A BIG SHIPMENT

Hol... Over Teary Beans from Valley Warehouses

TO GERMANY

Cleans Up About Half of the Stock that was on Hand.

The Owensmouth warehouse of the... shipping 28 carloads consisting of 10,612 cases of Teary Beans to Hamburg, Germany, on account of the U. S. Bureau prohibitions of San Francisco.

These beans were sold some time ago but have not been ordered on... 12,000 cases, however, there are still 12,000 cases to the producer, and at present there is no definite demand for them.

On the same order the Marian Mill... 10,000 cases, which leaves about 10,000 cases of the holders still on hand here.

The Van Noy Seed and Fuel company has loaded on a carload of 100,000 cases of seed beans, which are on hand there, practically all of which are in being.

These beans are of 42 carloads of the shipped on the order and consists of 25 carloads of the Teary Beans to the valley, and as no more than this carload is being shipped, it can be said to be further accumulation.

All of the baby beans have been sold, so that there is practically none available in a cleaned up market.

Markets, United States Department of
Agriculture. Every American

such as coffee, tea, sugar, cloth and
manufactured articles. To secure them

SUGAR PRODUCTION SHY

The statistical situation in the in-
ternational market of sugar continues
to be unsatisfactory. There is an
unprecedented underproduction all over
the world in beet sugar and the production
of cane sugar is not sufficient to
counteract this scarcity. According to
the Economic statistics Bureau of the
United States Department of Commerce,
the world will use the first of October
1928, approximately 6,000,000 tons of
sugar. The world's beet production for
1928, however, is only 4,000,000 tons.

From this fact many conclusions
may be drawn. It is evident that the
cane sugar industry is growing in
importance, but there is a distinct
deficit prevailing that set up limits to
the world's sugar consumption. In
the area devoted to cane sugar pro-
duction, the beet sugar industry is
present and without the re-ventilation
of the market in the future, the
United States, Poland, Czechoslovakia and
Germany, there can be no chance
of a relaxation of the sugar market.

MORE GOOD THINGS

Stewed Egg, if allowed to cook several hours, can cook slowly in a double boiler, make a most delicious fruit to serve in various ways. Add a bit of lemon juice and sugar; boil down the juice and pour over the egg.

Chicken Liver—Cut one chicken, one stale loaf of bread, two tablespoons of chopped tender, salt, pepper and chicken broth. Mix chicken to water to cover until tender. Remove from the broth and also remove the meat from the bones. In a buttered baking dish put a layer of buttered crumbs, the crumbs should be very sticky, the bread pulled to pieces with the fingers. Add the crumbs with hot of butter and add a layer of chicken which should be in slices, not chopped. Add bread crumbs and chicken until all are used. Four over the whole two cups of broth, salt and parsley. Bake until the crumbs are brown.

Corn Souffle—Mix two tablespoons of butter, add two tablespoons of flour, use unseasoned salt, one-eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper. Add one and one-half cups of milk and mix and mix in a cupful of hot bread crumbs. Cook until smooth. Add two cups of corn and the yolk of two eggs beaten well. Fold in the whites of the egg beaten stiff and turn into a buttered baking dish and bake thirty minutes.

As the summer time and July season approach it is well to prepare for the delicious jellies which may be made of fruits which lack pectin. This may be supplied by the following: Peel all of the yellow rind of the whole-skinned orange or lemon. Remove the white part and put it in a large bowl. Add to each cupful of the chopped, pressed down peel 2 1/2 cups of water and let it stand one hour. Add two cups of water, and let boil five minutes. Let stand over night, add four cups of water, heat to the boiling point and let it boil. Strain through a jelly bag. Pour this straining into another bowl and let it stand.
