FISH of Chatsworth started as a community project in several of the churches in Chatsworth, but is now extended to the West Valley. It is a volunteer temporary emergency answering service in Jesus name. Started in 1971, we work through Cooperative Answering Service here in Chatsworth and received 1320 calls this year. Anyone needing our service may call - 882-FISH.

We had many fund-raising projects and parties during the year in which we received many donations and some new members. I was interviewed by the Valley News in April and a very nice article and a picture appeared. Through it our project was greatly enhanced. At our planning meeting in Feb. our Honorary Mayor, Ken Minyard, was invited, also Mayor Bradley and Councilman Bernson. More interest was created.

In November we received more donations and we were able to help 77 families. The basketswere packed at several participating churches.

The following churches are participating members and all were actively inin collecting donations of food and money and packing and delivering the food and gifts to 35 needy families.

A surprise gift of \$5000.00 was received through Councilman Bernson from Cal-Neva Cable Corporation in West Covina (the company that has been digging up little trenches in the streets for cable TV). I was also able to procure \$3000.00 in gift certificates from J. C. Penney's \$30.00 for adults and \$20.00--child. The selected families came from the Head Start families from Canoga Park and Reseda, and the Haven Hills Battered Wives and children.

A Big Thank You! to all those from the churches and the Boy Scouts and the Girls Scouts - all in all, we helped 166 families in December. 
IN MEMORIAM:

SOCIETY MEMBERS HONORED

At the 68th annual installation of officers banquet of the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce, two members of the Chatsworth Historical Society were honored. Virginia Watson was named Woman of the Year and Everett Cleveland was named Man of the Year.

Virginia's contributions to the community of Chatsworth date back to the early 1950"s and include working through many community organizations - the 4-H Club, Girl Scouts, PTA's of at least two schools; membership in St. Martin-in-the-Field Episcopal Church and many more. For the Chatsworth Historical Society, her many contributions are almost too lengthyto list. She was the veryfirst secretary, she wrote the book, "A Child's History of Chatsworth," and allowsthe proceeds to remain with the Society; she was historiographer for many years and is now curator; she has handled publicity for the Society since its founding. She is the mainstay of the Chatsworth Historical Society.

Everett was selected because of his contributions to the community and the Society - for always being there whenever needed to handle such diverse chores as storage, haulage and selling of donated items; for helping set up the annual used book sale, working there and then carrying all of the books back to Chatsworth. For having allowed the Society the use of his home and yard each June for our major fund-raiser, the yard sale. For doing electrical work and repair work, refinishing furniture and in general, always being there when needed. Without Everett, our fund raising efforts would be dismal.
