HELD UP TO-DAY

The State Bank of Owensmouth was held up by two highwaymen at 1:10 o'clock this afternoon.

Two fellows leisurely entered the bank and walked up to the teller's window, covering Cahler, R. L. Henderson and Ralph E. Goodall. They and the others in the bank at the time—Mrs. M. Olive, A. G. Sennewald and P. R. Hardesty—were ordered to "kiss 'em up" and handed into the vault, while the robbers gathered up the currency in the counter drawer, estimated by bank officials at about \$1200 to \$1500, then out and made their escape in a small roadster.

The vault door was not locked and as soon as the robbers left the bank officials were able to give the alarm and a posse was formed and pursued followed.

When The Gazette went to press the robbers had not been apprehended.

CALIFORNIA NEWS BRIEFS

A brandy still of the "backbone" variety in the attic of a Sacramento residence exploded and set fire to the house.

With auto bus service paralleling street car lines, Oakland city is to direct competition with the traction company.

When eight flying mail service boats regularly the first of the year Sacramento is promised consideration as a landing field.

Butt hose, it was killed by accident at discharge of a shot gun in the hands of the 7-year-old child in the latter's home at Belvedere.

The case involving ownership of a tract of land in the north addition of Modesto, valued at \$1,500,000 and belonging to the Newport estate, will have a rehearing in November.

Sheltonite of new age groups, have been dug up fifty feet below the Indian cemetery of Santa Barbara by a paleontologist from the Smithsonian Institution, who attributes great importance to his discovery.

A new Second Presbyterian church to cost \$100,000 is planned for Los Angeles. The building is to include a kindergarten and a swimming pool and a community hall for use of the Y. M. C. A.

J. T. W. Davis, who had claim to being the oldest person in Shasta county, and whose varied career had embraced many professions from newspaper man to mine promoter died recently at Redding. He was 92.

The international legal battle over the custody of 4-year-old Charles Farneside, Jr. came to an end when his father and mother's parents were cited as the child's parents.

The Elmore-shasta Valley Irrigation District has been dissolved by unanimous vote and steps will be taken at once to form a new district for the purpose of adopting a strategic plan for irrigating a smaller district.

A new oil gusher was brought in near Los Angeles on the Morse company's holdings last week, with 1,000-barrel flow. A spark from a breaking valve set it afire and burned for ten hours before being extinguished.

John J. McCallan, organizer of the Mormon tabernacle at Salt Lake City and famous throughout the United States, collapsed while practicing at the municipal organ in the Civic Auditorium, San Francisco, and was taken to a hospital.

A warning signed by "U. S. Backbone" and address to the Ku Klux Klan was received by the Santa Rosa Press-Dispatch cautioning the "boys" to be on hand for the "start of the 'start'." "Woman is clean and we are going to keep it clean," the advertisement said.

The state convention of school superintendents in session at Riverside asked for a special committee to reorganize the course of study in the elementary schools of the state. The resolution followed a heated discussion of the three "R's" and the amount of time allotted to rudimentary studies in the elementary schools.

Mr. Wanda Francis de Bijpman, 39, died at Monterey, Oct. 22. He had lived in California under the name of Lewis Wanda Grayson and twenty-four U. S. presidents, she is said to have been the widow, living mostly at the time of her death. A wife to have been, she had been in charge of a 12,000-acre estate in Salinas valley.

The San Francisco exchange is the second oldest stock market in the United States, having been founded in 1842 with forty charter members.

Plans for the annual fair of the All Saints Catholic Church at Hayward, Nov. 25, 26, 27, have as their keynote "Remains of a mission, an attempt of the first white missionaries of human beings, estimated to have been started from 1,000 to 15,000 years ago, discovered at Point Mesa, Ventura county, by a representative of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C., the same party that made discoveries of great scientific value on the Barton Mount site in Santa Barbara county. The place of the last discovery was the site of an ancient Indian rancheria.

