# THE SESQUICENTENNIAL BEGINS

Zena Thorpe was an invited guest at the January 24<sup>th</sup> kickoff celebration in Coloma marking the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of James Marshall's discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill. Zena and co-designer Ellen Heck presented the Sesquicentennial California Quilt, a California Heritage Quilt Project, to Governor Wilson and the public. An immense ten foot square, it is still being finished by volunteer quilters in Sacramento. It will travel the state after its exhibition at the State Fair in September. The Society has reserved a stop in Chatsworth so we and other Valley residents can appreciate its full color and detail depicting California "golden discoveries".

#### **CONGRATULATIONS!**

On January 27, 1998 one hundred seventy acres in the hills behind Chatsworth Park South officially became **The Santa Susana Pass State Historic**Park. Members of our Society were on hand to cheer Jan Hinkston, founder of the Santa Susana Mountain Park Association, who symbolized the legion of people who worked so diligently for 28 years, each in their own unique way, to accomplish this dream.

The Society continues to show support for the success of the Historic Sate Park by having three of the Four-week Naturalist Education Program starting on February 21 at our site. Virginia Watson and Lila & Bill Shepler will provide expertise on the early settlers at the March 14<sup>th</sup> session. Anyone who is interested in enhancing their knowledge of the geology, wildlife, plants and Native Peoples of our area can attend. Details are on the enclosed flier.

#### A MINI TOUR

Attendees of the CCHS Symposium will be touring selected Valley sites. You will have to take that tour to learn about those places. However, here are some facts about a place the buses will pass on that tour---- the Van Nuys Airport.

In the era of the barnstormer, a small group of men incorporated to build an airport in the rural San Fernando Valley. Opened in 1928 under the name Metropolitan Airport, it consisted of 80 acres amid trees and farmland. The hangar fees for a biplane were \$35 and landing fees were 50 cents.

Howard Hughes, Hoot Gibson, Cecil B.

DeMille, Gene Autry and Wallace beery were among a growing number of stars flying at the expanding airport. Amelia Earhardt set a new speed record in 1929 at one of the many air races hosted there.

In the 30's Hollywood studio producers used it as a film location for the movies "Lost Horizons", "Storm Over the Andes", and "Men With Wings". "Casablanca " was filmed in the 40's, with "Lethal Weapon 4" just filmed recently.

In 1942 the United States Army acquired 163 acres of airport property and supplemented it with an additional 163 acres of land to construct what became known as the Van Nuys Army Air Field. After the war in 1949, the City of Los Angeles purchased the airport from the War Assests Administration for only one dollar----with the provision that the CA Air National Guard base remain on site. It was renamed San Fernando Valley Airport; then in 1957 received its current name the Van Nuys Airport.

The Air National Guard moved to the Channel Islands in 1990. Their former site served as a vital staging area for the military during the 1992 riots in Los Angeles and for the American Red Cross to prepare thousands of meals following the 1994 Northridge earthquake. 350,000 spectators at Aviation Expo '96 watched the B-2 Stealth Bomber make its first public appearance over Los Angeles.

Today Van Nuys Airport is touted the busiest general aviation airport in the world and the sixth busiest airport in the United States.
