The Pioneer Church is located in Oakwood Memorial Park - 22601 Lassen, Chatsworth



Chatsworth Historical Society is 20 years old,

(both events will be celebrated at our March 15th meeting at Glendale Federal)

Chatsworth High School, opened in 1963 and will celebrate its 20th anniversary on May 6, 1983. Ceremonies are being planned to celebrate this historic occasion - also - watch the papers for these events.

> HISTORY OF CHATSWORTH HIGH SCHOOL by Eric Stepans

Eric is a Senior in Mrs. Farley's 6th period Social Studies class. Mrs. Farley is the Chairman of the Social Studies department.

When the school opened for the spring 850 - 10th & 11th grade students and 40 faculty members. Three teachers, Walter Franks, Ralph Hallenbeck and Manuel Miranda are the original faculty members still teaching at Chatsworth.

The next year, under principal, Dr. Gjertrud Smith and a faculty of 59 teachers, 8 of whom are still here, Chatsworth graduated its first senior class of 240 students and its enrollment grew to 1100 students overall. Because Chatsworth High opened in the spring, there were two graduating classes each year one of which was in winter before switching to a single graduating class in summer.

Although Chatsworth is one of the newest high schools in the Valley, it was constructed at a time when orange groves and ranches domiinated the surrounding landscape. Indeed, many students would ride horses to school and hitch them up on the school perimeter before going to class.

Today, Chatsworth has grown to 2,600 students and over 120 teachers and administrators, headed by newly-appointed principal, Donna Smith.

It has a very good reputation throughout the city as a very academically oriented high school, as well as possessing a good athletic program.

It is also an integral part of the Chatsworth community. It has served as a Red Cross emergency WANTED! simulation location, an evacuation relocation center during brush fires and mud slides.

Its athletic facilities are the home of the Chatsworth Chiefs youth athletic program.

As students, we are proud of our school and try to uphold its high standards of scholastic and moral integrity.

She's been the kindergarten teacher to many of our children or grandchildren--the other kindergarten teacher is Virginia Chipperfield, also a LIFE member -- Chatsworth Park Elem.. We remember Jan as the founding member of the Santa Susana Mt. Park Assoc.-started to save the Stage Coach Trail and important sites in Chatsworth where Indians had formerly lived. She has been president of that organization several times, whose members, our Historical Society and other local organizations, were instrumental in saving Stony Point for a park. The current president is Cynthia Fichtner, who is equally as enthusiastic and dedicated as Jan.

Many members and friends have asked about the current status of progress in obtaining additional land to save some of these important sites: Conference with Cynthia Feb. 27th she relates the following progress: There are two open space areas - The Garden of the Gods & part of Devil's Canyon (the part that covers the hiking area). The Santa Monica Mountain Conservancy accepting the dedication when the Condo Development is complete. The Board agreed to accept the dedication with the SSMPA and other local groups to do the maintenance. There are plans for 550 Condos west of Topanga and south of the freeway. Each will have their semester in 1963, it consisted of approximately own Homeowners Assoc. "some will be affordable". SSMPA sponsors 3 hikes a month: Second Sunday, 9AM Chatsworth Park Elem. School-4th Sunday same time & place. 4th Saturday - family nature history walk - 9 AM, meet at top of Pass Road, at Rocky Peak off-ramp.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:

(in answer to the question, "Does anyone know the origin of the "Mother" orange tree in CA.)

In i873, William Saunders, Superintendent for Gardens & Grounds for the U.S.Dept. of Agriculture, gave Eliza Tibbets of Riverside, CA, 3 branches of a new orange variety that he had obtained from Bahia, Brazil. It was first grown in Wash. D.C. so was named the "Washington" navel. Quality was superior to any other orange grown in CA. The 3 trees started fruit-UNIVERSITY OF THE PACIFIC STOCKTON, CALIFORNIA ing in 1878. The response to these oranges was so great and the demand so high that Eliza could sell propogating material for up to \$5.00 a piece. Today one of the 3 original trees is still alive and bearing fruit at the head of ' Magnolia St. in Riverside. The original Mission Inn tree died.

Citrus is native to So. & S.E. Asia & the

Malay Peninsula.

CITRUS IN NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

During this same period of the mid-1800's citrus trees were also planted in northern CA. for the "Smoke Signal"? The most famous planting was that of Judge Joseph Lewis who planted 3 sweet orange seedlings at Bidwell's Bar outside of Oroville in 1856. One of these trees is still producing fruit although it was moved in 1965 to a site above the Oroville Dam. It is known as the "MOTHER ORANGE" and is evidently the oldest living orange tree in California.

Letter To The Editor

As my father, Jim Butler probably planted the majority of the citrus groves in Chatsworth, I was intrigues with the question concerning the origin of the orange tree. I relied on sources available in my home library but what I discovered seems well founded.

From an autobiography written by Charles Teague, the principal founder of Sunkist, comes the information that the Navel orange came from Brazil. Two of the trees came by way of Washington, D.C. to Riverside in 1873. The original Valencia trees came by way of London and were planted on the Chapman ranch in Pasadena in 1876. The article didn't mention where they came from but I would assume it was Valencia, Spain.

Hubert Howe Bancroft's "History of California" does substantiate the probable earlier introduction of the orange to California. To paraphase a quote from the book, he said: in spite of interest in dates as to when various fruits, including, oranges, were introduced into California, there are no records, but probably they were brought from "the peninsula" (Lower California) between 1769 and 1773.

Perhaps this information may be of interest. Thank you.
