Moonwatch Reception




Did you know that in the United States we are breeding about 50,000,000 kittens and 35,000,000 puppies every year? That is a too simple statement and doesn't reveal the result which is cruelty and suffering on a scale so great that it staggers the imagination. It is impossible to absorb such a surplus of pets in American families. The result: pregnant cats and dogs, or kittens and mothers, and puppies are dumped off into the open Highways, or tied in sack and dumped onto combustible rubbish! Millions of these poor creatures roam the United States, and the City Pounds put thousands to death each month. This mass slaughter is even humane in retrospect. But why this slaughter, this inhumanity, when it could be stopped by controlled breeding? Surely, you are sometimes fortunate enough to find "Homes" for your pets, but do you investigate what these homes are?

The Humane Society of the United States, the Veterinary Medical Association of the U. S. and many small animal welfare organizations know the desperate need for reform, and now a new organization has been formed to serve the West Valley. Their program is to beseech the pet owners to have female pets spayed, and they will give advice and financial help where needed. They are people who through the years have found the task of dealing with the abandoned animals too great to deal with, so they became organized as the WEST VALLEY BRANCH OF PET ASSISTANCE FOUNDA-TION. This is a non-profit organization and as such is permitted to solicit paying membership, but also they are in need for active members.
