunity in this matter is wide open to all of us. To practice thrift in peace times is a virtue, and brings great benefit to the individual as all times; with the desperate need of the civilized world today for materials and labor with which to end the war, the practice of individual thrift is a patriotic duty and a necessity.

I appeal to all who now own either Liberty bonds or War Savings Stamps to continue to practice economy and thrift and to appeal to all who do not own government securities to do likewise and purchase them to the extent of their means. The man who buys government securities transfers the purchasing power of his money to the United States government until after the war, and to that same degree, does not buy in competition with the government.

I earnestly appeal to every man, woman and child to pledge themselves on, or before the 28th of June to save constantly and to buy as regularly as possible the securities of the government; and to do this as far as possible through membership in War Savings societies. The 28 of June ends this special period of enlistment in the great voluntary army of production and savings here at home. May there be none unenlisted on that day.

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

AMONG OUR NEIGHBORS

W. F. McCann purchased the controlling interest in the Bank of Lankershim from J. D. Marshall, the president of the bank - Lankershim Laconic.

A party of Los Angeles capitalists appeared before a special meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce Monday evening asking for a factory site for a dehydration plant for the dehydrating of fruits and vegetables.

This concern desires to erect a \$50,000 plant here, to be ready for work in 60 days. This plant will handle 100 tons of fruits and vegetables per day all the year round, employing 60 to 75 people. It will be necessary to have the products of 50,000 acres to keep this factory going. Potatoes, carrots, turnips, celery, peas and beans will be wanted in large quantities. - Lankershim Laconic.

The estimate of the valley fruit crop is something astonishing to say the least. The San Fernando valley is becoming a fruit center to be reckoned with in the fruit world. A review of the situation reveals the fact that two new canneries have been erected in the valley this spring, also several large drying plants have been established, still it is found that there is a large surplus of fruit in the valley that must be disposed of on the Los Angeles public market and outside canneries. A reliable fruit estimator gives the report to the Laconic, after covering the valley carefully. The Van Nuys-Owensmouth section will have over 11,000 tons of apricots and between nine and ten thousand tons of peaches. Orchardale will have about 800 tons of apricots and 700 tons of peaches. Burbank has near 1500 tons of apricots and Lankershim's estimate is 5000 tons of apricots and 7000 tons of peaches, giving 17,600 tons of apricots and 47,000 tons of peaches for the valley. - Lankershim Laconic.

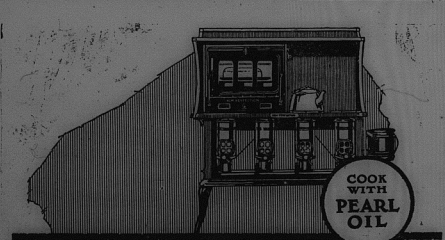
