## AMONG OUR EXCHANGES

Oxnard Daily Courier: In preparation for a dry spring the Battery Development Company has expended about \$15,000 on their plant, installing an electric centrifugal pump and making other improvements calculated to take care of the ranchers this spring. All the wells have been opened up and there will be an abundance of water.

Van Nuys News: Bills and Dickey and their "oprah" patch," west of Van Nuys on Vanowen street, are opening the eyes of many of our farmers to the possibilities of intensive farming methods and double cropping on local lands.

The crop of spinach from the 100 acres they have planted is now being marketed. From last week's cutting the average acreage production was 400 crates, which sold at the average price of \$1.42 a crate, making the yield per acre \$569.

Mr. Dickey, who is in charge of the field work, states that he expects to secure at least 30,000 crates of marketable lettuce from the fields. In addition to the lettuce these men have about 100 acres of cabbage which will be ready for market within several weeks.

Ventura Daily Free Press: Eighteen years ago Monday the first through train on the Southern Pacific Coast line from Los Angeles passed through Santa Barbara.

Conductor John Hartell, who has been a guest at the Neal for the past few days, was conductor on the local line whose terminus was the Santa Barbara, many years previous to that. Neal Calabasas, proprietor of the Neal, says that Hartell was conductor of the train on which he first came on the city 25 years ago. Hartell now travels on the local line and will soon be in line for the pension list.
