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
MINI-CONFERENCE .... OCTOBER 25

To honor this first century, the Chatsworth Historical Society will host a Sunday Afternoon at the Homestead on November 2, 1986 From 1 till 4 p.m., we will be open to members and friends. A formal presentation of the centennial will be held at 3 p.m., and the event will include demonstrations of crafts including quilting, crocheting, embroidery, wood working with old tools and other crafts of early days. The service was conducted by by a grandson, Rex Butler; the eulogy by Valeta Koller. A poem written by Mrs. Elwood in Chatsworth on Christmas Day 1932 was read by a grandaughter. Our security guard and good friend, Virgil was born in Quincy, ILL., on July 5, 1913; he grew up in St. Joseph, Missouri. The two moved to Burbank in 1941 where Virgil managed the Western Auto Store; they lived briefly in San Fernando then moved to Chatsworth on Casaba St. They had lived in the mobile home for 17 years, since the golf course closed. During that time Virgil worked as a recreation assistant for the Los Angeles Parks & Recreation Dept. Ruth retired over five years ago after working for Facey Medical Group for 35 years. A memorial service will be held at 2 p.m. on Sunday Oct 19 at Chapel in the Canyon; dishes will be appreciated. ## A LITTLE BIT OF SIN

You would have to have been born before the early twenties to really appreciate what the so-called Great Depression was really like. There were no jobs to be had - period! No part time jobs as gas station attendants nor at McDonalds. So, for that reason, when someone told me a stable hand at the Uplifter's Club in Santa Monica had quit, I was on my way to try an replace him. Even though I wasn't much of a horse lover. But, alas, I was too late and they had already filled the job.

As I was leaving they asked me if I had any strong feelings against gambling, which I didn't, having matched lots of pennies and really had in my time played a mean game of marbles! It seemed that the following Sunday night they were having a Charity

Ball and needed some dealers to run the games. I think they offered me \$2.50 and my dinner to show up "dressed to kill" in my graduation suit. I jumped at the chance.

I got there about five P.M. with two or three other young fellows. We were each to run some game of chance. The others, I think, had more experience than I had, so I was put in charge of a large Wheel of Fortune. But, first, before the guests arrived, we had a really scrumptious buffet- the nicest I had ever seen. Everything looked like it was from Good Housekeeping Magazine. Cheeses and all kinds of sliced meat and fancy deviled eggs topped with caviar (I had never eaten that before )- and the pies and cakes! I suppose I made a "pig" of myself but they didn't seem to mind.

Soon the guests began to arrive. They were either society or movie people, though there were some politicians as well. The only ones I still remember are Charlie Chaplin and our crusading City District Attorney, whom I was surprised to see at a gambling affair.

They gave\_me a covey of young debutantes who went out among the guests and sold chances on bags of groceries or hams. Periodically I spun the wheel and passed out several bags of groceries and a few hams.

I remember Charlie Chaplin did not feel he had gotten a fair deal and complained to me that he should have gotten a ham. I remember wondering what he would do with a ham. But, I took a chance, and made a special spin just for him. I was lucky- he lost.

When the dancing and music died down shortly after one A.M. I turned my money in to the gentlemen who furnished the games. They seemed pleased with what I turned in, but one of the other dealers had had a run of bad luck and they were giving him a bad time. They seemed to know how much he should have turned in.

So, it was back to the little village of Chatsworth in the wee hours of the morning in my Model A "pumpkin" after getting a glimpse of how the other half sometimes lived.
