Donna Afflerbach, Betty Summers, Lillian Schepler and Virginia Watson as well as Lila and Bill Schepler, all attended the Docent League of Southern California's workshop held at Frank Lloyd Wright's Hollyhock House, better known as Barnsdell Art Park in Hollywood. It was an audience participation workshop on communication and how to handle the problems that come up while teaching history through a tour.

IN MEMORIAM

Memorial services were held February 7, at Oakwood Memorial Park for Virginia Graves Ditto, a long-time member of the Chatsworth Historical Society and, at the time of her death, the oldest living native still residing in the area. Because of that, each year since Minnie Hill Palmer died, Mrs. Ditto has been extended the honor of cutting the community's birthday cake.

Born in Chatsworth on September 7, 1924, Mrs. Ditto spent almost her entire life on the same property where she was born near Chatsowrth.

She attended Chatsworth Park Elementary School and several times shared publically her memories of that experience. She attended Canoga Park High School and donated her high school sweater and yearbooks to the CHS collection.

A member of the pioneer Graves family of Chatsworth (Part owners of the Graves and Hill General Store) Mrs. Ditto's ancestors also included members of the Donner Party who crossed Death Valley.

She traveled extensively and loved it immensely. She enjoyed knitting, gardening, bridge and animals, especially cats, turtles and tortoises, and was known for her quick, witty remarks.

She is survived by her five children, four grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, and her sister Bonnie Jean Lakey of Vashon Island, Washington. Her son Henry is a continuing member of the CHS.

On Sunday, January 15, Heather Watts retired from the New York City Ballet after 25 years as a principal dancer. The program took place at the State Theatre in Lincoln Center.

Heather chose as her last dance, Valse Triste to the music of Jean Sibelius, chorography by Peter Martins; she was partnered by Jock Soto. It was an extraordinary event with standing room only. At the conclusion of the dance the audience gave her a standing ovation lasting ten minutes.

Curtain call after curtain call continued all the while roses were pouring over the stage from the rafters and from the audience. She received two huge bouquets of roses as well as a large heather plant and a number of people were on stage to bow to her.

The performance was televised on CBS that evening.

Aterward, friends hosted a party for 450 guests at the Landmark on the Park on Central Park West where it seemed that most of New York was present. Among the guests were Peter Martins, Jerome Robbins and Mikhail Baryshnikov.

Family members attending the event included Mark & Cynthia Watts, Kevin & Diane Watts, Jennifer & Mitch Green Heather's siblings; an aunt and uncle, Joy & Morris Broyles of Virginia and her parents, Keith & Sheila Watts.

Heather was interviewed on PBS by Charlie Rose a few days prior to the retirment. During that program, highlights of her career were discussed. Heather was the last of the Balanchine ballerinas, who had worked closely with the choreogrpher and company director, George Balanchine.

In 1979 at the request of then President Jimmy Carter, Heather appeared at the White House in a program of dance when she was partnered by Baryshnikov.

For the past 14 years she has directed the N.Y. State Regents School for Gifted Children in Saratoga Springs. In recent years she has directed a group of "Stars of the New York City Ballet," on tours of 90 cities in the United States and Europe. She turned her celebrity to charitable groups, helping raise funds for aid related causes as a director of God's Love We Deliver and for the Last Wish Foundation for children.

Heather received ballet training locally at the Sheila Rozanne Ballet Center before being admitted to the School of American Ballet, the training school for City Ballet. She joined the company at age 16.

We have been having only two major fund raisers a year. Our spring festival which has been called everything from a Rose Festival to a Garden Show and then in October we have our Pioneer Day. The rest of the year we carry on our Open House keep up the Cottage and the Museum and participate as much as possible in community events.

Money earned from our projects goes to pay for insurance (\$1250.00 a year!) paying for lights including air conditioning, telephone, Smoke Signals, postage and incidentals.


NOMINATING COMMITTEE NAMED
