



VETERANS DAY: On November 11, 1918 an

and we thought we might have a float with some of our armistice ended the fighting in WW1. On November 11, 1921 the body of an American unknown soldier was laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery, attended by President and others. In 1926 congress adopted a resolution directing the president to issue a proclamation calling on citizens to observe the day. It did not become a federal holiday until 1938, (during which time it was known as Armistice Day.) In 1954 congress and President Eisenhower signed a bill to make it known as Veterans Day. In 1971 an effort was made to change the date to the 4th Monday of October, but this caused much confusion and in 1975 congress passed legislation that made Veterans Day revert to November 11, to be effective in 1978.

> THANKSGIVING DAY: Every year on the 4th Thursday of November the people of the United States, it's territories and Puerto Rico pause to express gratitude for the bounty and good fortune they enjoy. All through history people had special festivals to give thanks. Since most settlers who came to America had known some form of thanksgiving in their homelands, it is not surprising they continued this custom.

> The first Thanksgiving in what was to become the United States was held on August 9, 1607 by colonists in Maine. Reverend Richard Seymour led the prayers of thanks for safe arrival in the new land. A Thanksgiving ceremony and feast, that took place in Plymouth Colony in 1621, set the pattern for our present day observance. It probably occurred sometime in the middle of October, attended by Indians from a neighboring tribe. Over the years many days in November and December were celebrated as days of thanksgiving.

> The establishment of a national thanksgiving was largely the work of Sarah Josepha Hale. Beginning in 1827 she began writing to members of congress, arguing for a uniform day to give thanks. She was editor of Godeys magazine and wrote editorials on the subject from 1827 through 1863. This dedication

helped spur President Lincoln to issue the proclamation that the last Thursday in November would be the national Thanksgiving Day. This was in 1863. It took until Dec. 1941 for congress to formalize this observance with a resolution that permanently placed the holiday on the 4th Happy Thanksgiving! Thursday of November.

We finished the street name origins and now we are going to feature some sites from the Gone but Not Forgotten articles from the book The San Fernando Valley: America's Suburb by Kevin Roderick.

ADOHR DAIRY FARMS A large Adohr Farms dairy opened in 1916 between Reseda Boulevard, and Lindley Avenue, adjacent to the ranch of Gen. Harrison Gray Otis that in 1919 became the Tarzana Ranch of author Edgar Rice Burroughs. The dairy survived World War II until the expanding suburbs squeezed it out.

AIR RAID SIRENS Throughout the Cold War years residents of the Valley and Los Angeles heard the mournful wail of air raid sirens once a month. The tests were conducted at 10:00 A.M. on the last Friday of the month.

BELLY ACRES The estate of comic actor Edward Everett Horton, who also served as honorary governor of the Valley in the 1940's, was in Encino at 5521 Amestoy Avenue. Horton hosted many social and community events at Belly Acres. The writer F. Scott Fitzgerald DECEMBER EVENTS rented a guest cottage for a time in 1938-39. Horton had to make way in the late 1950's for the Ventura Freeway, which cut right through his property . A short street called Edward Everett Horton Lane off of Burbank Boulevard Dec. 9 Fundraiser at Rick and Jerry's (Chatsworth commemorates the actor.

BETHLEHEM STAR PARADE This Christian-themed Dec. 11 Sycamore Grove -Highland Park Victorian parade on Van Nuys Boulevard ended its run in 1970 after 21 years, due to waning public interest.

BIRD OF PARADISE TEA ROOM Biscuits baked to home" order, steamed Kadota figs and farm-fresh vegetables were featured on the menu in this Devonshire Street

establishment listed in a 1935 guide book, "Curious California Customs". Exotic birds strolling the grounds helped to lure weekend motorists out to Chatsworth for a stop over at Docia Conley's tea room. (Editor's Note: It was located on a slight hill where the eastern part of the new library and the adjoining strip mall are now. The fig orchard was across Devonshire St. Gifts, dried fruits, etc., were advertised and shipped all over the the USA.)
