
Co-Presidents' Message


MILTON PARSONS... The Cookie Jar Theatre Tuesday, April 21st, 7:00 pm

Tours of the Minnie Hill-Palmer Cottage and the Virginia Watson Chatsworth Museum will be available.



ALEXANDER BUTLER HOMESTEAD PALM TREES

This is how a new research project gets started.....

At the Highway Patrol program in March, a view of the palm trees on Andora at Farralone (see photo below --"**Fake Cop**" Episode, 1957 notice palm trees upper center) brought instant reactions from both Reid Bogert and Linda van der Valk. Reid recalled he had seen those palm trees as




young trees in a 1913 postcard sent to Minnie Hill Palmer by her brother Lovell, while Minnie was living in Inglewood, CA in 1913 (photo at right).

Linda van der Valk and Virginia Watson had prepared the large Minnie Hill Palmer display case

in the museum, and Linda knew exactly where it was on display.

Those tall palm trees are still there today. We did a little research to find out who planted those palm trees. From an analysis of the photos below, we now realize that the palm trees lined the entrance to the 1901 Butler homestead on Andora at Farralone.



If you look real close at the post card photo, the Hill-Palmer cottage is between the left two palm trees.



In the 1959 aerial photo above, the 33 acre Butler homestead is outlined in red. The Butler home is in the upper-mid right corner, and is the only home on the parcel. The Hill homestead is circled in blue on the left. The center photo above is a close-up of the Butler home, and you can see the 12 palm trees. The photo was taken in the morning, seen by the long shadows of the trees. Notice the Santa Susana creek runs just left of the home. By 1961 the majority of the original Butler homestead (except for the upper right corner including the home) became a golf course. By 1969 the property is part of Rockpointe Condominiums, shown in the 2015 Google Earth photo above.

Highway Patrol Episodes Filmed in Chatsworth

Our interest in the Highway Patrol episodes filmed in Chatsworth is based on film footage that reveals the community between 1955 and 1959. They include photos of street corners, buildings and rural areas long gone.

The 1955-59 "Highway Patrol" television show lasted for 4 seasons of 39 episodes each for a total of 156 episodes. Each episode of the series was filmed in a maximum of 2 to 3 days - 1 day in the studio and 1 to 2 days on location.

In reviewing the 2014 book, "Highway Patrol Locations Then and Now" by Jerry Schneider, we have identified 14 episodes that were filmed in Chatsworth.

Our March 2015 meeting featured **Episode 27**, **"Motorcycle A"**, with a 25 year old Clint Eastwood, who was paid \$80.00. Most of the filming was done at the Town and Country Café at the southwest corner of Devonshire and Topanga (now USA Gas).



Reid Bogert remembers that the cafe was run by the Jetton family. The Chatsworth Market to the south was run by the McElveins. Just south of the market is a tiny gas station. Reid pumped gas there one summer.

Chatsworth Historical Society



LILA SCHEPLER, founding member of the Chatsworth Historical Society passed away on April 8 at the age of 98.

The following article was written by Virginia Watson following Lila Schepler's 94th birthday.

Mrs. Schepler has been a local leader since she came to the area as a 14year-old girl and worked in many different fields after graduating from Canoga Park High School at 16 and later USC majoring in recreation and the arts. She came to the Chatsworth area on a Monday in September, 1931, and the next Sunday she and her father began attending services at the local Methodist Church where she has held every office including that of steward and was one of the first women to serve as trustee.

When asked about her personal history, Mrs. Schepler reports that she was born in Bashaw, Alberta, Canada in 1917. She and her family later lived in Venice, Calif., before moving to Chatsworth in 1931. When they first moved here the family lived in a little house on the northwest corner of Devonshire Street at De Soto Avenue. The area was raised in a little hill and she remembers lots of Kadota fig trees in the area. That was not surprising because the Docia Conley Co. was across the street but farther west--nearer Variel Avenue. The front of the property was a gift shop where they served tea and jam to the public and in the rear was a plant where the owners made jams and jellies, pickled watermelon and specialized in candied Kadota figs. The teen-age Lila was artistic and admired the beautiful packages all wrapped in cellophane with the bright ribbons covering the jams and jellies and it wasn't long until she was working in the shop helping to wrap the food and decorate the baskets. She remembers the shop fondly.

The Great Depression was at its worst during 1931 and '32 and Chatsworth was a small agricultural town with very few businesses, in fact there were very few stores in the area at that time. It wasn't long until the ambitious Lila was also working with "Grandpa Johnson" as **C. W. Johnson** the Bee King was known. He had two booths in different parts of the San Fernando Valley and kept them supplied with honey which took a lot of bees. Mr. Johnson taught Lila all about bees and their culture and she learned for herself about being stung. It was her job to "smoke" the bees to keep them calm so that Mr. Johnson could work with them. She remembers the hardest part was wearing a hot sweater with long sleeves in the summer and putting rubber bands on the long sleeves to keep the bees from crawling up her arm.

Lila was also an accomplished babysitter with lots of experience already with her own brothers and sisters. And she often cared for the children of the ministers of the Methodist Church when the going rate for "sitting" was 25 cents for the entire evening. She was often able to provide information about former pastors and their families in Chatsworth for the Historical Society research.

Over the years Lila Schepler has volunteered uncounted hundreds of hours to the local historical society. She initiated the Docent Program and trained the first docents. Most recently she presented her collection of books and pamphlets about California History to the **William "Bill" Schepler** Memorial Library at The Homestead Acre.

But what a life she's had. She is a retired executive in the field of recreation and has been honored many times by the Los Angeles City Department of Recreation and Parks and the California State Park and Recreation as well as her own sorority, Chi Kappa Rho. She was named Woman of the Year by the Chatsworth Chamber of Commerce in 1976 and Outstanding Citizen by the Chatsworth Community Coordinating Council. She originated programs such as the Folklorico in Los Angeles and The Young Historians for the Conference of Historical Societies, and was a founding member of the Arts Council. She is one of the founding members of the Chatsworth Historical Society and has served as president seven times, filling out the founding president's term after he had a heart attack.

She is a Life Member of the PTA, has worked on the executive board for the Girl Scouts and has been honored by them. She worked with the members of the 51st Agricultural Fair and was honored by the 51st Agricultural District. She was a member of the "Destination 90" program that planned for the development of the San Fernando Valley and worked with the Welfare Planning Council. Her work in the field of recreation and the arts is immeasurable and extends beyond her community into the whole San Fernando Valley. She

works with seemingly effortless charm and accomplishes what others say is impossible. Lila opened the playground at Lanark Park when it was Orcutt Park and remembers working with as many as 300 children in Los Angeles for a May Day program.

In her later years her vision failed and now she has to rely on voices to remember acquaintances and friends. She misses reading as she was an avid reader. She spends a lot of time with her four great grandchildren, three girls and a boy who live nearby.

She is still active in the Chatsworth Historical Society, The Chatsworth West Methodist Church and the Chi Kappa Rho when the meetings are nearby.

Lila has had a really active life and when asked about how she managed to do so many things and do them so well she modestly says, "It is just that I've lived here so long!"
