

Another of our beloved pioneers has passed away: MYRTLE NAOMI JOHNSON January 10, 1985
She was lare to rest in Grand View Memorial Park in Glendale, beside her husband, Harold.
After the beautiful funeral service on Jan. 14th, a beautiful Memorial Service was held at
the Chatsworth United Methodist Church where she was an active member. This, too, was a
lovely service led by the pastor Rex Wignall - her friends, Lois Smith at the piano and
Wanda Headrick at the organ playing her favorite hymns followed by many friends and loved
ones "remembering" many sweet things about her. Most of her 12 grandchildren and 16 greatgrandchildren were there, as well as her four children & others. Her husband, Harold had
Passed away soon after they had celebrated their 60th wedding Anniversary. Her daughters
Wilda and Dorothy had taken turns staying with their mother after Harold's death, Wilda,
with Wilda's friend, Hilda Colley were with her when she quietly passed away.

I have asked Wilda to give me a mini-history of her life which we can add to our Archives.

MYRTLE NAOMI (POGUE) JOHNSON

Myrtle Naomi (Pogue) Johnson passed away peacefully at home on former Johnson homestead Property at Fern Ann Falls Road in Chatsworth, California on January 10, 1985. She was the widow of the late Harold Johnson, grandson of the 1874 homesteaders, Neils and Ann Wilden Johnson.

Myrtle was born February 23, 1901 in Burbank, California, the older of 2 children. Her parents and grandparents were early settlers of that community: Charles and Sarah (Edmunds) Pogue and Archibald and Elizabeth Pogue as well as Cassius and Susan Edmunds. She attended Burbank schools and was connected with Burbank First Presbyterian Church.

Survivors include 4 children: Sarah Grether of Santa Clara, CA; Wilda Johnson of Glendale, CA; Dorothy Wilson of Palmdale, CA; and Edmund Johnson of Chatsworth. There are 12 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren. The youngest great grandchild, born October 18, 1984, spent Christmas with Myrtle: she's named Fern Ann for the road where Myrtle lived (the road was named by the homesteader family for the ferns in the hills and the pioneer, Ann Wilden Johnson).

The Johnson homestead in the hills of Chatsworth was leased by Myrtle's family in 1918. There, she met Harold Johnson after the Nov. 11th armistice when he returned home to Chatsworth after serving as a mechanic in the U.S.A. Airforce overseas. They were married in the Johnson homestead house on June 21st, 1919. Harold and Myrtle lived near Stoney Point (west of the Caro Hatcher Spastic Home) for the first 5 years of their marriage. During that time, they were active at the Methodist Church and farmed to earn a living.

In 1924, the family now with 2 daughters, moved to Burbank. Two more children were born and income to support the family of 6 was earned by house-building and bee-keeping. Burbank First Presbyterian Church welcomed these new members.

By 1950, with the 3 daughters out on their own, Harold and Myrtle returned with son, Ed, to Chatsworth. Harold and Myrtle spent the rest of their lives at their home on Fern Ann Falls Road. Harold passed away in September of 1979. Both were active at Chatsworth United Methodist Church and had a special interest in the Christian education of the young people.

WE WISH TO WELCOME our newest LIFE MEMBER, Mrs. Dorothy Wilson. Dorothy is Wilda's sister, also a Life Member. Dorothy Frances (Johnson) Wilson has never lived in Chatsworth, but has spent much of her time here. As a young child, she spent most holidays here with her parents. Harold and Myrtle, visiting her grandfather, the late Charles Wilden Johnson, plus numerous other Johnson relatives, including her late Uncle Kelly and her late Aunt Katharine Johnson as well as her Aunt Dorothy (Johnson) Pogue and late Uncle Glen Pogue & myriads of cousins.

Dorothy is married to Herb Wilson. They are owners of Wilson Ambulance and Sick Room
Supplies in Palmdale, CA. They have four children and six grandchildren, all living in the
Antelope Valley. As already stated, Dorothy had been helping her sister, Wilda with their
mother who had continued to live at Fern Ann Falls, the home which was a part of the 1874
Neils and Ann Johnson homestead in the hills near Iverson Road and the 118 freeway.
