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### CENTENNIAL QUILT

Chatsworth The Historical Society guilt for Chatsworth's Birthday celebration will incorporate a combination of two traditional patchwork patterns (as illustrated elsewhere in the Newsletter). 'the Road to California and North Wind....both appropriate to Chatsworth. It will feature pictorial squares honoring our history, natural attractions and historical It monuments. will also include a botanical profile of the community. When complete, the quilt will be permanently displayed at the Homestead Acre Museum.

Many of you are already aware that the quilt backing has been on display at the Museum for about a month. For \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children, signatures are being placed on the backing. The museum will be open on June 6 from 1 to 4 p.m. Please visit and place your signature on the quilt.

This is a group VOLUNTEER project being accomplished by experienced seamstresses of our community. It is not too late for interested volunteers to join the project.

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#### MUSEUM RENOVATION

What a rewarding project to work on! What an upheaval the two months have been! How wonderful it all looks today!

I want to tell you about the people who worked on the project because all of our projects begin with volunteers. The folks are,

Virginia Watson, Lillian Schepler, Millie Goff, Marian Hyland, Bette Butler, Ruby Swan, Mary Kitchens, Eileen Janess, Jack, Chuck Janess, Bill Schepler, Ramon Avila, Candy Craig, Craig, Lila Schepler. Altogether they clocked in 957 hours of service on the entire renovation. Even at \$8 per hour, that has saved the \$7256.00 Society What wonderful gift! I extend the gratitude of the Society to these folk.

A multitude of tasks were addressed:

1. The costume collection was logged in, assigned an inventory number and every item had this number placed on it -

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dresses, tuxedos, shawls, purses, hats, overcoats, wedding dresses, jewlery etc. All costumes have been placed in boxes or hung in garment bags and labeled by the decade each bag represents. The furs have been cleaned and placed with the collection.

Costumes have also been placed in the A and B collections, meaning that some costumes would be useful for a Fashion Show but might be a re-production rather than an authentic item of clothing.

- 2. The entire store has been inventoried and store cases re-decorated. The curtainshave been replaced with a colorful pannier. Potted plants now hang in the windows and interesting or antique plates have been hung in the windows.
- 3. The entire library has been inventoried, a card file has been made of every book, pamphlet, monograph etc.
- 4. The exterior museum closets have been made more useful by installation of sturdy shelves. On these are such items as the public address system and podium; large photographs, maps, posters at least 3' x 3' in size. Also collections which have been donated such as the Canteen Club Albums (for the boys in the service), PTA year books. organizations now Several donated their defunct have memorabilia to the Society for their preservation. The old fire bell from the elementary school is there along with 3 huge cartons of newspapers we hope to have micro-filmed

someday.
These storage systems were

labeled 1, 2 & 3 made more useful by the doors being changed so they open out and locks were installed. (The doors were painted during the "55 weekend" by fraternity members.)


5.Every item in our collections of photographs and artifacts were assigned numbers and placed in proper storage i.e. acid free boxes for all photos, etc. The cottage had previously been completed but was brought up to date with all of the items added during this year.

6. Everything was removed from the walls and cases. New enlarged photos were placed on the walls to tell the brief story of the early days of Chatsworth. Cases all have new displays dedicated to Indians (all prehistoric) memorabilia from Chatsworth. Another to Minnie Hill Palmer; another to tools used by early pioneers, many from the Palmer homestead such as Minnie's hoe.

7.All exhibition walls and cases have been newly labeled.

In the above brief description of work now completed, you have a word picture of the gift your fellow members have made for the Society. If you didn't get to Open House, Rose Festival, etc., do make it a special point to visit the first Sunday of the month so you can enjoy the New Look for yourself.

HOMESTEAD ACRE TOURS Sun. June 7, 1 to 4 p.m.


Zena Thorpe will replace Marian Hyland as lead docent and other docents are Helen Thomas and Millie Goff. Starting with this open house,

HE CHATSWORTH 100% BIRTHDAY QUILT ...

She was born Mary Elizabeth Spurrier on December 12, 1918 in North Platt, Nebraska. Her parents moved to Jackson, California when she was eighteen months old and then to Chatsworth when she was four and a half years. She grew up doing chores on her father's chicken ranch but took every opportunity she could to kick off her shoes and go climb trees or sneak off to read a book. She often told us her shoes had to be wired to her feet so her grandchildren come by going barefoot honestly.


She excelled in school and graduated valedictorian of her senior class. She had hoped to go to college to become a kindergarten teacher but the depression changed her mind and brought into her life her husband, Lewis Barksdale, of forty nine years and nine months. They had their first date on Saturday night before Easter Sunday and it ended with sunrise services. They fell in love and were married six weeks later on May 14, 1937. They made their first home in Long Beach, then moved to Idylwild and finally to Hemet. While in Long Beach they had three children, two boys and a girl.

She went to work for the County of Riverside Welfare Department in 1956 as a case worker in various capacities and retired in 1936. Besides raising a family and working she was involved with Eastern Star, Rainbow Girls, Boy Scouting, and the Romona Pageant. She and Lewis had become involved with Lions Youth Exchange about 1970 and had many adoptive Japanese and Australian families as a result. There were also many people locally who thought of Betty and Lewis as family.

One of her favorite things to do was to travel. We've had to check her calendar occasionally in order to plan activities. As many of you know Betty and Lewis were on vacation in Australia for an extended time. As some do not know she became ill from diverticulitis and peritonitis and lost the battle for her life on February 9 in Melbourne, Australia. A memorial service was held for her there. A memorial gathering is planned for March 1 from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the home of Tony and Patti Barksdale, 181 Possum Hollow, Anaheim, 714-998-2916. Lewis can be contacted at that address until May.
