

CHANCE FOR ORANGE YEARS OF GROWTH

"We growers of apricots around Owensmouth may feel like throwing up the sponge for good and all but we are not going to do it yet. We are going to irrigate our orchards and give them the best of care, with faith that next year will treat us better. We can be losers of money this year without having a grip, for the fact is there are there are always less years among the good ones. We must pull together and be prepared to consider an average of a number of years and by taking the ball with the good we know we shall be the winners in the end."

There are the words of a grower of good apricots and of a holder of good farms who lives not at great distance from Owensmouth. This kind of talk is not as common as it might be, as C. J. Schlegel, our local agricultural director of the high school, reports to the Gazette. "Some growers can't get money. They can't sell their fruit and the local bank can't do any more than it has done, which is a whole lot. Things look bright but for the fact that there is always light in this section of the world. There is a demand for land here and a farmer here can build a piece of land and then build a home and do very well. But for fruits in general are not paying good money returns this year. There are exceptions and these are also very interesting. Some apricot growers are extra fine quality fruit and make money. Walnut growers grow good prospects. Some pear orchards are producing good returns. The grape vineyard will pay big. There is a great prospect and that is a mighty lot more than eastern and northern farmers can say."

"We can't win all our crops, but our shoulders to the wheel. Let's help one another. Let's put our own possibilities to take care of the orchards that will not be a crop failure but the good year crop. We ought to irrigate now will split disaster in next year's crop, and we must discount the chances for securing a good crop for several years. It is up to Farm Director V. F. Blanchard. If he might as well advise of the Los Angeles Times of last week. Only healthy trees produce good crops. A tree neglected now becomes weak and fruitless. If the area does not show it that it can't possibly produce good fruit and the orchard is thin. Fruit buds are forming now. These buds in the axils of the leaves will not develop properly if the area are not kept in good first class growing condition. Unless these trees develop right and unless the trees store food in their buds and this fall the fruit will be small or very meagre. Spring.

There are many reasons for small fruit and for crop failures but we must not forget that right now is the time to irrigate deciduous trees. We must keep our trees in healthy condition all in fact, every week in the year, in all times. Every tree in Mr. Blanchard says truly that many deciduous trees are in a weakened condition right now and that there is danger unless growers will irrigate carefully, or at least irrigate the trees healthy, or in many cases to put them into a good condition which is not now the case. We can do nothing. For in their orchard soil moisture conditions and also wishing to look into what had developed into general health conditions of their trees and soil at some time, they should visit Mr. Schlegel for a visit in their orchard.

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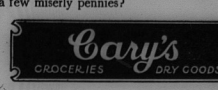
