

\$1600. DOWN THE DRAIN!

This is the 8th year that the Society has had to pay \$200. for the Completion Bond required by the Dept. of Building and Safety when we moved the Pioneer Church -- Los Angeles Historic Monument #14 -- to its present site where it is being held in perpetuity on property of the Oakwood Memorial Park Association. The Monument is being saved BY the citizens of our area FOR the citizens of the entire Los Angeles area as a life-enriching project for children and adults. It is a slow process. \$1600. has been hard to raise, and it is "down the drain" as far as its usefulness to us is concerned. We cannot move forward until we have water and electricity to the site, in addition to basic road work and levelling. These jobs are being done by Oakwood as rapidly as their available funds for the project, and their manpower, will permit. Then, and only then, can we paint, glaze the windows, and accomplish the rest of the finishing touches. Other Historic Monuments, such as those at Heritage Square or the Pico Adobe, because they are owned by the city, are not required to post a bond while the fund-raising and rehabilitation are going on. It seems unfair that citizens working to preserve an Historic Monument on private presmises must pay a penalty fee because the funds, in spite of hard work, accumulate more slowly. We shall be talking to Councilman Robert Wilkinson concerning this matter on June 21. He has always been sympathetic to our problems, and we hope that he can come up with a helpful solution.
