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IS EFFECT

The new motor law became effective September 1. There are a number of additions and changes in the regulations provided for motorists in the law and among the most important are the following:

Address changes must be reported immediately to registration departments.

Private garages must report tenants.

Residential trailers must keep records of cars stored over twelve months for 14 years; for chassis 10 years.

Loads carried on cars allowed six inches past hub steps on right side, nothing past hub cap line on left side.

Commercial vehicles must have windshield.

Velocity must be kept right of the road. Cars being passed must not increase their speed while passing car.

No turns can be made except at street intersections.

Residential trailers are permissible in light traffic.

Any vehicle with evidence on permanent will not stand in courts.

New weight law for trucks. (Truck owners should secure copies of the law from the motor vehicle department and adhere to it.)

Tire for trucks also covered by new stipulations.

Propane gas will be given only from the left side of the vehicle, and with a tire valve.

Any new motor vehicle will be equipped with a rear view mirror of some sort.

Automobiles to be licensed.

The gasoline tax of 2 cents a gallon will not go into effect until September 30.

CALIFORNIA NEWS BRIEFS

McClatchy Brothers, publishers of the Sacramento Bee and the Fresno Bee, unable to compromise their differences in the matter of the editorial and business policies of the two publications, have agreed to separate as from future date, the report says.

The brokers will submit bids for the plants and business and the highest bidder will take complete control of both papers. The report further details the break as coming about over the prohibition and the Japanese immigration issues and differences in their attitudes to Senator Johnson as a preliminary step to the dissolution which both brothers have formed separate corporations.

A lumber loss found in a wash drift of the Argonaut mine, and positively identified as belonging to William Pease, furnished what was said to be complete substantiation of a generally accepted theory that Pease perished as the forty-seventh victim of the Argonaut disaster. It is thought the lost bones separated from the decomposed body of the miner in the heated south drift of the mine and that it was blown away by found rock. A rumor that a man answering the name of Pease had been seen around Sacramento was investigated and found without foundation.

Fire that raged in the boiler room of the Beach & Bon Hotel, 225 E. Francisco, did a damage in excess of \$100,000 and burned over 200,000 worth of property. The loss includes 75,000 feet of lumber, other articles of box stored, while all the machinery in the factory and planting mill is a total loss. Three buildings other than the mill property were destroyed and several others were scorched.

The collector of internal revenue for the state of California, in a letter to Washington claims the destruction of 25,000 dollars worth of property in the last fiscal year. California is the nation in the number of dollars lost by fire. The estimate is \$1,175,000, having a daily capacity of 50,000 gallons of water. The government is expected to arrest 1,200 offenders; 15,000 paid fines and 10,000 were set free.

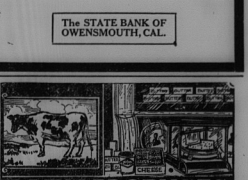
