

BIG POTATO YIELD

Believed Harvested on Craig Ranch East of Town 170 Acres Per Acre Is Said to be the Average of the Forty Acre Field.

What promises to be the record yield of potatoes in the valley is being harvested on the J. C. Craig ranch, where the yield is said to be 20 sacks to the acre. There is about forty acres in the field and the potatoes, whose roots were planted on alfalfa and which had been used as a hog pasture for several months, are being harvested with an Agony as two crops each.

HAS FINE APECOT CROP

POULTRY KILLING DEMONSTRATIONS

Arrangements have been made to have R. B. Eaton, extension poultry-raising instructor at the University, spend the first two weeks of August in Los Angeles county conducting a series of poultry killing demonstrations.

Mr. Eaton will not do much in referring to the symptoms of the epidemic which he has seen in the Los Angeles County farm houses. The calling demonstrations are being given at the local poultry raisers' meetings and will be more extensive than a week or two ago. Mr. Eaton will call flocks of about 200 birds, and will advise the owners agree to keep production records for a period of one week, preceding and ten days following the outbreak of the epidemic. He will then give a check on the advantages of the various methods of raising the times of high priced feed. The Los Angeles county poultry raisers' association is the only organization of its kind in the valley and is interested in every poultry-raiser in the county.

The time and place of the various demonstrations will be announced at a later date.

CROP CONDITIONS

According to the agricultural department of the county, the alfalfa throughout the state is 86 per cent of the average yield in this county is 95. There is still a slight increase in the average over last year, as the condition of the crop is 82 per cent.

As confidently expected, there was a marked increase in the average yield of alfalfa as compared with last year. The area planted in alfalfa and "bally" land is about 150,000 acres, and the yield is about 100 bushels per acre.
