

# JAPANESE STATES

Frank D. Fagan, a brother of Mrs. H. C. Crook of the Owensmouth community, was in Yokohama, Japan, at the time of the recent earthquake. He is connected with the General Electric company and, under date of September 18, wrote the following graphic account of the disaster in an official of the company in San Francisco:

"We say thank God we are alive, Mrs. Fagan had arrived on Thursday and we were notified to go to the Owensmouth on the bluff in Yokohama Saturday morning we were down in ten or twelve minutes, we were under a shopping district, taking our two children with us, leaving three servants in the house."

"At about two minutes to twelve we were waiting in front of a big bank for my assistant, a Japanese, to get to some change."

"The earth began slowly to sway, growing more violent it seemed to me the whole earth was a boiling sea, I stepped out of the car but instantly upon my feet, chauffeur and children remaining in the car, who was only about a was a Hudson sedan. The buildings all around us crumbled and fell to the ground, flying pieces only struck a piece of glass which was broken. We got out of the car and had to hang on while there was another earthquake."

"The earthquake was much more severe than San Francisco. We ran to the band or waterfront and three along the waterfront, passed a fire building, landing, and a car, which remained land below the bluff. Here we were all day in fear, a tidal wave having never come. There was no tidal wave in Yokohama up to the time of the earthquake. The water was later lapped up and put on ships, much of the water was in the 'swells', a British ship, and I was sent to the 'Empire of Australia.' While I stayed all night. The next morning I joined my family and Tuesday we returned to Kobe, which was only a night's ride."

"Mrs. Geary, wife of a prominent San Francisco official of the company was shopping and was caught under falling masonry, rescued and taken to hospital. Her children were at home and thought to be lost, but I recognized them on our ship next day, not hurt, having been rescued by the Japanese. Almost all the people of the city had all been buried in the houses by the sea. My Geary, who was in their summer home twenty miles away, was O. K. Mrs. Geary has a sprained ankle."

"As far as I can learn all foreign employees are safe and well as are Japanese. Our factories at Kawasaki and Tokyo are reported good. The latest news from the West is that the best two-thirds destroyed."

"The foreign settlement on the bluff was destroyed first by quake and later by fire. One thousand were killed and I saw many more. My Geary was rescued, and I later saw it burn. As well as all money in the banks. I am alive and have my family."

"There is not one foreigner who was killed and many foreigners were killed and burned. There was a number of men in the United club who were hit. Thousands of Japanese are dead from quake and fire. Many more thousands were reported by Japanese of foreigners has been reported."

"All the foreign workers who have returned to Japan. Mrs. Fagan and children will not live in Japan, but she will be going to the U. S. I may send them to China for a while at least. I am now going to do everything possible to help the General Electric company get going. I would not live in Yokohama again."

"I do not know who to say about the figures of Japan, as I did not see."

## WAYS TO HANDLE CHILLED MOTORS

Suggestions and Tips That Make It Easier to Start Car During Cold Weather.

### DIFFICULT TO START ENGINE

Much Trouble Caused by Lack of Knowledge as to What to Do When—Our Chief

It is not infrequently in cold weather to see cars being towed in to service stations because of difficulties of the motor in getting the engine started. These difficulties in a great many instances are due to the driver standing on the part of the motor as to what takes place under the hood when endeavoring to start the motor.

For the better of those motorists who have not yet learned precisely of the influence of cold weather that retard the easy starting of the engine the following instructions have been obtained from an experienced service man.

**Causes of Difficulty.**  
There are three main reasons for difficulty in starting the motor in cold weather:

1. Poor mixture of gas and air.
2. Weakness of battery.
3. Cold motor (most frequently caused by lubricating oil that is too thick or viscous for winter use).

An understanding of the changes which occur in the engine and its equipment and of what will overcome the difficulties of driving in all seasons.

The functioning of the carburetor is to regulate gas and mix it with an adequate proportion of air, which, under normal conditions, is the explosive mixture. Heat and cold have very definite influences on the carburetor's function.

Gasoline is a "volatile liquid and easily vaporized under the influence of heat, being less susceptible with a decrease in temperature. The gas line vapor is just as easily reduced back to liquid form under the influence of cold. Thus a cold carburetor through the carburetor will result in a very weak mixture of air and gasoline vapor." Therefore it is essential that the carburetor must be adjusted to give a stronger or richer mixture when starting the motor in our cold weather conditions.

### Battery Has Limitations.

The only part of the electrical equipment influenced by the cold is the battery, which provides both the power to rotate the starter and the current which induces spark at the motor by means of the starter in battery case free of all accessories. Therefore, even a battery has its limitations and can only stand up to much more.

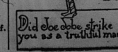
Furthermore, it is true that with a lowering of the temperature the efficiency of the strong battery decreases. So if the battery is a cold weather starter is less able to do its work because of deriving less power from the battery than under normal weather conditions.

Heat causes oil to become thin and flow easily. Cold causes it to congeal and become viscous or sticky. It is readily susceptible to either influence. The moving parts of the motor are covered with oil, which becomes congealed if the motor is left to stand all night at a low temperature. If it be started the motor will literally "blow up." It is then that the starter is called upon to perform its task.

Lubricating oils are obtainable in varying degrees of "thickness" or "thinness" and normal temperatures. They are usually termed Arctic, light, medium and heavy grades, according to the climate. It is the Arctic grade of all that is recommended for use in cold weather.

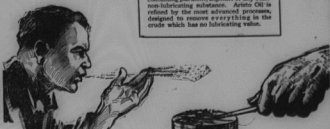

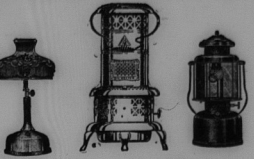
