The production was acted by stars of "The Cookie Jar Theater" and was under the direction of Mr. Parsons, assisted by Mrs. Parsons who was also responsible for the props.

The playlet was given for the first time on the birthday anniversary of Sally Ann Parsons as entertainment for guests at her party. A repeat performance was then staged before selected guests including parents of the players.

Sally Ann enacted the title role of Princess Nina while Henry Ditto played the page boy. Mary Jo Meyser was the Lady in Waiting, Jeanette Butler was Jolly the Jester, and Susan Meyser was Susie the Scullery Maid.


