OHIO A-SURE WINNER

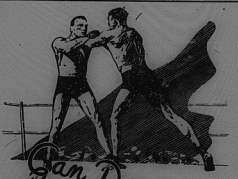

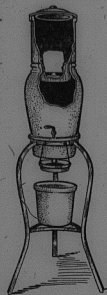

REASONABLE GOOD THINGS.

A novel to-day combination which we will like to try some of these warm summer days:

1. Cherry Salsify—Cut a deep dish and cover the bottom with sliced cherries. Sprinkle the fruit with sugar, adding and cooking with additional cherries juice to suit. On top of this spread a layer of salsify, crumbs, repeat until the dish is full. Finish the top with the crumbs. Cover and stand in the oven one hour. Then remove and brown quickly. Serve hot with sweetened cream as a sauce.

Current Get-up—Take five pounds of table-spoonful of cinnamon, one tablespoonful of cloves, one teaspoonful of bay pepper, one teaspoonful of salt and half a pint of vinegar. Mash the currants and rub them through a sieve; then add the other ingredients and boil for twenty minutes, then add a few drops of oil. This catsup has a specially delicate flavor and is quite worth the trouble of making.

Maroon Cream—Soak one-fourth of a box of gelatine in one-fourth of a cupful of cold water. Make a boiled custard of a pint of milk and the yolks of three eggs, one-half cupful of salt and half a pint of vinegar. Pour this custard over the softened gelatine, then add an egg and mix thoroughly. Add the salt and vinegar. When this begins to thicken, add the whites of the egg beaten stiff. Mix well, pour into a mold and set in a cool place for three hours. Serve with small cubes.

Frozen Mandarins—Drain the juice from a cupful of canned or preserved cherries, add one cupful of sugar and one cupful of water and mix thoroughly. Add one-fourth of a cupful of water and one teaspoonful of lemon juice. Press the mixture through the cherries which are strained in when ready to pack. Let stand several hours to
