IN MEMORIAM

Henry W. Berkemeyer was born March 8, 1893 in San Francisco, Calif. His family moved to San Luis Obispo and had a bakery there. He felt the San Francisco earthquake which knocked a box of stick matches off the wall that would have started a fire if he had not been there to put it out. His birth certificate burned up in the San Francisco fire that followed the quake.

He graduated from California Polytechnical School in 1910 and then came to Los
Angeles where he worked as an electrician
for Edison, Newbury Electric, Bullocks and
Lockheed. Soon after coming to the area
he was severely injured while working on
high voltage wires but he made a good
recovery.

He married Hildur Petersen in 1915 and they were married for 72 years. They had two children, six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. They bought and fixed up old houses, moving around the L.A. area for several years.. They even owned a chicken ranch in Reseda at one time. They finally moved to Glendale and stayed there for many years.

They moved to Chatsworth in 1943 and he opened an electrical shop in 1946. He wired the original Women's Clubhouse and Minnie Palmer's house along with many others. He finally retired and spent his time gardening and travelling. He was a member of the Elk's Lodge for 62 years.

He is greatly missed by his family and friends - he always had a lot of good advice to give or an interesting story about the past to keep his listener interested.