The women's council of the University of California has formulated a plan to conduct ten-day-leave-leave women students must leave their families and friends for a week-end night, stimulate slumming parties and be attended by escort if not in the company of a friend. Sororities will inflict punishment for violations.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Ogden of Rock-Point county are searching the state for their 15-year-old daughter, Yvonne, who disappeared from the fruit packing sheds at Loomis at about 10:30 p. m. in an automobile driven by a woman. Word that she is well and contented would be a great relief to her parents.

The work of advertising California which is being done with the assistance of the California, Inc. to attract homebuyers was illustrated with motion pictures before the representative of the twenty counties of the Sacramento watershed assembled at Sacramento.

Press articles are seeking to know the identity of a man whose charged body was found in a swimming tank on a remote ranch. Rumors tell of last parties that paid frequent visits to the place at night. A discharged shot gun was found near the body and the only door was unlocked.

Rev. C. E. C. Hodgson of Los Angeles was elected treasurer of the Episcopal church synod of the Pacific and Rev. P. D. McVey of Fresno was made provincial representative on the national conference of papistry, the Fresno gathering.

The week ending Oct. 28, twenty-three new oil wells were reported to the state bureau. The Torrencia field had 11, Long, Henderson, Seal, Pa Strington, I. Midway, S. Los Angeles county and West Whittier, 1. Seven wells were abandoned.

Field deputies of the internal revenue service are probing suspicious territorial evasions of profit reports from the state and the tax district of California. An order has been made for transcripts of all doubtful transactions.

The railway commission has set Nov. 1 the date to hear arguments of attorneys for and against the Key Route extension reorganization. Testimony was concluded before the commission at Oakland last week.

Prohibition Director Samuel Butler has denied that John Yall was acting under his name in the raid at Redlands when he shot and killed Deputy Game Warden James S. White, or that Yall had any authority to conduct a raid.

The transfer of \$200,000 worth of stock of the Crowley Launch and Tugboat Company from David T. Crowley, last week, shortly after the former had been sued for divorce, is under probe at Oakland. Authorities are investigating the circumstances surrounding the transfer, two years ago, of John Fuller, wealthy banker, who shot and robbed in his office, Alex Kink and suspected of the crime.

Two men arrested at San Joaquin, Ind., following a filing station halting, confessed to robbing a California bank at the Los Angeles suburb, Inglewood, Ga., Aug. 23, when \$1400 in money and securities were taken.

Proceeds were returned by the grand jury at Ukiah charging W. T. Dickson and Frank Joyce of San Francisco with fraud for selling \$200,000 worth of stock in the Coast News Car corporation.

R. P. McLaughlin, former state oil and gas supervisor, has taken the vice-presidency and general management of the Blinnet Cove Irrigation Company with headquarters at Los Angeles.

Foodstuffs reductions, effective Nov. 13, ranging from 5 to 20 per cent between California and points in Nevada, Utah, Wyoming and Colorado are announced for all classes of livestock.

Plans to complete the Turlock irrigation project were approved by a vote of 10 to 20 and will provide funds for installing an electric power project at the Don Pedro dam. That has awarded the contract for construction of the Wandover out-come project at \$125,000.

A skeleton found in a sitting position in the sand and debris four feet below the surface of Parker river near Yermo, is thought to be of some person deceased many years ago.

Construction of America's most important highway contract for freight, which setting only 500 miles, is being supervised by State Engineer Francis H. Harsh, Jr.

WALNUT PRUNING DEMONSTRATIONS

With the end of the harvesting season in sight, walnut growers everywhere getting ready to commence pruning. For the purpose of showing the latest methods recommended by the college of agriculture, a series of field demonstrations on pruning has been arranged by the agricultural extension service in co-operation with the walnut growers' department of the Farm Bureau. Five meetings are planned, one to be held Thursday, November 15, morning in the San Fernando Valley. The specific locations for the meetings will be announced in the near future. The demonstrations will be conducted by Farm Advisor's office advised by W. B. Hooper, extension specialist in walnut culture, University of California.

Most Rogue Seed Potatoes Plants The so-called "rearing out" of potatoes for seed purposes is being taught in Los Angeles county at a place where by destroying the diseased plants as fast as they appear in the ground in order that seedling plantings may not be infected.

