CANDY'S CORNER:

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING-THIS MONTH:

WHAT'S BLOOMING IN THE HOMESTEAD GARDEN? Just to the west of the screened entrance porch is the <u>Bird of Paradise</u>. (Strelitizia Reginae) This brilliant orange and blue birdlike flower, a native of So. Africa, is the official floral emblem of the <u>City of Los Angeles</u>. A relative of the banana, the plant was named in honor of Queen Charlotte, plant loving consort of King George III of England. She came from the German principality of Mecklenburg-Strelitz (Reginae is Latin for "of the Queen"). Favorite florist flowers, strelitzias are long lasting when cut. Our plant has grown to about four feet in diameter and will be in bloom for several months.





Planted along the east side of the house are two 6' tall Poinsettias (Euphorbia Pulcherrima) (Latin: pulcherrema, most beautiful). Classed botanically with our vegetable garden Gopher Plant the poinsettia is named for Joel Robert Poinsett (1779-1851) gardener, amateur botanist & diplomat from Charleston, So. Carolina, who was the first American Ambassador to Mexico following its indep endence from Spain in 1821. Serving in Mexico from 1825 to 1829, Poinsett sent plants of this spectacular winter-blooming euphorbia back to friends in Charles ton. Native to the southwestern Mexican states of Chiapas, Oaxaca and Querrero, the poinsettia was admired by the Aztecs

who called it cuitlixochochitl mean-ing, glowing flower". It requires short days to bloom & is identified with the winter solstice & Christmas. Its Spanish name is "flor de noche buena". The colorful display comes not from the tiny yellow flowers but from the brill-iant red bracts surrounding the flowers The 60 mi-an-hour wind gusts that we suffered recently tore many of the bracts, but the new ones are coming on.

COMMEMORATION OF: DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. 'S BIRTHDAY

Our state of California was the 18th state to proclaim Dr. King's birthday a state holiday - Jan. 16th in 1981. Schools will be closed on Friday, 15th. Dr. King is remembered as a remarkable, peaceful man who dedicated his life to gaining justice & dignity for people through non-violence. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his unceasing efforts to achieve social

As we commemorate Dr. King, we think of other American winners of the award-Theodore Roosevelt in 1906, Woodrow Wilson in 1919, Jane Addams in 1931, Ralph Bunche in 1950, George Marshall in 1953, Linus Pauling in 1962, and Henry Kissinger in 1973. They were all people who had a purpose and the determination to achieve it. In commorating his birthday, we salute not only him but also the many men and women in all of the nation's cultures who have given so much to so many.

History records the following events in his life:

1929 Jan. 15. Martin Luther King Jr. born in Atlanta, Ga.

1947 Became assistant to his father Rev. King Sr. at Ebenezer Baptist Church, Atlanta, Ga.

1948 Received BA in sociology through a special program for the gifted from Morehouse College, Atlanta.

1951 Given the Pearl Plafkner Award for scholarship. Graduated from Crozer with a B.D. degree.

1953 Married Coretta Scott in Marion, Alabama. Mrs. King was a student at the New England Conservatory of music.

1954 Installed by Dr. King Sr. as the 20th pastor of Dexter Ave. Church

Montgomery, Alabama. 1955 Received the Ph.D. degree in Systemic Theology from Boston Univ.

Yolanda Denise, the first King child born in Montgomery. In Dec. King began his role as leader of large groups of people. The 381boycott of buses involved day boycott of buses Inc. 21, 50,000 people and ended on Dec. 21, 1956, in success for Dr. King and the people.

1956 Montgomery buses were integrated on December 21.

Elected Pres. of the So. Christ-ian Conf.at its organization meet-1957 ing at Ebenezer Baptist Church. The second child, Martin Luther King III, born.

1958 STRIDE TOWARD FREEDOM: THE MONT-

GOMERY STORY published.

1959 Visited Ghana and India. Studied Gandhi's techniques of nonviolence in India for one month. Dr. and Mrs. King were guests of Prime

Minister Nehru. 1960 Conferred with John F. Kennedy, candidate for president, about racial matters in the U.S.A.

Two more of our Chatsworth Historical Society members have received the honor of having been chosen by the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce to be the "Man of the Community" and the "Woman of the Community" for 1982.

