Freight car loading in central and northern California in the first two weeks of July averaged over 40 per cent heavier than in the first two weeks of July, 1933. CALLS MEETING
Hundreds of stockholders of the Southern California Edison Company in Owensmouth and vicinity received notification from President John B. Miller yesterday that a special meeting had been called for September 7 at the Edison building, Los Angeles, for the purpose of authorizing a reorganization of the company and the company's authorized stock capitalization and bonded indebtedness.

District Manager H. B. Fletcher said that the purpose of the proposed reorganization was for continuing the company's policy of planning ahead for the financing and construction of its new power to meet the ever increasing demands of service in the Los Angeles area.

Explaining the new plan of financing, District Manager H. B. Fletcher said: "The increased authorized capital will provide a broad and strong foundation for financing through to completion more than a million additional horsepower to be installed on our Big Creek-San Joaquin project, together with the necessary transmission and distributing lines throughout the counties in which the Edison Company renders electric service."

The plan which will increase the authorized capital stock from \$100,000,000 to \$125,000,000, and the increase of authorized capital stock from \$100,000,000 to \$125,000,000, of common stock and \$125,000,000 of preferred stock.

The stockholders will also be asked to approve an increase of the authorized capital stock of the company to \$250,000,000. The vote of the stockholders in the nature of an enabling act giving directors power to sell bonds and stock may be required. The stockholder's vote in itself does not actually create any bonded interest, as under the Public Utilities Act California neither bonds nor stocks can be sold without the approval of the City of, and at prices fixed by, the State Railroad Commission.

The new plan which authorized will give us a financial setup which it is expected will take care of the company's needs for the next five years.

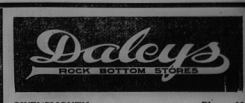

8,000 HIKING CLUBS IN GREATER NEW YORK

New York.—One must walk know-
days to be in the swim. Statistics
gathered from the out-door departments
of the newspapers, from the Boy Scout
and Campfire Girls organizations,
from the T. M. C. G. branches and
kindred bodies, from scores of amateur
athletic clubs and from the leading
schools in sporting goods, indicate that

today there are no less than 8,000
hiking clubs in Greater New York,
with a total membership of more than
a quarter of a million men and women,
who are keeping themselves in the
pink of condition and experiencing the
real joy of living by getting regularly
out into the open country with no other
reason of locomotion than their God-
given legs.

The city of New York has taken official
notice of the movement. On three
occasions recently Mayor Hylan has
congratulated the boys and girls of the
public schools upon their enthusiasm
in taking up the new sport of hiking,
in his dedication of the great new public
playground in the Bronx the other
day Mayor Hylan extolled the athletic
tendencies of the boys and girls and
deplored upon them that there was
no better or more profitable way in
which they could pass their vacations
and utilize their holidays than by the
excursions into field and forest of their
walking clubs. He gave the same
message to the Amateur Athletic Union
of Brooklyn a few days later, and
when a ship of East Side boys and girls
detached him at city hall yesterday in
a hike in the town of Roseton at
Oyster Bay he assured them that the
best walkers among them would make
the best citizens.

Walk and Be Well

No less enthusiastic a champion of
the walking game is Dr. Royal R.
Copeland, city health commissioner.
"The benefit to health and the safe-
guard to morale to be found in long
walks," said Dr. Copeland in an in-
terview, "are too apparent to speak
of them. If one takes long walks alone
it is well, but for the sake of health,
if he takes long walks in company it
is better for his exercise. Walking
is one of the best of exercises in
which there is the minimum risk of
overdoing it. In short, I consider
walking the most beneficial of exer-
cises as it is never out of season."
"Athletic," said Edward R. Wilby,
manager of a nationally known sporting
goods store. "I know such a demand as
now for outdoor garments and shoes and stock-
ings and appliances for the traveler's
luggage box. The rapid spread and
tremendous popularity of the walking
club idea has no parallel in our ex-
perience."

