It is raised in incorruption:

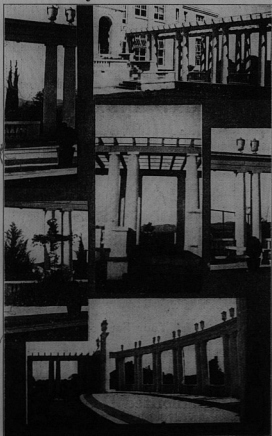
It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body.

HISTORY OF OUR BEAUTIFUL EASTER SERVICE

The custom of holding Sunrise Easter Services in the Greek Theatre of the High School of Owensmouth was begun six years ago when Mrs. W. E. Leitch became the originator of the idea. She presented the plan to the Woman's Club for consideration and it was decided to hold this service, annually and to make it as unique, artistic and impressive as possible. Mrs. G. W. Monroe was president of the club at that time and it was largely due to her efforts that the standard of program was set so high.

The first service was probably the most colorful of all. Members of the Board of Education, city officials, presidents of all of the Woman's Clubs of the Los Angeles area were invited to serve as patrons and patronesses, and those with their friends, newspaper editors and performers were invited; a grand but substantial highlight in the High School building by the Woman's Club. This feature was an outstanding one, and it still is remembered by those who made the long pilgrimage and accepted of the Club's hospitality.

The lighting system of the Valley had just been installed, and through the courtesy of the Edison Co. the lights were permitted to burn all night until dawn so that there was a lighted highway practically the entire distance from the top of Calabasas Pass to Owensmouth.

There was the first Sunrise Easter Service to be held in the Valley and Mr. H. J. Whitley heartily approved of the plans and assisted materially in financing the first service. Credit was also due to the early editors of the Gazette, Mr. L. P. Litchell and Mr. R. L. Lamoreaux for their interest and help in establishing the event as a religious and civic enterprise. The members of the Woman's Club and all other citizens have worked unceasingly to perfect arrangements which each year insure greater success and increasing numbers.

It was planned from the beginning to make this service non-sectarian, and an artistic in the setting, and so devoutly sacred the occasion, that this service has come to be recognized as a religious festival, and an established event in the cycle of our Valley's annual history.

Among the many others who have assisted in this service in helping to establish this Easter Service are: Mrs. Edwin Morris, Mrs. Jacob Jepsen, past presidents and Mrs. Lillian Hadley, who as the honor of president is due this year.

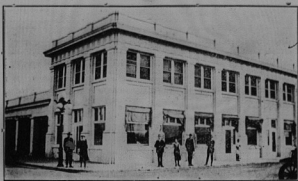

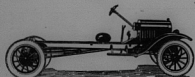

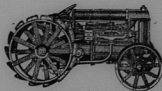

THE UPPER SAN FERNANDO VALLEY'S THE GARDEN SPOT OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

As I write this description of the beautiful San Fernando Valley, I am seated in the shadow cast by a high foothill at the western end of the valley. From this point I can overlook the entire valley of 140,000 acres surrounded with mountains. and wrinkles between the bright patches of sunlight on each crest. One understands well looking at this wondrous spectacle of shade and sunlight falling on the back with the dappled and more ragged brush cover mesquitas which old quoniam says "Look up to the hills, you see mountains just as you see them." The foothills of the west break like the teeth of a saw, and the mountains on the north the mountains are rounded, rocky and barren and run down to the floor of the valley with the rounded and sloping foothills. On the east are Mount Wilson and Mt. Loma. Looking up to the hills, drossy, smoky haze, with dark precipitations, rocky ridges protruding in outlines of deep canyons, and old and washed with rain.