The presentations were given at the luncheon at the Porter Valley Country Club on October 28th. Leonard Chenard, Life Member of the Chatsworth Historical Society was presented by Bill Schepler, a member of the Society and of the Chamber of Commerce, as well as a long-time friend. All the accomplishments of our past-president, Sheelagh Watts was given by our Vice President, Laurie Dager. It is not possible to recall ALL of the things these two people have done for Chatsworth, but I will give an overview of many of their accomplishments:

Leonard Chenard

Should have been a recipient many years ago, but has been on the Award's Committee for this even for the Chamber of Commerce and "it just wouldn't have been ethical."

Life Member of Chatsworth Historical Society and active in any of our

projects.

He started the Chatsworth Jr. Baseball Team in 1957 and has been not only the coach, a counselor and a "great guy" the boys could look up to. Several of "his" boys have gone on to the Major Leagues.

He is active in the Rotarians and the American Legion, always showing leader-ship and guidance.

He is a Charter Member of the Chats. Rotary Club - on Park Committee to

get Chatsworth Park North. He was active in getting our Chatsworth Library Building and starting the Chatsworth Youth Foundation. Athletic Awards are given to Jr. High and Senior each year. He received such an award when he was at Canoga Park High and realized the importance of giving it to one of our students each year. He was a member of the committee to complete the Master Plan for zoning for Chatsworth and was the chairman for the Bicentennial Committee here. And much, much more........

Sheelagh is Past President (2 years) of Chatsworth Historical Society. She has held many offices including Smoke Signal Editor and is currently our Recording Secretary. She was one of the 5 founders of the Chatsworth Historical Society and is active in all our Fund Raising activities, even though she is very busy with her own florist business. And even then she is sharing her bouquets with all her organizations.

She was a member of the Chatsworth Jr. Women's Club for 5 years and one of their presidents. She then became a member of the Senior Women's Club and was active in that. She was named "Junior Woman of the Year" by the Sierra Cahuenga District.

She wrote the column "Out Our Way" for the local paper for 10 years.

She was Managing Sec. for the Chats. Chamber of Commerce for 4 years.



A great, great great grandson of pioneer Chatsworth settlers, Neils & Ann(Willden)Johnson, was born Oct.15 in Seattle, Washington. The new arr. ival is Ryan Lawrence Asher, first child & son of Ann(Johnson) & Larry.

Maternal grandparents are Ed Johnson of Chats. & Joanne Watson of Laguna Hills. Our Myrtle Johnson, widow of the late Harold Johnson, is great grandmother. Young Ryan is Myrtle's 14th great grandchild; she has 12 grandchildren, Winifred Maclay Widney, youngest daughter of Samuel A. and Anna E. Widney, was born in Los Angeles. December 29, 1894. The Widneys, as a prominent pioneer California family, along with the Maclays, were instrumental in developing the area and founding the University of Southern California.

Winifred's life centered around her love of music. Professionally she was a teacher of piano, voice, organ, guitar and accordion. She interrupted her musical activities to drive truck as a civilian for the U.S. Army during World War II at Camp Cooke.

She fell in love with Simi Valley, California, acquiring her foothills 'retreat' in 1936. She made the valley her permanent home in 1963; once again teaching music to many valley residents - until 1979.

Winifred became involved with the San Fernando Valley and Chatsworth Historical Societies. This interest stemmed from the Maclays - her great uncle, State Senator Charles Maclay founded the City of San Fernando and his brother, Robert Samuel Maclay headed the Maclay College of Theology, which later was transferred to the University of So. California; thence to Claremont, California. These men were brothers of Arabella Maclay, who married Wilson Widney. Arabella and Wilson Widney were Winifred's grandparents and great-grandparents of Mary Opray Peterson of Gresham, Oregon.

Winifred started writing poetry and music as a young woman. Her poetry was always very private with her and it was only after considerable urging, that she allowed this volume to be published while residing with her niece in Gresham during the summer of 1982.

Rings were exchanged at the lovely wedding of Anita Delvecchio and Joe Weidenfeld at the Lindley Ave. Baptist Church in Tarzana on October 16th. The Bride, daughter of



Gertrude Cook, wore a beige chiffon gown She wore a spray of rose buds & carnations in her hair. The groom wore a dark blue suit with a boutonniere of a pink rosebud and stalk. Joe is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Weidenfeld of Friendly Valley.