"The hiker can make his requisite
trip in but few days. Real-
ly, there are only two or three articles
indispensable in hiking—the walking
shoes that allow him to roam, nice
woolen socks and clothing that will
give freedom of limb. He should have
a canvas or leather messenger bag,
such as the soldiers used in France."

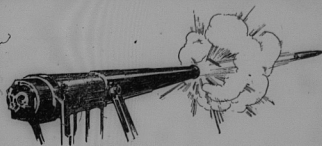

today there are no less than 8,000 hiking clubs in Greater New York, with a total membership of more than a quarter of a million men and women who are keeping themselves in the pink of condition and enjoying the real joy of living by getting regularly out into the open country with an efficient means of locomotion than their God-forded legs.

The city of New York has taken official notice of the movement. On three occasions recently Mayor Hylan has congratulated the boys and girls of the public schools upon their enthusiasm in taking up the new sport of hiking. In his dedication of the great new public playground in the Bronx the other day Mayor Hylan extolled the athletic tendencies of the boys and girls and impressed upon them that there was no better or more profitable way in which they could pass their vacations and utilize their holidays than by the excursions into field and forest of their walking clubs. He gave the same message to the Amateur Athletic Union of Brooklyn a few days later, and a club of East Side boys and girls visited him at city hall preparatory to a hike in the town of Roseton at Outer Bay he assured them that the best walkers among them would make the best citizens.

Walk and Be Well
No less enthusiastic a champion of the walking cause is Dr. Royal R. Copeland, city health commissioner. "The benefit to health and the safeguard to morale to be found in long walks," said Dr. Copeland in an interview, "are too apparent to speak of them. If one takes long walks alone it is well, for his walking is his health, but if he takes long walks in company it is better for he adds the benefit of companionship to his exercise. Walking is the one form of exercise in which there is the minimum risk of overdoing it. In short, I consider walking the most beneficial of exercises as it is never out of season."

Edward R. Wilbur, manager of a nationally known sporting goods store, "I have known such a demand as now for outdoor garments and shoes and stock-ings and accessories for the traveler's lunchbox here. The rapid spread and tremendous popularity of the walking club idea has as parallel in our experience."

"The hiker can make his requisite trip and still feel the sporting. Real-ly, there are only two or three articles indispensable to hiking, and that is walking about that. After that of room, thick woolen socks and clothing that will give freedom of limb. He should have a canvas or leather messenger bag, such as the soldier used in France."

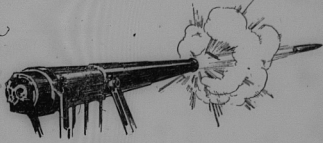

OUT OF THE COOKY KAY

Cookies of various kinds can be made indefinitely (when you've got the recipe) and can be made from the foundation of a wide variety of shapes and kinds.

recipes which may be used to suit various tastes is the following: Plain Cookies.—Take one-half cup of sugar, one cup of sugar, one cup of milk, one egg, two teaspoons of baking powder, three or four and two cups of flour. For more richness the better of making cookies will encourage us to double this recipe and let it stand in the oven until done. This not only helps greatly in rolling out but takes less time and the cookies are better flavored.

Nice, reliable, date, egg, spices and nuts, various kinds may be added to make a special occasion or chocolate or a frosting of maple, nutmeg or vanilla. The shape the cookies are cut will depend on more artistic work on the pattern.

Delightful little cakes decorated with white cream, dipped in fondant or chocolate will please the most particular—and who ever gets too old to enjoy a good piece of meat? Cookies.—Cream two-thirds of a cup of butter, add one and one-half cups of sugar and three well-beaten eggs, mix three cups of flour with one-half teaspoon of soda, one-half teaspoon of baking powder, one-half teaspoon of nutmeg, one-half teaspoon of cinnamon and three cups of English walnuts cut fine, to one cup of raisins with one-half cup of nuts. Beat well and drop on greased pan, bake in 30 minutes. These cookies are better after being kept some days.

Fresh Eggs.—Mustard Sauce.—Fresh eggs and drain carefully, then wash, rinse, dry, add a small tart sauce poured over them; garnish with parsley.
