WOMEN LEARNING MESSAGE

Germanotta W. Y. C. A. Training Women for Home-Industries Work Among Soldiers.

Educational courses to prepare women as an aid in the rehabilitation of wounded soldiers have been opened at the Germanotta, Pa. Young Women's Christian Association.

A reconstruction message course, lectures in anatomy, physiology, muscle work and remedial movement massage, theory and practice, electrotherapy and artificial respiration, are given by doctors and nurses, who also supervise practical work at the Y. W. C. A. school at Houston. The courses are organized by the Surgeon General.

Similar courses have also been given in the New York City Central Branch Y. W. C. A., where a specialty is made of brush-making with a view to training women as teachers for reconstruction hospitals.

The Cadetun Y. W. C. A. has received permission to place a Y. W. C. A. secretary on every ship leaving England with 200 to 300 more women and children on the passenger list.

The secretary fulfills the same function for the women as the Y. M. C. A. secretary has for men on transports. She plans entertainments and recreation for women and children and is a friend to whom they may come if they are in distress.
