Chatsworth Women's Club

- At the first meeting, the membership adopted a constitution and a purpose and they chose the colors pink and green.
- They also agreed on a motto:

Bite off more than you can chew, and chew it,

Plan more than you can do, and do it,

Hitch your wagon to a star, sit tight, and there you are.



History of the Chatsworth Women's Club

- ► IT WAS 1921
 THE WAR TO END ALL WARS had been fought and won.
- ► The 19th AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION had been ratified and women were given the right to vote in all municipal, state and federal elections.
- **WOMEN** were "heady" with power and a sense of being able to contribute to something in a new-found way.
- ▶ IN CHATSWORTH, women translated this new sense of power into a Women's Club dedicated to improving their community.



History of the Chatsworth Women's Club

▶ **DURING THE 100 YEARS** since then, women's role has changed dramatically. What was considered the woman's role when the club was formed is almost non-existent today.

► The community itself has changed. The occupational structure is different, the economy, the demographics — all have been altered, changing the everyday contribution of women to society.

The first Chatsworth Woman's Club Year book was published for 1922-1923.


It was called the Woman's Community Club of Chatsworth.

General Federation of Women's Clubs

Founded in 1890, Five thousand clubs had joined by 1906

The club voted to join the General Federation of Women's Clubs across the country in Dec. 1921. Becoming officially recognized as "Federated" in February of 1922.





Devonshire, leading to Chatsworth, was a country road lined with cork oak trees from 1915-1951. Citrus groves and fig orchards were abundant.

The club started with 24 charter members



They grew from 24 to 79 members by October 1922.

The Club Building

In February 1922 they broke ground for the first club building.

It was called the Chatsworth Community Building, on the southwest corner of Devonshire and Owensmouth.

The Chatsworth Community **Building** was co-owned by the Chamber of Commerce and Women's Club, and space was also provided for Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, and the Red Cross.

Why did they pick this corner to locate the building?

From 1898 to 1915, the Post Office was located at the General Store at Lassen and Santa Susana, which was considered the center of town.

In 1922, The Post Office was located in Clements' Grocery, on the southeast corner of Devonshire at Owensmouth. Across the street north of Clements' was the Alamo Garage (today's Cowboy Palace Saloon in the same building).

The **Chatsworth Community Building**, on the southwest corner of Devonshire and Owensmouth, was built in the new center of town.

A toast to the success of the club was given by Mrs. Jacob Jepson. The President, Mrs. Frank C. Hageman was presented with a beautiful boquet in appreciation of her efforts in bebuilding were thanked for making it possible for the club to have such lovely home.

The club had as guest Mrs. Tuerhella, district vice president of the Federation of Woman's Clubs. Mrs. Tuerhella brought an encouraging message to the club from the Federation.

There was a delightful musical program given. Mrs. Bessie Howell of Los Angeles sang a group of songs accompanied by Mrs. Walker, also if Los Angeles. Mrs. Lavalle Johnson, member of the club, rendered two piano selections.

Mrs. Richard Williams, member of the club sang a group of songs.

A reception followed during which the rooms were inspected. The members were very pleased with the success which the committee on furnishings had achieved. The rooms are beautifully and very artistically appointed. Each of the seventy-nine members of the W. C. C. C. has reason to be proud of the progress of the club and of their new home.

candy --- sixteen dollars and sixty cents.

Bells of the El Camino Real


Mrs. A. H. Haworth, was the president of the Chatsworth Women's Club from 1923-24.

During that time, desk bells were presented to those organizations that contributed to the effort of sponsoring landmark bells along the El Camino Real.

The one on the left was donated to the Chatsworth Historical Society by her grand-daughter Joan in 2005.

1906 the first bell was installed at the Plaza Church in downtown Los Angeles. By 1940 over 400 bells could be found along the El Camino Real.

Bells were first hung along the roads as purchased or sponsored by either the local county supervisors offices, Women's Clubs or local Sons and Daughters of Pioneer Organizations.



