

President's Message

Sunday is our first fall event and I hope all of you will be able to attend. We have always had a fine time at our annual potluck which gets us started out right for the year.

As you know I have chosen "Lights, Camera, Action!" as the theme for this year. I hope we can accomplish many things--we have lots of action planned--now we must get the lights and cameras ready for the action to begin. Let's plan ahead and then get the job done.

Our most important project is getting the Minnie Hill Palmer Homestead Acre ready and our second most important project is our oral history program.

I spent a lot of time this summer working with Sarah Wright of the Mayor's office preparing our petition asking that the Homestead Acre be named to the National Register of Historic Places. We completed the form but they sent it back and asked for more information. I am working on that now.

At our request the Dept. of Recreation and Parks sent a crew of CETA workers out to Minnie's and they have really cleaned up the outside, pruned the trees, tiedup bushes etc. We hope to get a decking-type patio around the big Black Walnut tree and perhaps a little amphitheater in back for giving demonstrations. We hope to get Minnie's garden in again and ask the Cherry Blossom Garden Club to give talks and demonstrations on the plants and garden. Later on we will have docents and provide tours of the Homestead Acre two days a week.

We are planning to refurbish it and are using the 1900 Sears Roebuck Catalog (given to us by Violet Wilson) for reference as to period. We have acquired two items--a table bought for us by Everett Cleveland & wash tub-wringer stand bought by Celia Woodman. We will furnish the house in typical furniture rather than try to duplicate Minnie's house.

On the committee for reference are Ioline and Everett Cleveland, Celia, Lila, Lillian and Virginia (me). If you are interested in helping the committee, please let me know at the meetings.

Lila Schepler has agreed to be in charge of the Oral History program. We will work closely with Dr. Leonard Pitts at CSUN.

We have had two fine Boy Scouts helping us. Both boys are from Troop 226 led by Mr. Hayes. Brian Hayes and his crew cleaned up the church after vandals had gotten in and torn a board off the lectern, torn the shutter loose, scattered everything around and made a mess.
