

Winifred Maclay Widney, youngest daughter of Samuel A. and Anna E. Widney, was born in Los Angeles, December 29, 1894. The Widneys, as a prominent pioneer California family, along with the Maclays, were instrumental in developing the area and founding the University of Southern California.

Winifred's life centered around her love of music. Professionally she was a teacher of piano, voice, organ, guitar and accordion. She interrupted her musical activities to drive truck as a civilian for the U.S. Army during World War II at Camp Cooke.

She fell in love with Simi Valley, California, acquiring her foothills 'retreat' in 1936. She made the valley her permanent home in 1963; once again teaching music to many valley residents - until 1979.

Winifred became involved with the San Fernando Valley and Chatsworth Historical Societies. This interest stemmed from the Maclays - her great uncle, State Senator Charles Maclay founded the City of San Fernando and his brother, Robert Samuel Maclay headed the Maclay College of Theology, which later was transferred to the University of So. California; thence to Claremont, California. These men were brothers of Arabella Maclay, who married Wilson Widney. Arabella and Wilson Widney were Winifred's grandparents and great-grandparents of Mary Opray Peterson of Gresham, Oregon.

Winifred started writing poetry and music as a young woman. Her poetry was always very private with her and it was only after considerable urging, that she allowed this volume to be published while residing with her niece in Gresham during the summer of 1982.



Please let us know which one, or more of the projects you would like to do......

Since the building was renovated and completed for use as a Museum the only improvements which have been made concern the development of the F.H.Schepler Jr. Memorial Library, and the resulting storage facilities from that development. We are badly in need of certain minimal development and equipment, which are necessary for the preservation of our various collections-which are one of the reasons for our existence as a Society. Other proposals listed here may be considered as desireable, or even as long-range plans or goals. We use here estimated costs, only (based on estimates from Catalogues, and other sources-and prices may have been raised due to inflation, etc.). We believe they are good "ball-park" figures. Some of the furniture items may be available locally, and thus we could save shipping fees. Some items may be available as "used" furniture, and thus save more money. If the Board of Directors approves this project in concept, correct estimates will be researched and presented at subsequent meetings. ings. 1.PHOTOGRAPHY: Frame certain pictures; enlarge petinent pictures; "blow-up" pictures to poster size for display; properly mark and identify all pictures; have many of our slides duplicated (as reserves in case of loss, and for use in a second lecture series). \$240.00 2.PROPER STORAGE OF PHOTOGRAPHS, DOCUMENTS, SLIDES, PRINTS: By the purchase of vermin-proof, acid-free boxes-such as those used for Archival Materiel at Museums.

\$2 each for 6 = \$12 \$210.00 3.DEVELOPMENT OF STORE AREA: Purchase an additional case, or hanging \$30.00 case, or hanging shelves, identifying flag or poster to notify"this is the store", do a display of items for sale in both Museum & Cottage. 4.SUN-BLOCK DRAPERIES OR BLINDS: Should be black out blinds or Milar \$400. blinds, or lined draperies to prevent the inevitable fading of photos, exhibits, and deterioration of paper and book bindings; as well as deterioriation of signs marking the exhibits. 5.SHELVES IN LIBRARY CUPBOARDS: To provide easily accessible storage \$15. at two levels. 1 sheet of 3/4" plywood will do it. 6.HOUSEKEEPING NEEDS: Clean and repair or remove refrigerator; lay \$? ? carpet in hallway to costumes; clean and wind-proof chair storage closet so other items may be stored there which are not in weekly or monthly use, purchase upright vacum for use on carpet in Museum & Cottage; door mat for outside front door. outside front door. 7. HANG SHUTTER DOORS IN DOORWAY TO STORAGE: Where draperies (needing \$150. mending) are now hanging. Should be dutch doors so lower portion may be closed while Museum is in use & and work is in progress in storage area. 8.ART DISPLAYER CASE: For display of pictures, newspapers, snap shots or \$400. small prints, documents etc. This would be free standing with very large "pages". 9.TALL & LIGHTED DISPLAY CASES: With storage below. May be placed \$2000. flat against wall. Need 4 eventually. 10.TRACK LIGHTS: Along ceiling, spotlighting cases needing it. 11. RENT TYPEWRITER 1 WEEKEND: "Idiot" type, to print all the \$ 25 explanatory & descriptive cards used for Exhibits, so they will be uniform and professional in appearance. Among the other needs for the Museum, but not listed here, are the following items: Desk Chair and carpet protector
Repair of clock for Museum wall
Scrap books for our history record
Large Glass case for changing costume exhibit & display
Bulletin Board for wall at entrance to library
Xerox accession forms for committee review and record Repair rocking chair and cover seat Costume bags for storage of costumes Etc. Etc.