From the floor of the San Fernando valley one can look up on all sides and behold a vast and beautiful picture of the mountains, a picture whose colors change with the mood of the sun. At the base of the hill on which I am seated is an orange grove whose yellow fruit peeps out from the bright green foliage as golden as the sunlight that colors it. Here and there are vines and clusters glowing in the orchards and bean fields, and I find an wonderfully beautiful scene this marvelous valley. I have a vision. The floor of this rich valley changes. Instead of the large bean fields there are fields of small intestine garden, homes with pretty cottages surrounded with such vegetables, berries and fruit, with long poultry houses for laying birds, and a garden, and a happy, healthy family making an income from working in the

light without fear of what. The valley, as I dream, becomes one large city of millions garden homes where children live close to nature with parents who sit on the lawns to create the delicious vegetables, berries and fruits, securing peace, health and happiness in the natural way. And I look again down on the rich, sandy loam of this incomparable valley, look the vision is becoming a reality, for there, just a little to the East of Oceanside, lies already a village of one-acre garden homes, with long rows of poultry houses on the west and already the strawberries, lettuce and plums are glowing in the evening sunlight and I fancy I can hear the chirp of the 20,000 young chickens already growing up in the famous orchard. I can count over seventy more cottages and several such villages in a family planting in their gardens and already the strawberries, lettuce and plums and vegetables make a pretty sight.

Fifty more families are getting ready to be the founders of their garden homes. These are being planted along the 60-foot access with orange groves. Roads are being graded and rolled with the granite gravel. Streets are being laid out in acres. Electric lines run down each street. Several contractors are busy with many water-tight, poultry houses, and homes.

Hundreds of visitors visit the colony which has sprung into being so quickly.

Business men concede that the Charles Weeks "Project" colony at Oceanside, 20 miles from the center of Los Angeles, is the latest garden enterprise in the whole San Fernando Valley.

DR. CARPENTER PRE-LECTS WATER SHORTAGE

Not since 1909 has Southern California experienced such a severe season as the present one, according to figures made public yesterday by Dr. Fred C. Carpenter, head of the Department of Agriculture and Horticulture of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce. The doctor's report indicates that 750 inches of rain has fallen here during the entire season, which is 100 inches more than 1.68 inches fell during the remainder of the present season, which ends next June 30, based on previous statistics. (City Gazette.)

"Because of..." rainfall Dr. Carpenter estimates a shortage of water for irrigation purposes in August and September. These conditions, Dr. Carpenter points out, should lead to the concentration of water during the coming season and every precaution should be taken not to waste or consume more than is necessary.

"Fortunately there remains more than the normal amount of ground water which can be utilized in pumping," Dr. Carpenter says. "Also, the snowfall over the watersheds of the Sierra Nevada has been better than normal. It should not be forgotten that the effect of rain on the ground water level never requires as much water as there is acid rains on that which has for some time that the absorption of water."

"There is assurance that there will be more rain before spring is over. Dry weather, as in the present one, is characterized by hot winds and often heavy unbalanced showers. In fact, the rainfall above that more than the normal rainfall occurs after this date and the coming week may bring it."

ALL DECIDUOUS ORCHARDS SHOULD HAVE IRRIGATION NOW

Soil borings in many deciduous fruit orchards in Los Angeles county by members of the Agricultural Extension Service have disclosed the fact that the soil in many places is so dry that the trees are most likely to suffer.

"Recognizing that irrigation is but a little understood practice and generally poorly done, the Extension Committee of the Los Angeles County Farm Bureau has asked the Agricultural Extension Service to conduct field demonstrations on irrigation. These demonstrations have been arranged for and Mr. L. C. Helms of the Agricultural Service, who is recognized throughout the Pacific Coast as one of the best authorities on irrigation, has been secured to conduct these demonstrations. Many growers interested with such questions as how to sell when the soil is too dry or over-irrigated, how far from water sources to locate, how to measure the soil, how to determine the most economical length of furrow for different types of soils, what are the best methods of application, how to tell when the water should be shut off, and other important factors. Mr. Helms will visit the Oceanside-Garden Homes and the Oceanside-Garden Homes demonstrations.
