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


You're Welcome, Lord

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Chatsworth received some unexpected and unsolicited publicity in the Jean Winchell column of the Los Angeles Times recently. The following is a quotation from the story: "Chatsworth - a corner of heaven. A corner of Los Angeles, our city of many faces. Where the mountains meet the marigolds. Where the zoom-zoom of city life melts into oblivion. Where you discover sky instead of skyscrapers, space instead of claustrophobia, and know how Shakespeare could have found 'tongues in trees, books in running brooks, sermons in stones and good in everything.'"

These statements were made after she had spent a day visiting Mr. and Mrs. John Brandeis at their 500-acre ranch in the Chatsworth hills, a part of which was the former estate of Mrs. Ann Johnson, the first Anglo-Saxon white woman to live in the San Fernando Valley

Miss Winchell continued: "Probably everybody's supposed to know that John Brandeis has been around the world 17 times and probably they're supposed to act nonchalant when they see a herd of Corsican wild sheep, Indian black buck, and Russian white deer romping around his sprawling estate. Brandeis also collects odd-shaped hats, high-powered rifles, zebra-skinned couches and oodles of photos of yesteryear's polo pals like Spencer Tracy, Walt Disney, Russ Havenstrite, Will Rogers, and former Times columnist, Harry Carr."

She told in some detail about the interesting day spent as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Brandeis and concluded the article with these words: "But, in retrospect it was all great fun. And such a welcome diversion from the rigors of city life. After all, it's not every day you take time to listen to the wind in the pines, and count the lilacs on the mountainside, and mill around with casual people who laugh easily and converse amiably."

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
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
