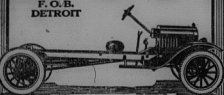

SCOUTS

BOY SCOUT ROUND-UP

Only 20,000 more "to go" and the anniversary roundup of the Boy Scouts of America, which annually meets its goal of 300,000 new members will be launched as the greatest achievement in the history of scouting. The present membership of scouts is 473,417 and of scout leaders 34,054, making a total of 517,471.

President Harding, one of the most enthusiastic supporters of the round-up with the aim of bringing to the increased number of boys scouting's benefits of citizenship training and character building is presenting a list of red, white and blue streamers to each troop and council that meets in observance of the increased membership. The President's award in such cases is accompanied by an inspiring letter of personal congratulation.

The streamer also being presented with appropriate ceremonies and by presentation to the various winning troops and councils throughout the country. One troop in Kansas was so fortunate as to receive its streamer directly from President Harding when he recently passed through that state. Another picturesque ceremony fraught with reverent memories for the future will be held in Madison, Wis., when George Harding, father of the President, dressed in his uniform of the G. A. R., presented his such act as a local trophy.

In other parts of the world the round-up has given helpful impetus to scout movement, and as the report of the prison of Wales, who has been visiting many countries. The prince, who is chief of Wales and is an enthusiastic member of, as he terms scouting, "his big and holy brotherhood," has written the chief scout executive of the Boy Scouts of America, James B. West, as follows:

"Filled with happy memory of my meetings with the Boy Scouts of America at the conclusion of my visit to the United States, I have watched with great interest their recent advance toward the half-century mark.

"I should like to congratulate the executive and the scouts on the success they have attained and on the helpful impetus their action has given to the movement elsewhere.

"I feel that in the next generation the growth of the scout movement in all lands will not only benefit each country by producing better citizens, but will contribute powerfully to better understanding between nations and toward the perpetuation of international peace."

SCOUT MAKES SURVEY

The opportunity which the boy scout program offers in filling a boy's leisure time with wholesome organized work and play was recently thoroughly demonstrated in the city of Devils Lake, North Dakota, by a survey of the leisure time of boys of twelve years of age and over. The survey was conducted by I. D. Packler, with chief instructor of local scout outfit.

The survey was confined to boys of scout age attending school. This category of boys under twelve years of age averaged age fourteen years, and the average leisure time every six days (Sunday not counted) was 2.8 hours.

"The survey greatly underestimates the problem, instead of overestimating it," says Mr. Packler. "The fact being Sunday is left out of consideration in the survey, that it covers activity for the nine months of the school year and disregards the summer vacation months; and that it does not include the boys under twelve years of age. So much that we have only the minimum figure for leisure time. The complete amount of such spare time affords a period through which grave danger, Devils Lake folk must wake up and think seriously."

GOVERNOR DAVIS SAYS:

"I am an enthusiast in the matter of the boy scout movement, because it is of great value to the boy. It instills in him group feeling. It teaches him love of country, self-reliance, service to others, care for his personal appearance, good habits, appreciation of the beauties of the landscape, obedience, love of nature, and useful citizenship.

"The boy scout movement is the most worthwhile activity I know of in the community life of the boy."—Jonathan M. Davis, Governor of Kansas.

GOVERNOR TEMPLETON SAYS:

"I believe that scouting develops in a boy the trust and masculine qualities. Perhaps the movement's chiefest point is that, instead of being taught to do for others, it teaches him to be characterized as a boy scout is to do for others. It is to be developed by character. A boy scout is to do exercise his better instincts, and by exercising he develops the same."—Charles A. Templeton, Governor of Connecticut.

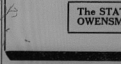

Edison Company Now Has New Plant in Use

Augmenting the electric energy distributed in Southern California south of Tehachapi—the million dollar power terminal at Southern California Edison Company, known as the new Laguna Bell substitution in the southeastern suburb of Los Angeles, went into service August 2, according to a message received by District Manager H. B. Fencher from R. H. H. Green, vice-president and general manager.

"This station, which is the largest on the Pacific coast and which is the first station in California constructed according to 22,000 volts, in the second year in making available additional energy to be transmitted over the Big Creek line by reason of their diversion to this high voltage. It will bear the 1200 horsepower of new electric energy which comes on to the Edison line this year from the construction of the largest hydro-electric power house west of Niagara Falls and thirty-three per cent added generator capacity to the first power house on the Big Creek-San Joaquin project."

Describing the features of the new Dugway Bell station is the District Manager Fencher, said: "Located as it is in the center of the main transmission system, supplying the territory between Los Angeles, Long Beach and San Bernardino, from which distributing lines diverge, this station with its capacity to deliver 150,000 horse power to the various points on the line will greatly augment the service rendered and provide for a large increase in the amount of business possible to be handled by the station.

"The most advanced ideas of outdoor construction both for the 22,000 volt and 60,000 volt have been developed for this substitution. The entire equipment is outdoors except the large condenser required for regulation of the lines of the 22,000 volt use and the substation equipment. This equipment is housed in a building, one hundred thirteen feet by seventy-five feet fifty-two feet high of concrete construction. It is situated in a tract twenty-seven acres in area which gives adequate room for additional expansion. It needed to keep pace with this rapidly growing territory. Work on the station has been completed and on October 15, 1922, thirty employees to two hundred men, including the Vernal station, have taken care of by camp facilities at the substitution site.

"In terms of increased community benefits the output of this station will make available to the city of 195,000 acres of land, and provide the motive power for one thousand farms and one hundred and twenty domestic service to sixty thousand homes.

"This station is an improvement with the Eagle Rock substitution will be to the southern counties served by this station, which the Vernal station, near Porterville, in the San Joaquin valley."

BUY STAMPS AT HOME

The third assistant postmaster general issued the following statement: "What possible difference can it make if postage stamps are purchased at an office other than the one from which the letters or packages are mailed—the money all goes to the government."

"That is the question and the natural one, together with the suggested answer that is raised by business men when approached by a local postmaster with a request that he be allowed to furnish them with stamps necessary to cover mailing from his office. It makes a lot of difference, and the postoffice department stands ready to lend its moral support to the postmaster in his efforts to induce mailers to purchase stamps at the point of sale."

In fact, it is the one obstacle in the way of complete success of the present method of raising postage stamps of the first, second and third class, and for facing their sale.

The method is used by hand and cannot be changed or modified by the department. Not only are the salaries of postmasters determined by the amount of revenue produced by their office, but the allowance for their expenses, as well as other expenses, is based on the amount of revenue produced by the quantity of work performed.

The system of stamps is sold by hand and balance, preventing the employment of unnecessary help when a particular letter is on its feet, and, on the other hand, automatically dispatching the mail to its destination whenever increased business produces revenue.
