

#### VALLEY VIGNETTE

Minnie Hill Palmer By Virginia Watson

Minnie Alice Hill was born on the property we now call, "The Homestead Acre" on November 30, 1886. That was in the fall of the same year that her parents settled on 110 acres outside the Ex-Mission San Fernando land grant. That was two years before the town of Chatsworth Park was recorded in March 1888. Minnie said that when she wrote to the census bureau for confirmation of her birth they listed it as the end of December, but she said the family always celebrated on November 30. Minnie was the seventh of eight children born to her parents, James David and Rhoda Jane Hill. Most of her brothers and sisters were much older than Minnie. But a younger sister, Calla Lily was born four years later in 1890 on the same property here in Chatsworth. Minnie and "Callie", as she was called, had little time to play, but grew up on the ranch roaming the hills that were covered with blue mountain lilac in the spring and helping with the chores at home.

Minnie went to school where the Chatsworth Park Elementary School is today. It was called The Santa Susana School then and we have a picture of it in our collection. Minnie started in the first grade (they didn't have kindergarten then) and went all the way to what she called "high school." There were classes held in the "Pioneer Church" for older students in 1904,

Minnie said in an interview in the 1960's She met her future husband when she went in to Los Angeles to visit. Alfred Palmer lived in the vicinity of 118th Street in Los Angeles. In order to earn extra money for her wedding Minnie worked at "cutting fruit" for the N. A. Gray family who owned an orchard on Lassen Street near Topanga Canyon Boulevard. Her sister-in-law, Eva Hill, made the dress after Minnie's brother, Lovell bought the material. The CHS has a picture of Minnie and Alfred on their wedding day, August 12, 1909 hanging on the wall.

"Cutting fruit" was a step in the process of drying fruit. The Gray family raised apricots. First they were cut and the seeds removed, then the fruit was placed on the roof of the "cutting shed" to dry. Minnie said that many of the early families in Chatsworth worked at cutting and drying fruit locally and also traveled to nearby Simi Valley to help in orchards there.