1930's

The annual **Bridge party and turkey dinner** continued each November with a large turnout of women from other organizations like Mrs. Eugene (Willette) Biscailuz, the president of the Women's Breakfast Club who was also the wife of the Sheriff of LA County.

Over the years as they continued to host this event, the local papers praised the Chatsworth Women's Clubs efforts as a hosting club.

Other programs continued providing a musical and entertaining outlet for the members on a semi-monthly basis.

The membership was over 100.

Welfare was the key work of the Club for the Thirties. In 1932-33 no dues were paid, but the women organized a soup kitchen and sewed for needy families.

BRIDGE PARTY AT CHATS-WORTH WOMEN'S CLUB

The bridge party and turkey dinner, given by the Chatsworth Women's Club November 16, was largely attended and was a most enjoyable affair. A bountiful and delicious turkey dinner was served, after which the tables were cleared and guests vied for the prize live turkey to be raffled off, which had been donated by Mrs. Geo. D. Chambers, president of the Canoga Park Women's Club. Beautiful baskets of fruit were given as table prizes. As a hostess club, the Chatsworth Women's Club has no peer.

In 1925 a branch of the Los Angeles public library was opened in the building, sponsored by the Women's Club and Chamber of Commerce. The post office was next to the library, and Mrs. Mary Cowgill was postmaster and librarian.

In October of 1938 the Womens
Club voted to give up the Club
house rooms, now owned by
Salvadore Lombardi. The dinning
hall was no longer available to them
as needed for their regular luncheon
meetings.



Meetings were held at members homes until they could relocate to a new facility. But they continued to have programs and sponsor events.

1938

The Women's Club encouraged Marian Marsh, Chatsworth resident to become **Honorary Mayor of Chatsworth.** Annette Hughes of the Women's Club sponsored the Mayor movement. A big party was held in Marian Marsh's honor.

Present were Paul Kelly, Edgar Bergan (minus Charlie McCarthy who was left at home to rehearse his Sunday radio program) Wallace Ford, John Howard, June Lang, and Big Boy Williams.

650 people attended 450 barbeque dinners



June 24, 1938

It was a gay and colorful party, with 650 persons there at one time, and 450 served barbeque dinners, at the installation affair for Marian Marsh, golden-haired movie actress, with a scroll bestowing the high honor upon her. A lei of red and white carnations bearing a gold seal and date of the affair, was placed about her neck by Mrs. Annette Hughes, chairman, of the Chatsworth Women's Club, sponsor of the mayor movement.

Present were: Paul Kelly, Edgar Bergen (minus Charlie McCarth who was left at home to rehearse his Sunday radio program), Wallace Ford, John Howard, June Lang, and Big Boy Williams.

1940's

World War II and its consequences dominated the decade of the 40's

Members were continuing to help with **Red Cross work**.

Club members **assisted local needy families**, and helped organizations provide **baskets of food for Christmas**.

Sewing was a big project - - as in the Twenties. Members sewed making layettes for the families of servicemen, and "convalescent slippers" for the hospitals.

And of course, **members donated to the USO** for our servicemen.



In the 40-50's, a sign promoting Chatsworth, was located on the corner of Devonshire and Topanga in front of the Chatsworth Park Elementary School. It includes the part of the crest from the Duke

of Devonshire.

In 1944, the Women's Club moved in to the new Civic Center on the southeast corner of Devonshire and Owensmouth, which was the old Clements' Grocery bldg.

Club member Juliet Wilkens and her husband Melvin owned this property and made it available to the Women's club and other organizations.

In **1947 Irving Bibo**, a member of the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce and well known composer speaks to the Women's Club on their **26**th **Birthday Celebration**...

Bibo also wrote a song to help promote Chatsworth, titled "Chatsworth". It has been lost over time, but we found references to it.

In 1968 Mrs. Ruby Campbell (member of the Chatsworth Women's Club) performed the song for the 80th birthday of Chatsworth.

