DOWN MEMORY LANE...

Chatsworth residents appear to enjoy celebrating special events. It was twenty years ago, Patriot's Day on April 19, 1976, when the town started its year long celebration of the nation's bicentennial. Spear-headed by the Society and the Chamber of Commerce, a community breakfast was held at the Chaminade Cafeteria on Devonshire Street. Representatives of schools, PTA's, churches and all civic organizations planned the breakfast and guests from those groups provided table center pieces with a history theme. Honored guests were Mayor Tom Bradley and Police Chief Ed Davis and more than 200 people attended.

On the 4th of July, 1976, Chatsworth's most ambitious parade was held. The judges' stand was in front of Len Chenard's Paradise Shop and the temperature was in the 90's. In 1980, the Paradise Shop gave way to the present shopping center and office complex, Devonshire Street between Independence and Variel Avenues. Later in the year the Freedom Train raced through Chatsworth, delighting the townsfolk and train buffs alike. Views of the train were dramatic, especially as it roared around the curves and street crossings up and behind Chatsworth Park on to its destinations of Santa Barbara and San Francisco all the while blowing bright, white steam.

In 1988 the town celebrated the 100th anniversary of its founding on March 10, 1888, with

the registration of the first housing tract in what was to become Chatsworth Park. A huge party was held in the Recreation Building in Chatsworth Park South amidst birthday cakes donated by Ralph's Market, the chorale from Chatsworth High singing, "And Make the San Fernando Valley My Home," with again an honored guest, Mayor Tom Bradley. Catherine Mulholland served as emcee and introduced all the special guests and speakers - and the unveiling of the beautiful Centennial Quilt.

At about the same time the Chatsworth Methodist Church celebrated its centennial and the occasion brought back former members and ministers from years ago.

In 1990 the Chamber of Commerce held an anniversary luncheon at the Porter Valley Country Club to celebrate 75 years of service to the community.

The historic Pioneer Church, built in 1903 by pioneers, became a city monument and relocated in 1963. In 1993 the current tenants, St. Mary the Virgin Episcopal Church, together with the Society, honored the building on its 90th birthday, co-hosting a joyful tribute that included an Episcopal Bishop and famed cowboy star, Roy Rogers.

In February of this year (1996) the Chatsworth Women's Club held a special Jubilee Luncheon at the Odyssey restaurant to commemorate its 75th anniversary of service to the community.

You are all invited to attend another such milestone on Saturday, April 20, at 10 a.m., at the new Chatsworth MetroLink Station on Devonshire Street. Mayor Richard Riordon will be a special guest as will Roy Rogers and Dale Evans, who will arrive on a special historic train.

The personalized paving stones will be dedicated together with the memorobilia room, the community room and the childcare center. The Chatsworth High School band will perform and there will be other entertainment and refreshments available.

The Society will be represented by the executive board headed by 1st Vice President Bea Berman, in the absence of the writer. Virginia Watson, town historian will be a special guest. Those who live close by should plan to attend this vital new addition to Chatsworth


