

Mendenhall honored by officials

Los Angeles city and county officials Tuesday adjourned their meetings in honor of Ferdinand Mendenhall, Daily News executive, who passed away last Saturday.

Supervisors ordered the lowering of the flag at Patriotic Hall to half staff until after Mendenhall's funeral today at Forest Lawn Glendale.

Board members unanimously adopted the motion by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn as well as an adjourning resolution authored by Board Chairman Edmund D. Edelman calling for adjournment in Mendenhall's memory.

Mendenhall was vice president and director of special events for the Daily News.

Mendenhall, a World War II Navy officer and an active civic leader for more than 30 years, was particularly praised by Hahn for his "interests in all patriotic events."

At City Hall, Councilman Ernani Bernardi also asked the council to adjourn in Mendenhall's memory because of their long and close relationship.

In Memory Of

Frank C. Enderle

June 1908 - February 1981

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 21 at the Oakwood Chapel for a very dear friend of the Chatsworth Historical Society, Frank C. Enderle, president of Oakwood Memorial Park Association.

In 1963 when the Historical Society was in its first year and had just been given the little 1903 Pioneer Church (providing it could be moved within 90 days) Mr. Enderle offered the land so the church could be moved into Oakwood Memorial Park. He contributed money to help move the church, and was instrumental in getting many of his friends and associates to contribute money to the project.

Many other times the Enderles gave money in large amounts when we needed it for specific purchases or purposes. Frank also gave generously of his time, knowledge, business advice and friendly words of encouragement.

Before he had the first stroke, Frank Enderle was a familiar sight sitting on his tractor, actually doing some of the physical work toward making the little church's relocation and refurbish-

ment a reality.

After the church was moved into Oakwood, Mr. and Mrs. Enderle responded to the community's request to move the church a quarter turn around so that it would look better sitting at exactly the right spot on the hill, and they paid for the movers to turn it around.

Together Mr. and Mrs. Enderle paid for three quarters of the cost of publishing "A Child's History of Chatsworth," one of the major fund-raising projects of the society.

Frank Enderle was named a Life Member during the country's

bicentennal celebration at the rededication of the Pioneer Church, letting him know how much we appreciated what he had done for the

Truly a friend of the Chatsworth Historical Society, a man who shared our common dream of saving a bit of the history of our community, Frank Enderle will be sorely missed by all of us.

OUR MINNIE HAS GONE HOME

At the funeral for Minnie Hill Palmer on March 6, 1981, the minister, The Rev. Gerald Richardson of the Foothill Baptist Church, said, "Minnie A. Palmer has gone home" and told what a joyful person she was. He told of her interest in gardening and how her life, like a pebble tossed into a pool of water, rippled

out and touched so many people.
We,of the Chatsworth Historical Society, know that is true. Minnie, with her joyous attitude toward life, touched us all. Everybody knew her and called her by her first name as though she was an old friend. Little children knew her through her interest in baseball, Girl Scouts and the historical society.

People still come by the museum when it is open and tell us how they talked with her when the golf course was adjacent

to her property.

Her life began in 1886 when she was born in another house on the land we now call "The Homestead Acre." She was the seventh of eight children and lived most of her life in the home built about 1911 by her brother Lovell Hill, assisted by her father and Willard Johnson.

Minnie's childhood was short, children worked alongside

their parents in those days and Minnie helped her parents with the work of the ranch. Her life wasn't easy, the family raised their own food and preserved it and worked hard selling fruits to the men who built the tunnel. They also worked at picking and drying fruit here in the San Fernando Valley and in the Simi Valley.

Minnie married and left home but returned in the 1920's to care for her bedridden mother. After her mother died, the family stayed on. Her husband died and left her with two

children, but Minnie managed.

She had the typical pioneer spirit--the ability to face adversity with determination and a smile.

She enjoyed the birthday party we gave for her at the Mountain View Sanitarium last November when she was 94, smiling and enjoying being surrounded by her family and friends.

As the minister said, "Minnie has gone home," but her memory will live on in the work we do at the Homestead Acre.
