#### CONGRATULATIONS!

At the June Awards Banquet of the Chatsworth Comunity Coordinating Council the Society's nominee for Chatsworth's Citizen of the Year was indeed named to that honor. Pauline Aue was nominated for her quiet but persistent support of both the Society and the Santa Susana Mountain Park Association as well as numerous environmentsal causes. We are justifiably proud of Pauline for all her work.

At the same time, another member of the Society was nominated for the same honor by another community organization, the Friends of the Chatsworth branch Library. John Thorpe was nominated for Citizen of the Year. This year the Awards Committee decided to honor two people for their outstanding contributions and John was also named Citizen of the Year.

These are just a few of the exhibits. Of Pauline's passion is the environment and her first community interest volunteering for the Save the Oaks committee at Orcutt Ranch Horticultural Lots of door prizes, and exhibits offered by Center. A member of the Theodore Payne the Los Angeles Dept of Water & Power Foundation, she works with her favorite native California plants and wildflowers, cleaning seeds and promoting an interest in using native, drought resistant plants in gardening - and she practices what she preaches in her own garden.

Pauline is probably best known for her work with the Santa Susana Mountain Park Association having been a member since 1974 and becoming more active with the group after her retirement in 1980. She has held many different offices and been on the executive board for the past eight years. She was petition coordinator for the SSMPA when the prospective Prop 70 initiative was being prepared for the ballot untold hours seeking worked volunteers to circulate petitions to obtain funding for more California State Paarks and to buy the rest of the land for a local state park.

Pauline has worked for the Society having served as a docent for eight years and as telephone chairman for almost that long; on the executive board for several years and has worked in the gift shop and the Frank Schepler Jr., library. She served on the Chatsworth Centennial Committee and rarely missed a meeting. Pauline is active with the women's fellowship of the Chapel in the Canyon Church, a group that raises money for abused women and children.

Last but not least, Pauline is a board member of the Coordinating Council having been active for the past eight years, serving as treasurer and hospitality chairman. A very well deserved honor indeed!

John has served as president of the Friends of Chatsworth Library on numerous occasions during the past ten years. He has worked on EVERY monthly book sale during the ten years when the Friends raised over \$50,000 for library improvements and books. He is so devoted to the library that when the Friend's storage bin was delivered to the wrong location he personally moved it to the proper site by using a fork-lift.

John is probably most well known for his work on the annual Holiday Parade that is

sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. John is owner of Yorks & Lancs, a local car repair business and each December John is in charge of providing trnsportation for the V.I.P. entrants. He brings such classics as Rolls Royces, Jaguars, London Cabs and double decker buses and usually drives one of the vehicles himself wearing his chauffer's cap.

John was very active with the Centennial Committee and was in charge of the Time Capsule. He attended every event and served soft drinks and supervised the parking areas at most events.

For the Chatsworth Historical Society John has co-chaired many programs - just as an example he erected the fence for the petting zoo at the first annual Pioneer Day and then helped out wherever needed, selling soft drinks and erecting sun visors over the many booths. Congratulations, John. Thanks for all the help.