In 1973 at Chatsworth's 85th birthday celebration, the words to the song were recited by the Kiwassee Wa Kani Campfire girls.

Virginia Watson recalled the Women's Club singing the song at meetings prior to 1988.

Chatsworth Club Has 26th Anniversary








In 1949, a new community building was built on Topanga north of Devonshire, called the Chatsworth Center. It was co-owned by the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce and the Chatsworth Women's Club.

Frank Schepler belonged to the Chatsworth Chamber and his wife Eleanor belonged to the Chatsworth Women's Club, and they donated the land to build the building.

Many community groups used the building.

It was sold to the Jehovah's Witnesses in 1971, a new Jehovah's Witness Kingdom Hall building is there today.



1950's The Fifties were baby-boom years for young families, and a junior club was active for many years, but officially formed and chartered in 1959.

The club continued work for veterans and handicapped children.

They also collecting clothing and supplies to provide to Native American families.

As an agriculture area, the **Women's Club** sponsored the **Chatsworth 4-H Club**.

The 1949 clubhouse was great for parties...The club hosted a Hawaiian Luau and an Escort Dance to include their husbands and guests.

The club continued to host it's **Mother Daughter Presentation Tea**


1960's

The 1960's changed Chatsworth from a quiet, agricultural community, to an upscale suburb of a vibrant, growing Los Angeles. They were eventful years for the club. Membership was up and club members were very active.

Some of the projects sponsored were:

New Public Library on Devonshire at Variel
New City Park at Chatsworth Park North
Chatsworth Parade entries and management
Canteen Club sending monthly packages to Vietnam soldiers
Chatsworth Community Coordinating Council formed in 1961
Chatsworth Historical Society founded 1963
Chatsworth High School opened 1963
Pioneer Church moved to Oakwood Cemetery 1965






In 1963 Chatsworth got its first high school and the club participated in the dedication. They helped with planning for the school to secure the history of Chatsworth with a Chatsworth England theme.





Service organizations were named English terms: Devons, Bobbies, Ladies, Knights, House of Commons



The Women's Club was busy with other events too.

The Literature Section was active, and several art shows were sponsored at the new Chatsworth High School. This featured both local talent and high school student art.

Another major event was the Mother-Daughter Tea, sometimes called the Debutante Tea, where daughters or young community minded students were presented and scholarships announced. This group was from the first CHS graduating class

In 1963 Virginia Watson wrote "A Childs History of Chatsworth" written for students.

The Chatsworth Women's Club offered to pay for printing if she would write the book.

The Chatsworth Junior Women's Club distributed the book free to local schools and libraries.

The book was subsequently republished by the Chatsworth Historical Society in 1991 and is now in its Fourth edition as "Chatsworth History".

1970's

The Seventies brought trying times. A huge fire burned more than forty homes, some of them members' homes, and the Club joined the community in providing emergency services for six weeks at the clubhouse.

Floods followed, and on February 9, 1971, came the Sylmar earthquake.

In 1972, the Clubhouse was sold, but philanthropic work with veterans, a convalescent hospital and the new Haven Hills shelter for battered women continued. Our Canteen Club continued to send letters and packages to Vietnam.



1980-90's

During the Eighties and Nineties our philanthropy continued to provide scholarships for graduating students at **Chatsworth Senior High School**.

Annually, we gave a scholarship to a graduate of **Rancho San Antonio "Boys Town of the West**" as well, and then the District gave one too.

We provided **Hugh O'Brian Youth Scholarships** to the Chatsworth High Leadership class annually, and our donation of box tops, soup labels and scrap aluminum have bought library books and playground equipment for

several **Elementary Schools**.





1988 Chatsworth Centennial Celebration


The Women's Club had an active roll in the Centennial Celebration. Bea Berman was the Chairman.



2,482 books donated







Our current location since 2019 is the **Rockpointe Clubhouse** on Devonshire.




2020-2022

Although **COVID-19** became part of our lives for two years, our President Bonnie Cross kept the club active by encouraging our members to work together and support each other during the times we could not meet.