The general class of trouble known as mosaic, early dwarf or curly leaf are carried from plant to plant by certain insects and if unchecked will soon deteriorate the whole lot. New seed then becomes necessary. The farm advisor's office advises early and continued "roguing" as it is called, wherein diseased plants if removed, tubers and all before it insects appear. Delayed or inefficient roguing will not give good seed and on the contrary leads inevitably to the necessity of starting all over with a standing of the disease factor.

THE TAXPAYERS' BURDEN

One person out of every twelve over the age of 17 gainfully employed in the United States, on the basis of the most recent census figures, is on the public payroll, as the result of which the people are footing a salary bill of nearly \$4,000,000,000 a year. These figures were made public in a statement issued by the National Industrial Conference board discussing the rising wave of taxation and its relation to the public welfare. With \$4,000,000,000 non-taxable securities the burden on taxpayers is enormous. In its statement the board asks whether government agencies in this country have not over-extended themselves. The annual cost of salaries paid directly to active and inactive government employes is \$91 a person over 10 years of age gainfully employed, who comprise in the last analysis the large body of taxpayers in the nation.

Carlson's running into stupendous figures as above indicated require study conducive to rigorous retrenchment in public expenditure, to elimination of waste and duplication and to a reduction of needless functions and services. The banking interests of our country are feeling our top heavy load of non-producers. The board has ascertained that, exclusive of pensioners, there are 2,700,000 public servants on the payroll of national, state and municipal government. They receive \$3,500,000,000 a year in pay. Pensioners and other inactive number 4,000,000 persons and they get annually \$300,000,000. Totaling the active and inactive list, the board shows that the public's payroll is close to 3,400,000 men and women. Further analysis of the board reveals a public payroll cost to every man, woman and child in the United States of \$34 a year.

CURBING ACTIVITIES OF AUTO THIEVES

Auto thieves are finding it more and more difficult to make a "living" in the southern counties of California. The sun of the auto thief is setting, and that his activities are being curbed is the encouraging report emanating from the theft bureau of the Automobile Club of Southern California.

Club detectives engaged in rounding up thieves in the territory of the state lying between the Mexican border and Monterey county, declares that motorists are more careful in locking their cars and in keeping a weather eye out for suspicious looking characters hanging about.

As the case now stands, however, there have been approximately \$5,000,000 worth of automobile thefts in Southern California to date this year. This figure is based on accurate information compiled by the auto club theft bureau from data secured in the thirteen counties of the southern part of the state.

A large share of this loot has been recovered from the thieves, but a portion of it is a total loss to auto owners.

Investigation of strangers peering into private garages for the storage of motor cars under suspicious circumstances is urged upon all parties renting such garages. It is said that auto theft gangs are renting private garages in some of the smaller towns, where they store cars which have been stolen in the cities, until the police chase has blown over. Then they take the cars out of such "storage" and sell them at reduced prices.

That this part of America will see a menace for auto thieves who are driven westward from the east by cold weather, is the determination of auto club officials who have planned an strenuous drive against the activities of miscreants during November, December and January.

Ford motor No. 8,500,000 went off the assembly line at the Ford Motor company's plant in Highland Park near Detroit, on October 4. It is announced that the last million autos were produced in seven days less than three months, for motor No. 8,000,000 went out July 15, this year.

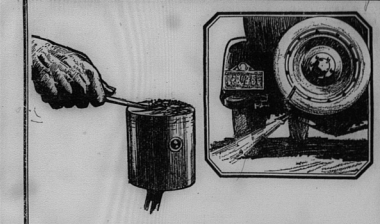

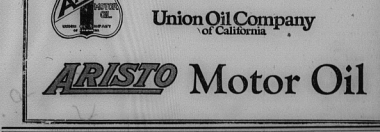

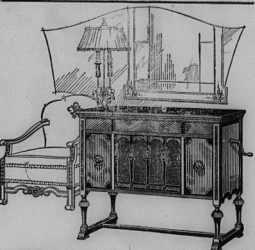
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
