#### **GETTY NEWS**

Barry Munitz, chancellor of the California State University system, has been named president of the J. Paul Getty Trust, a private foundation devoted to the visual arts and the humanities, and the umbrella organization that runs the J. Paul Getty Museum. Dr. Munitz will begin the job on January 5, and will succeed Harold Williams who has led the Getty since 1981 and who announced his retirement last summer.

The Getty Trust with its \$4.3 billion endowment, is the largest and richest arts and humanities organization in the United States. On December 16, it will open its new \$1 billion campus, designed by Richard Meier & Partners, in the Brentwood section of Los Angeles.

Meanwhile the original Getty Museum, the Villa on Pacific Coast Highway, was closed earlier this year for restoration and refurbishing, and will re-open in three years.
