The romance began when the Kranzler's were next-door neighbors to the Johnson's on Owensmouth, and continued when Dick's parents moved to Reseda.


Freda is a Senior at Canoga Hi, and Dick graduated from that school last year.

mother of Walter Eckstein, who will be 93 years old in March. She stood on the steps and sang along happily with the carollers.





An old corral at Rancho San Antonio, Boys Town of the West, will be used by engineering students watching for satellites, according to Engineer Donald M. May, director of the Moonwatch Station. The station was formerly located in Van Nuys.

A nearby building at Rancho San Antonio has been set aside for use as an electronic headquarters, and will house short-wave receivers, a ham radio station, a tape recorder, an intercom and a large table for sky charts, as well as storage space for the telescopes when not in use.

When in operation 15 specially built telescopes will scan the entire sky at one time. Information detected will be verified on sky charts and will be reported by telephone to the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass.

The station will be manned by Moonwatch teams and teams composed of high-school students who are members of the Future Engineers of America.

Approximately 200 students and other interested Valley residents have signed up with the station. Maurice Neuman, Van Nuys High School science instructor, will train the teams in observation methods and reporting.

Electronic team captain is William Schmidt, who will train students in the use and coordination of electronic gear in tracking satellites.


