

FOR OUT-OF-TOWNERS:

The following buildings were red-tagged or severly damaged: Mason Avenue was hard hit starting north of Devonshire Street with the Pic'n Save store, Ross department store, Ralph's Market (to reopen this week), Wells Fargo bank is operating out of mobile offices, all the small stores on the east side of the street were badly damaged as was Thrifty Drug Store. The Rozann Zimmerman Ballet center was damaged but is now open, St. John Eudes Church may have to be rebuilt; the sanctuary of the Congregational Church was red-tagged. A lot of houses were damaged when chimneys fell in. The Chatsworth Post Office is fenced off and will be demolished. Private homes were damaged in different ways. Rockpoint Condominium suffered a lot of damage on the north side of Devonshire. The gym in Chatsworth Park South is unusable as the ground beneath it is unstable and will undergo further geological evaluation.
